



That's Not Jesus

I often hear people talk about a Jesus who isn't the Jesus of the Bible.

The Jesus they refer to is usually popular with unsaved folks, which is the first sign that he isn't the real Jesus (<u>John 15:18</u>). He doesn't talk about sin, judgment, or hell like the real Jesus does (<u>Matthew 18</u>). He doesn't say he is the only way of salvation like the real Jesus does (<u>John 14:6</u>). He doesn't say what the real Jesus says about obedience and love (<u>John 14:21-24</u>).

Unfortunately, many Christians also have an incorrect view of Jesus. They believe He's pleased with them no matter how casual their faith is.

But Jesus is clear:

"If you refuse to take up your cross and follow me, you are not worthy of being mine... All who love me will do what I say." <u>Matthew 10:38</u>; <u>John 14:23</u> NLT

Let's read our Bibles and make sure we know the real Jesus! He loves us too much to be satisfied with a watered-down faith.

Handy Household Hints

- 1. If you get a water mark on a wooden table, rub the stain with Petroleum Jelly and let sit for 24 hours. Then wipe off the excess and polish as usual.
- 2. Cornstarch will untangle all kinds of knots. Rub some into the knot in shoelaces, chains, string etc. and watch as it comes apart.



- 3. When painting, wrap a rubber band around the can over the opening. Then you can dip in the brush and wipe the excess paint off onto the rubber band, rather than the edge of the can.
- 4. Keep the stove top clean by applying a thin layer of car wax, then wipe it off. It keeps food from sticking. Anything that sticks easily wipes away with a magic eraser!
- 5. Chalk will remove grease stains from clothes. Simply rub the stain with chalk, then toss in the wash as normal.
- 6. Add some Velcro to a dish towel to keep it secure on the handle of the oven.
- 7. Soak old paint brushes in HOT vinegar for 30 minutes and then wash. The old paint will come out and they will be as good as new.
- 8. Did you know that strawberries can be hulled using a regular drinking straw.
- To keep cords from looking like a pile of spaghetti around and behind your end tables. Braid them together.
- 10. Use Rain-X on your shower doors to keep away water spots. The water just runs down the door.



11. From instructables.com, aspirin can not only prevent heart attacks but also remove sweat stains, take the green out of blonde hair in the summer, treat pimples and get rid of dandruff. To remove sweat stains crush up enough pills to make a paste with water to cover the stain. Let set and then wash as usual. To remove the green from the pool from your hair, dissolve 6-8 tabs in water and let soak onto hair for 10 minutes. For problem acne, make a paste and apply directly to the pimple. For Dandruff- crush two aspirins and mix it into your normal amount of shampoo (regular shampoo, not the dandruff kind!) you use in the shower. American History Erased

"History is not history, unless it is the truth." -- Abraham Lincoln

Immediately after creating the Declaration of Independence, the Continental Congress voted to purchase and import 20,000 copies of Scripture for the people of this nation. Patrick Henry, who is called the firebrand of the American Revolution, is still remembered for his words, "Give me liberty or give me death" - but in current textbooks, the context of these words is omitted.

Here is what he actually said: "An appeal to arms and the God of hosts is all that is left us. But we shall not fight our battle alone. There is a just God that presides over the destinies of nations. The battle, sir, is not to the strong alone. Is life so dear or peace so sweet as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it Almighty God. I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty, or give me death."

These sentences have been erased from our textbooks. Was Patrick Henry a Christian? The following year, 1776, he wrote this: "It cannot be emphasized too strongly or too often that this great Nation was founded not by religionists, but by Christians; not on religions, but on the Gospel of Jesus Christ. For that reason alone, people of other faiths have been afforded freedom of worship here."

Consider these words that Thomas Jefferson wrote in the front of his well-worn Bible: "I am a real Christian, that is to say, a disciple of the doctrines of Jesus. I have little doubt that our whole country will soon be rallied to the unity of our creator." He was also the chairman of the American Bible Society, which he considered his highest and most important role.

On July 4, 1821, President Adams said, "The highest glory of the American Revolution was this: "It connected in one indissoluble bond the principles of civil government with the principles of Christianity."

Calvin Coolidge, our 30th President of the United States reaffirmed this truth when he wrote, "The foundations of our society and our government rest so much on the teachings of the Bible that it would be difficult to support them if faith in these teachings would cease to be practically universal in our country."

In 1782, the United States Congress voted this resolution: "The Congress of the United States recommends and approves the Holy Bible for use in all schools."

William Holmes McGuffey is the author of the McGuffey Reader, which was used for over 100 years in our public schools, with over 125 million copies sold, until it was stopped in 1963. President Lincoln called him the "Schoolmaster of the Nation." Listen to these words of Mr. McGuffey: "The Christian religion is the religion of our country. From it are derived our nation, on the character of God, on the great moral Governor of the universe. On its doctrines are founded the peculiarities of our free Institutions. From no source has the author drawn more conspicuously than from the sacred Scriptures. For all these extracts from the Bible, I make no apology."

