
A Doer, Not a Spectator

Recently, the Winter Olympics

united millions of people around the world. For seventeen days, we watched elite athletes compete for gold medals. Perhaps your family, like mine, spent hours curled up together on the sofa cheering on your favorite competitors.

When it comes to the Olympics, most of us are spectators. Unfortunately, many of us have a spectator theology, as well. Many Christians are content to let others champion God's causes, make disciples of the nations, and live sacrificially.



But when it comes to our faith, we were never meant to be spectators. James writes to the church, "I will show you my faith by my works" (James 2:18). We weren't created for a life on the sidelines. We are active participants in God's redemptive work. We are to be doers of the Word (James 1:22).

Dear sister, know that God's commands are good, and when He tells you to be a doer of them, it's for your good. You don't want to miss out on the joy of obedience (<u>John 15:10–11</u>).

What Do We Do?

God tells us plainly what to do in His Word. He says in Deuteronomy 10:12–13:

"And now, Israel, what does the LORD your God require of you, but to fear the LORD your God, to walk in all his ways, to love him, to serve the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul, and to keep the commandments and statutes of the LORD, which I am commanding you today for your good?"

In Micah 6:8, He requires us to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God.

We can also follow Jesus' example in being a doer of the Word. He said, "Truly, truly, I say to you, the Son can do nothing of his own accord, but only what he sees the Father doing. For whatever the Father does, that the Son does likewise" (John 5:19). Doers must look to our Father and then mirror His actions.

God is reconciling man to Himself, and we join Him in that work by sharing the message of reconciliation with all nations (2 Cor. 5:19). We know God cares for orphans and widows (Ps. 68:5), so we do likewise by living compassionately toward them. God forgives us our sins (1 John 1:9), so we forgive the offenses of others.

How Do We Do Obey?

God's commands are good, but obeying them can feel daunting. We need Christ. Apart from Him, we can do nothing (<u>John 15:5</u>). We obey our Father, not in our own strength but in His (<u>Col. 1:29</u>). We are weak, but it's in our weakness that God's power is displayed (<u>2 Cor. 12:9</u>). He equips us with "everything good that you may do his will, working in us that which is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ" (Heb. 13:21).

Our obedience on this side of heaven will always be imperfect. But God satisfies His demand for perfect obedience through His Son, and He accepts Jesus' obedience on our behalf. Jesus stood before God as our substitute and received His just wrath for our sins, and He stands before God to substitute His obedience for ours (2 Cor. 5:21). We can only obey as we abide in Christ.

Through the grace of regeneration, we receive new hearts (<u>Ezek. 36:26</u>) with the ability to obey. Ezekiel 36:27 says, "And I will put my Spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes and be careful to obey my rules. "God gives us the ability to obey, but why we do His Word matters.

Why Do We Obey?

God tells us to do His Word, and that's enough reason to obey. But we're doers of the Word for more reasons than the divine "because I said so." We're God's children. Like Jesus, we just want to do what we see our Father doing.

We are to be motivated by love, not obligation (<u>John 14:15</u>). Every act of our obedience is a declaration of love for Him. Every time I choose not to gossip, I'm saying, "I love You, Lord." When I forgo that new outfit so I can help the family in my local church that lost their job, I'm saying, "Father, I love You and delight to do Your will." We don't submit to His authority because we have to but because we want to. It's our joy to please Him (<u>Col. 1:10</u>).

We were made to glorify God. Our obedience brings God more glory (<u>John 15:8</u>). Our Father is busy advancing His kingdom on earth, and we want to join Him in that work (<u>1 Cor. 3:9</u>). We do His Word "for the sake of his name among all the nations" (Rom. 1:5).

Be a Doer, Not a Spectator

Watching the Olympics on my couch is entertaining, but eventually I turn off the TV and go to bed unchanged. In much the same way, the life of a theological spectator is safe and comfortable, too. This existence will never satisfy. You were made for more, sister. You were given life in Christ for a purpose (Eph. 2:10). Don't waste it with inaction.

God wants more from you than your attention. He wants your actionable obedience. He wants you to be a doer. Go next door to your sick neighbor and tell her about the God that heals all our diseases. Go to the soccer field and cheer for your child's friend who has no father present and teach him about the heavenly Father who never abandons us. Give sacrificially so that family in your local church can go live amongst an unreached people group to share the gospel.

Doers must be knowers. We must know God as Father. We must know what His Word tells us to do. We need to know His promises. God's Word offers a promise for those who obey. James tells us that "a doer who acts . . . will be blessed in his doing" (James 1:25). Our greatest blessing will come in the form of a beautiful inheritance in Christ. But the blessing is only for the doers.

Let's be doers of the Word.



How to Make and Eat (Truly) Humble Pie

Oscar-winners. Professional athletes. Recording artists. Oh, and of course—politicians. Remarks by men and women in each of these groups often have a common theme:

I am so humbled to have been chosen . . .

I'm truly humbled to be among the ranks of such a talented group . . .

