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From Pastor Scott:

Dear People of Lakeside Lutheran Church,

As I was considering our church my mind drifted to the first few chapters of Acts. I suspect the story is familiar but not often read. It envelopes the dramatic events that continued to form the early church.

Jesus says: "you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you..." The day of Pentecost soon comes. The people hear the Holy Spirit speak through disciples/believers...each in their own language. I think the Spirit touched far more people that day than were in that room and spoke in tongues. Peter spoke...preached. The people responded.

"Brothers, what shall we do? Peter said to them, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." Now, if you are thinking of Harry Potter wands, or Charlton Heston dividing the Red Sea, that's all fine and entertaining, but please leave that to Hollywood dramatizations.

This is real people hearing, feeling, and sharing the Holy Spirit. That is why they are moved to such a dramatic response: "All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need."

Now Babs & I give a healthy tithe, but I don't give all nor do I expect you to either. However, I do see a parallel to our church today. We can give from what is inside us...Yes, giving blood and/or donating organs are great acts of stewardship, but that is not what I am thinking of. I was reading some of Lakeside's church history and I know that some of you have that story within you; at least, your own perspective.

You have an opportunity to share your own piece of our shared church with the Reference team via the Focus sessions. Our success depends on including enough people in the process. This is not just about the past; it is investing in our future.

I'm not sure how long this early Christian community continued to share all physical assets and wealth. I am, however, quite sure...that the Church continues to share the Holy Spirit.

Useful information for Parkinsons People

My doctors made me aware that I had become one of the <u>Parkinsons</u> People over 10 years ago, when I first noticed some unsteadiness in my gait. I was told that Parkinson's disease (PD) is a type of movement disorder that can affect the ability to perform common, daily activities. The symptoms become worse over time. It is characterized by its most common of motor symptoms—tremors (a form of rhythmic shaking), stiffness or rigidity of the muscles, and slowness of movement (called bradykinesia)—but can also manifest in non-motor symptoms.

I was fortunate, as the more troubling symptoms did not appear, but the unsteadiness in my gait increased year-by-year. And, two years ago I was having trouble getting down my steep, uneven, drive way to my truck. Also, although I could pull myself into the cab, driving was becoming difficult, due to the heavy controls. I solved these two problems by buying a different truck—With automatic transmission, and power steering! I also built a hand rail down the driveway all the way to the truck. After a few test runs, I thought I had Mr. Parkinson vanquished! Then, his spirit struck me, perhaps for over-confidence! As I was slowly driving uphill into my parking space, my foot froze, and the truck continued on its way, beyond my parking space, up a hill until it ran out of power, and stalled. I had discovered freezing of gait! That was the end of my driving.

Freezing of gait is an abnormal gait pattern that can accompany Parkinson's disease (PD) in which there are sudden, short and temporary episodes of an inability to move the feet forward despite an intention to walk. My doctor later explained that this effect is what probably caused me to be unable to take my foot off of the gas pedal. Freezing of gait episodes tend to occur least often when walking on an unobstructed, straight path. Any deviation from that can induce freezing – for example, when you first try to start walking, when you go to make a turn, or try to navigate around obstacles or through narrow spaces - any of these can cause you to get "stuck." The particular triggers for one person may be different than for another. An episode is typically very brief, often lasting only 1-2 seconds. Freezing of gait can be affected by anxiety. e.g. in trying to board an elevator before the doors close, freezing may be particularly prominent. It is not clear why some people with PD experience freezing of gait and others do not. Research suggests that there is a relationship between freezing of gait and cognitive difficulties. The brain circuitry that controls gait is extremely complex and involves multiple connections between various parts of the brain. Freezing of gait seems to be caused by short-lasting episodes of inhibition of the brain circuits that coordinate gait. The specific abnormalities that cause the problem may differ from person to person.

Worship Matters By Diane Colin

July 3rd: We are on the 4th Sunday after Pentecost. Jesus' invitation to "take and eat. . . take and drink" is a repeated one. In Holy Communion, in the word read and proclaimed, in the assembly of the people of God, He has come near. You are to rejoice! Your name is written in heaven! Our music includes songs of faith such as "Here I am, Lord" and "Shine, Jesus Shine." The Traditional Service at 10:30 will begin a new Communion hymn. The paraments continue to be green, signifying anticipation and hope in the resurrection, each new day. We receive Holy Communion at both services. July 10th: On this 5th Sunday after Pentecost, we hear in Colossians 1:1-14 that we should lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as we bear fruit in every good work and as we grow in the knowledge of God. Psalm 25:4 reads, "Show me your ways, O Lord, and teach me your paths." As learners on the journey, it is a fitting prayer to add to our daily meditation. Our music this day includes "What a Fellowhip, What a Joy Divine" and "I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light." The paraments remain green on this day.

July 17th: On this 6th Sunday after Pentecost, God urges the faithful, again and again, to "listen up!"—to heed the word that gives life. As it was with Abraham and Sarah, Mary and Martha, and the early church at Colossae, so it is today as we join together to hear the word of God, the word of life. Music for the day includes "A Mighty Fortress," "The Church's One Foundation," and "You Are Holy, You Are Whole." The paraments remain green.

July 24th: On this 7th Sunday after Pentecost, we continue reading in Colossians for the reminder that we are buried with Christ in our baptism and raised with Him in our faith. We read in Genesis how Abraham bargains with God to save Sodom and Gomorrah. Paraments are green. Music of the day includes "Savior, Like a Shepherd Lead Us," "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," and Lord, Listen to Your Children Praying." We will sing the Lord's Prayer. July 31st: On this 8th Sunday after Pentecost, it is a combined service at 9:30 in the Pavilion with a church picnic immediately afterward. This is our tradition to have a combined service on the 5th Sunday of a month. In addition, both Pastor Scott and Pastor Liz will be presiding at this service since it will be a Service of **Healing**. They are currently working on the format together, so it will be different from a regular service. Music will reflect our need for the comfort and healing that is available through our Lord, who not only carries our sins, but also our sorrows and our whether physical or emotional. This promises to be a very special service, with an opportunity for joint fellowship. You are invited to bring a friend, for here, all are

welcome.