Of the first 108 universities founded in America, 106 were distinctly Christian, including the first, Harvard University, chartered in 1636. In the original Harvard Student Handbook, rule number 1 was that students seeking entrance must know Latin and Greek so that they could study the Scriptures: "Let every student be plainly instructed and earnestly pressed to consider well, the main end of his life and studies, is, to know God and Jesus Christ, which is eternal life, John 17:3; and therefore to lay Jesus Christ as the only foundation for our children to follow the moral principles of the Ten Commandments."

James Madison, the primary author of the Constitution of the United States, said this: "We have staked the whole future of all our political constitutions upon the capacity of each of ourselves to govern ourselves according to the moral principles of the Ten Commandments."

Most of what you read in this article has been erased from our textbooks. Revisionists have rewritten history to remove the truth about our country's Christian roots. You are encouraged to share this with others, so that the truth of our nation's history will be told.

Stir in 1 pint Marzetti (original) slaw dressing




Add any of the following to your families liking:


When we put out a call for help, our "giving" congregation came forward with donations to help pay the cost.



As We Empty Ourselves for God, He Will Fill Us

An Opportunity to Serve

We recently had a chance to serve someone outside of our family.

Late one night, tragedy hit a dear friend of mine. I heard about it in the morning and packed the kiddos up as quickly as I could. We arrived at her apartment to sit with her. It was wonderful to be able to do that. The children were considerate and compassionate. My friend was the least-needy person on the face of the planet. I rubbed her back when she cried, we chatted, and we helped her run an errand. After noon, we headed home for the baby's naptime.

By the time we got in the door, our strength was sapped. We were practically gasping for air.

The kids fell apart instantly. Crying, fussing, fogginess . . . we all muddled around for lunch, ate, and *crashed*. My highly compassionate/emotionally tuned child was so drained, he took a very uncharacteristic nap. I couldn't get dinner on the table, and I didn't have any emotional availability for my husband when he came home from work.

To tell you the truth, we didn't really regain our footing for a couple of days. We gave everything we had. But it wasn't even that much.

When We Give So Little

I felt crushed before the Lord. "Why don't I have more strength? I want to serve You, but the simplest things wear me out! I wish I had more emotional rebound, more energy. I wish I could keep going after serving someone."

That's when I remembered the widow of <u>Luke 21</u> or <u>Mark 12</u>. The one Jesus "looked up and saw" the widow putting two small copper coins in the temple offering.

He said, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them. For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (<u>Luke 21:3–4</u>).

She's the "good guy" to whom I can relate: the poor widow who gave all she had.

I look at her and say, "Yes, I feel like her. I know I'm not nearly as generous as she, but I feel like I'm offering as much as I can. And I feel like it's only two mites worth."

Can you relate to her, too? Are you giving everything you've got and wondering why it seems so little?

Lessons from the Widow

I want to share a few sweet things I've gleaned from looking at this short story in the context of Scripture as a whole:

1. She went home empty, too.

Just think, when that poor widow went home, she had no money left. She had to start over again, earning, saving, or begging. Though giving was a joy, she felt the loss.

When we give everything, we're going to feel like we have nothing left. It's like a law of nature, right? Though we may relish the joy of service, we're going to feel the emptiness, the lack, the exhaustion. And we will have to start over again, sleeping, eating, and praying.

2. Jesus looked up and saw her gift.

It is sufficient for our Savior, who loves us, to see us in those moments when we just want to love Him back and lavish other people with His love. What an undeserved wonder to catch His eye!

Though perhaps like me, the poor widow felt disappointed in the smallness of her gift. Maybe, like the apostle Paul, she too considered her greatest act of service "rubbish" compared with Christ's righteousness given to us.

Until the other day, I never imagined that perhaps the poor widow was really thinking, *Oh, if only I had more to give Him* . . . Did she struggle, like me, to be grateful for those two mites?

3. Jesus gave her those two mites in the first place.

The poor widow knew that God Himself had pressed those two mites into her hand so she could have the pleasure of returning them to Him. Like my children who hold out their palms during the offering at church, waiting for me to put a quarter in their hand so they can immediately plunk it in the offering plate, may we hold out our hands to our heavenly Father and immediately give His blessings back to Him. All of our blessings come from our God, and all things belong to Him.

4. Jesus will continue to take care of her.

Just moments before this scene takes place, Jesus criticizes the scribes who misused the widows, taking everything they had for selfish purposes. Of course, the scribes would not provide for widows in return.

But God is different. He loves and provides for widows. When this widow gives all of her money to the temple, she is demonstrating that her hope is in the Lord. He can take all of her money, for He will care for her. What trust! She believed it wasn't the last time God would provide for her, so she could give generously.

Thankfully, our salvation is wrapped up in *His* generosity and never-ending supply of help. We give because He first gave to us. Believing in God's loving goodness opens our hands. But keep this in mind: When we give all we've got, we will feel empty. The unchanging law of the kingdom of heaven is that God will fill us back up again.

What has God pressed into your hands today? Do you have something small you could give to the Lord? An extra hour or some resources to offer someone in need? A notecard to write an encouraging note to a sister? Or is today one of resting and waiting for Him to fill you up again?