I'm infinitely humbled that you would exercise your right to vote on my behalf . . .

We listen, and sometimes we even believe them *a little*. But on the inside, don't we suspect that a more truthful translation of the sentiment behind those word is more like this? I feel pretty stinkin' proud to be standing before you today. I actually really deserve this honor and would have been completely affronted had you chosen someone else. Of course, before we run too far down the Path of Blame and Shame, we should probably examine ourselves. Yesterday I had an experience at the office, which, had I not been preparing to write this post, I might have walked away from saying, "Wow. That was humbling."

Instead, as I look back on the day, while I do believe that I was unjustly reprimanded, my inward response showed that I was far from *humbled* by my supervisor's words and authority. Rather I walked away prideful. Emboldened. Embarrassed perhaps. But humbled? Uh, no.

Meaningful Words:

There is a sense of fluidity in language. That is the understood meaning of a word and the way that everyday people apply it in speech or writing can change over time. Compare, for example, these two dictionary entries for the word "humble." The first is from today's *dictionary.com*, the second, from *Webster's Dictionary 1828—Online Edition*.

humble—adjective, humbler, humblest.

- 1. not proud or arrogant; modest: to be humble although successful.
- 2. having a feeling of insignificance, inferiority, subservience, etc.: *In the presence of so many world–famous writ– ers I felt very humble.*
- 3. low in rank, importance, status, quality, etc.; lowly: of humble origin; a humble home.
- 4. courteously respectful: In my humble opinion you are wrong.
- 5. low in height, level, etc.; small in size: a humble member of the galaxy.

humble—adjective [Latin humilis.]

- 1. Low; opposed to high or lofty. *Thy humble nest built on the ground.*
- 2. Low; opposed to lofty or great; mean; not magnificent; as a humble cottage. *A humble roof, and an obscure re-treat.*

Lowly; modest; meek; submissive; opposed to proud, haughty, arrogant or assuming. In an evangelical sense, having a low opinion of one's self, and a deep sense of unworthiness in the sight of God. *God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble.* <u>James 4:1</u>. Without a humble imitation of the divine author of our blessed religion, we can never hope to be a happy nation.

The differences aren't necessarily glaring, but there is a sense that in modern times we've backed off on the depth of the meaning of humility, and there has been a shift from seeing humble as a comparison of lowly man to holy God toward a comparison of one person to another.

So as we reflect on what it truly means to be humble, let's spend a few moments looking at how the word is used in Scripture and what it might mean in a biblical sense. And just for grins, because I'm a recipe nut (and former *Food Network* addict . . . "former" only because we no longer have cable TV), why not look at the biblical meaning of "humble" through the lens of a recipe? Without further ado, here it is.

Humble Pie: How to Make It

Ingredients:
Instruction in Wisdom (Prov. 15:33)
Fear of the Lord (Prov. 22:4)
Gentleness and Patience (Eph. 4:2)
Compassion, Kindness, and Meekness (Col. 2:12)
A Contrite Spirit (Isa. 66:2)
Understanding of Heart (Dan. 10:12)
Childlikeness (Matt. 18:4)
Gentleness (2 Cor. 10:1)
Repentance (2 Cor. 12:21)
Obedience (Phil. 2:8)

Instructions

Before beginning, prepare your spirit with a generous coating of repentance. Neglecting this important step will result in great disappointment with your final product. Add gentleness and patience, then mix thoroughly with compassion, kindness, and meekness. Sift mixture, being careful to remove any of the following: haughtiness (Prov. 18:12; Ps. 18:27), self-ish ambition and conceit (Phil. 2:3), pride (Job 22:29; Prov. 11:12), wickedness (Ps. 147:6), and loftiness (Isa. 2:11). Special care must be taken to avoid any self-rising ingredients (Ezek. 17:14; Matt. 23:12; Luke 1:52, 14:11, 18:14). Add as much wisdom as you can get your hands on, as this will ensure that your methods are accurate (Ps. 25:9).

After the mixture is complete, dredge yourself in it (<u>1 Peter 5:5</u>), doing what you can to ensure that your fellow believers are covered as well. Be as gentle as possible with them, holding their needs above your own (<u>Phil. 2:3</u>). Season well with justice and an additional sprinkle of kindness; now it's time to walk (Mic. 6:8).

You will know you are on the path to success when you are contrite in spirit and tremble at His Word (Isa. 66:2).

Service is a delectable accompaniment to your humble pie (Acts 20:19).

Please note: You will need to make a fresh pie from scratch daily, and you will likely have many botched attempts. If you find yourself struggling and need further instruction, follow the example of the Master (Phil. 2:8). Happy humbling!

And Eat It, Too

Friends, true humility is not a quick and easy thing to learn. Just like my grandma's pie crust (which I *still* can't get to turn out after twenty years of homemaking), it will be a learning process for the rest of my life and yours. Thankfully, we have the Word as our guide, the Spirit as our Helper, and a loving Father who is quick to show us our sin and merciful to forgive it. Will you begin another attempt at making humble pie today?


