Worship Matters

The Advent wreath remains in our sanctuary through Christmas and the beginning of Epiphany until January 10th, the Baptism of Our Lord. In the center is a large white candle...called the Christ candle. On Christmas Eve the Christ candle was lit. It represents the light that the Son brought into the world when He was born...God in flesh. The fact that the Advent candles remained on Christmas Eve puts the focus on this special moment of birth, the moment of transition from prophecy to fulfillment. After the Advent wreath is put away, the Christ candle remains, reminding us that old things have passed away and all has been made new.

January 2nd: This is the second Sunday of Christmas so the paraments remain white. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive the fullness of God's grace and truth. This Sunday is our first of combined services during January and February. Since this was Church Council approved, (along with **weekly Holy Communion**) the services are alternating format, beginning with Contemporary. Music for this day includes *Joy to the World; He Came Down; Emmanuel*.

Thursday, January 6th is the celebration of Epiphany. God's promise shines bright in the night as magi follow a star to honor a new king. Strangers from a faraway land, they welcome the long-awaited messiah of Israel. The season of Christmas officially ends and the season of Epiphany begins and lasts for eight Sundays. **NOTE**: there is **no service** this Thursday.

January 9th: The Baptism of Jesus/the first Sunday after Epiphany. Today's festival rejoices in God's blessings. We recall and celebrate our adoption as God's children, the gift of the Holy Spirit, and the promised company of almighty God when we "pass through the waters . . . the rivers . . . fire." On this day the heavens open again for this assembly, and we receive the gift of God's Beloved, Jesus, in bread and wine. Music for this Traditional Service includes *Bind Us Together; Spirit of Gentleness*.

January 16th: The second Sunday after Epiphany. We continue to seek Him as the Magi followed the star. Imagery used in today's readings is that of a wedding: our God rejoices over God's people as those being married rejoice over one another. By the power of the Spirit there are gifts galore for everyone. In Christ Jesus the best wine is saved for last. Taste and see. The paraments change to **green**, signifying growth and new life. Music for this Contemporary format includes *Bind Us Together; Emmanuel and God is Here Today*.

January 23rd: God's glory is revealed in the reading of scripture. People stand at attention. People weep. People prostrate themselves in prayer. The unity of the church is another reflection of God's glory. God's promises are fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. The music for this Traditional service includes *Oh for a Thousand Tongues to Sing; Here is Bread*.

January 30th: The fourth Sunday after Epiphany. We hear the many ways God reveals His glory; God uses Jesus of Nazareth, water and the word, bread and wine, to reveal God's glory where and when God chooses.

Hymn of the Month

If you recall, this hymn was introduced in June from our new hymn supplement, *All Creation Sings*.

God is Here Today comes from Guatemala, the text written by Javier Gacias Mateo (born in 1956) and was translated from Spanish by C. Michael Hawn, a University Distinguished Professor of Church Music, Master of Sacred Music, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. It was published in 2000 and appears in six other denominational hymnals.

The song is published with the refrain only as it appears here. The deceptively simple phrases of the refrain contain a profound message. The composer seems to be responding to a question: "How do we know that God is with us?" The answers are universal to human experience: (1) God is as certain as the air that we breathe; (2) God is as certain as the rising of the sun in the morning; (3) I know that God hears me when I sing (or pray).

The tune is simple and beautiful. We will be singing it two times when it is used. If you would like to hear it, click on this YouTube link:

OK, here is the deal: There used to be just three doors for me to walk through. I was roaming around last night and I realized there are now seven doors in this building. From three to seven?? What have you all been doing? Now I know what all that noise was about. Anyway, the point is you have a bigger facility, and since I am a nervous ghost, I want you all to make sure I am locked in each night. That means that the last person to leave each night needs to check **ALL** the doors. Please don't think someone else will do it.

In the new fellowship hall, for the front and end doors, you have to open the right door and check the left door with the door knob and make sure it does not open. If it does, you will need to find a key to lock it. (Find the key in the lock box by the end door) Once the left door is locked, close the right door and pull it tight. Same for the left door. For the two fire exits, one in the main fellowship hall and one in the connector hall, just pull on them and then push on the door, not the crash bar, to make sure it is locked. Robocall Q&A

Ever get a call from the church to find a robotic like voice on the other end? That's the Lakeside Lutheran Robocall system and it's another tool we use to communicate with our congregation about important things happening in your church life. Here are some answers to some frequently asked questions about the system.

Q: Tell me how the robocall system used by Lakeside Lutheran Church works?

A: The robocall system works through the internet. It uses the same set up that school systems and those annoying telemarketers use. The message to the congregation is prepared using text to speech conversion in order obtain consistent voice quality for the messages. The system allows messages to be sent immediately or at a time in the future. For example, messages about one service Sundays typically are sent out at 1pm on the Saturdays beforehand. Messages about service cancellations because of bad weather usually are made the evening before. The caller display for the robocall should say Lakeside Lutheran on your telephone.

Q: How much does it cost?

A: Lakeside Lutheran uses a pay-as-we-go plan, rather than a contract, so we buy call credits as needed. The pricing for each message sent is based on the number of successful calls placed and on the length of the message. It costs approximately \$6 to send a 30-second call to our entire congregation. The price doubles if the message goes over 30 seconds.

Q: What if I don't seem to be getting robocalls from Lakeside Lutheran?

A: You won't get robocalls if your number is not on the calling list, if you block computer-dialed calls or if you don't have an answering machine and are away from your phone. If you aren't on the calling list or you would prefer robocalls go to another number, please call the church office.

Q: How did we get telephone messages to the congregation before the robocall system?

A: We used to have a 'telephone calling tree' where individuals called a designated list of people and those people, in turn, called another list of people, and so on, until the entire congregation was notified.

Communion

We will start having Communion every Sunday beginning December 26. There are a few changes, we will no longer use the Common Cup or Communion by Intinction. We will use the small individual cups in the brass trays and the bread will be served on the brass ciborium (filled with bread). Altar Guild will make the individual Communion cups (currently being used) available, for Ushers to distribute in case there are those who are not comfortable taking traditional communion.

The Pastor stands in the middle (holding the tray with bread). The assisting minister and a lay person will be on either side holding the wine trays. The ushers would send one row from the right and then a row from the left, alternating until all of the congregation is served. The congregation would return via the side isles after placing their wine cup in the receiving trays located near the windows.

Specific information will be emailed to Altar Guild and Ushers before December 26th.

Ushers will be instructed that we will no longer use sign in sheets. Ushers will hand out Communion Cards each week for our record keeping and Synod reporting. Greeters will be asked to make sure that visitors to our church sign in. This will allow Lakeside Lutheran to send them a thank you note for attending and notify their home church of their visit.
