## The Priestly Blessing

by: Rev. C. Chapman

Num. 6:22-27 HCSB

The blessing or benediction that we are familiar with in our church service is that from ancient times. The earliest records that we have concerning the benediction contain instructions for blessing the people. This practice was quickly put into place in the Temple of the Lord. In Numbers 6:22-27 the Lord hands down the benediction that is to be proclaimed over Israel to Moses who is to pass it on to his brother Aaron, the High Priest.

May Yahweh bless you and protect you; may Yahweh make His face shine on you and be gracious to you; may Yahweh look with favor on you and give you peace.

In this way God's name is pronounced over the Israelites and He promised to bless them. Today through this benediction God's name is pronounced over all believers in Christ and indeed He blesses His church. Charles Spurgeon wrote concerning this blessing:

What a joy to abide under the divine blessing! This puts a gracious flavor into all things. If we are blessed, then all our possessions and enjoyments are blessed; yea, our losses and crosses and even our disappointments are blessed. God's blessing is deep, emphatic, effectual. A man's blessing may begin and end in words, but the blessing of the LORD makes rich and sanctifies. The best wish we can have for our dearest friend is not "may prosperity attend thee," but "the LORD bless thee" (C. H. Spurgeon, *Faith's Checkbook: a Daily Devotional*, Accordance electronic ed. (Altamonte Springs: OakTree Software, 2006), paragraph 1259.).

How great it is to realize that the Lord keeps us so close to His heart to pour out His blessings upon everything in our life. God can bless us immediately and He can bless us mediately. In this case it was through the priests, the mediators of God's blessing, that God blessed Israel. Today it can be through the pastor or elders. God can even use you to bless someone else in His name. Yes, you have an important part to play. As you walk according to the ways of the Lord, His Spirit will tug at your heart to be a blessing in someone else's life. What treasure we store up in heaven by listening to the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

This month be still, as you dwell upon God's Word, the Holy Bible, listen for the Spirit of Christ to call you to be a blessing to others.

"And the King will answer them, 'I assure you: Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of Mine, you did for Me." Matthew 25:40



CORTLAND — Cortland Christian Church has officially installed Casey Chapman of Sandy Lake, Pa., as its new pastor, effective July 15.

A welcoming celebration for Chapman will be Aug. 5 following the 10 a.m. worship service.

Chapman, who previously served four years as the pastor of the Atlantic Church in Greenville, Pa., said he started as a nursing major at Liberty University in Virginia before changing to ministry.

"I was at a Christian college and the more I studied, I felt the Lord was telling me this was not the path he wanted me on. I already had my vocational diploma in health care, but after I spoke to my pastor in Sandy Lake I decided to switch over to pastoral leadership," he said.

Chapman said he was a little reluctant about being a public speaker but said after he studied pastoral leadership he knew that would have to change that because he would be speaking to church congregations. He received both his bachelor's degree in religion and his master's degree in pastoral leadership from Liberty University.

Chapman said he has been meeting with the church staff and congregation and said he would like to focus on starting up the Sunday school program.

"I would love to add a junior church for the children, which we are in the process of doing. I would also like to see an evening Bible study," he said.

Chapman said he would like to get the youth as active in the church as possible.

Chapman was looking for a new church to serve when he saw the opening at the Cortland church when Pastor Donald Barnes left and was replaced with Pastor Curtis Miller, who served as an interim for one year. Chapman himself had served as interim pastor at churches, including Milledgeville Community Christian Church in Carlton, Pa.

"I was led to this church. I had seen the postings and was looking for a church that was close. I came here and met with the pastoral search committee and fell in love with the people," he said.

CORTLAND — On a living room wall facing the entrance of John Klamut's front door is a handmade U.S. Navy Seabees emblem.

It was given to Klamut, 86, as a gift, and was built with several different types of wood. Each piece of wood is in its natural color, and the craftsmanship of the emblem makes it a fitting gift for a construction battalion veteran who had a role in the largest earth-moving project ever undertaken.

Klamut, who served from 1951 to 1955 in the U.S. Navy as a 3rd Class Petty Officer in the U.S. Naval Construction Battalion, better known as the Seabees, was a heavy equipment operator.

Building an air strip in a dense patch of rocky, jungle terrain with a mountain range was a project fraught with obstacles from animals to terrain. The U.S. Naval Air Station at Cubi Point, Subic Bay in the Philippines, which took five years to complete, would ultimately be used during the Vietnam War. It was a project some said was impossible, and larger in scale than construction of the Panama Canal, Klamut said.

Dirt was hauled out in equipment that held 12 cubic yards and would travel at 14 mph on the ground. Coming down th mountain, drivers would shift into neutral and hit speeds of 80 mph, Klamut said.

One time, tons of explosives were brought in to blow up part of a mountain. The mountain was supposed to come straight down, but didn't, and instead Klamut and others found themselves watching from another mountain and being rained on by rocks as was a Japanese admiral who had been brought in to watch the mountain come down.

"We cut down half a mountain and filled in a valley," Klamut said.

Klamut learned how to drive "every piece of equipment there is" in Port Hueneme, Calif. It's a job he thinks he got because prior to joining the U.S. Navy he had experience driving a semi-truck and he operated a crane for the Taylor Winfield Corp. in Warren. After his training, he was on a ship to the Philippines.

"We were on a troop ship and 22 days later, we were in Manila," Klamut said. "I didn't get seasick, but a lot of guys did. I had a buddy. His name was Bob Wadsworth. Tough guy. He had a hide like leather — until the ship they literally moved mountains or drank beer on their down time.

During the rainy season, work couldn't be done, Klamut said. After being sent to repair an airstrip in Korea, and a short stop in Hong Kong, it was back to the Philippines, and it was still raining. This left Klamut some time to tell jokes and drink beer, and on one of those rainy days e ran into a high school classmate who had been a year behind him.

After the next rainy season, when it was time to come home, Klamut ran into a guy who was a year ahead of him in high school while on a ship with 5,000 men. Klamut about a 1948Ford when he returned home, drove cross country and met former President Harry Truman who was shaking hands with people in a small Missouri town. Klamut told Truman he was from Akron because he figured Truman wouldn't know anything about Ravenna.

Klamut, wo ultimately settled into a job as a machinist and a union president at Taylor Winfield Corp., is a man who loves his country. He loves a good joke too.

"What's small, round and blue?" Klamut asked. "A cranberry holding its breath."

It's one of several one-liners Klamut delivers quickly with a chuckle. One can picture the old union man, who cam out of boot camp at 145 lbs, throwing out one-liners as a young man with his buddies in the heat of the jungle as they literally moved mountains or drank beer on their down time.
