"Remembering True Love"

"But I have *this* against you, that you have left your first love," (Revelation 2:4 NAS95).

I have seen many marriages drift further and further apart. So much so, that the marriage is no longer based upon love but becomes that of toleration. Over my pastorate I have been asked to lift many different couples in prayer that their marriage would be saved.

While our 2020 culture sees marriage as something that is disposable, it is far from it. Marriage is a holy institution that should be taken with the utmost seriousness. The ending of a marriage should be the exception not the norm.

What is it that causes husband and wife to drift apart? For simplicity's sake, it is forgetting their first love. The couples that fight, the couples that merely tolerate each other often no longer love one another as they did when they first met. At some point in time they have stopped dating. They have stopped being romantic. They have stopped having a special night each week to dance, dine, and be intimate. Such time is important to continue to know one another, for as humans we change each year based on our life experiences. Knowing someone is a life-long process. Indeed, many couples in distress have forgotten their first love and this can lead to other marital issues too.

If this is you, then I encourage you to remember those things that caused you to fall in love with your spouse. Bring back a weekly date night. Go out together and dine and converse. Experience life together that you will have a common bond to grow upon and build for if you do not then you are relying on decades old experiences that have been used as much as they can be. Imagine sewing a dress with only two or three seams. It would fall apart. Each seam represents those common bonds that have formed from common experiences. Return to dating and loving. Return to your first love.

Christians, too, need to remember their first love. He is Christ. He is the One who gave His life for us and gave us a promise through His resurrection of eternal life. "Greater love has no one than this, that one lay down his life for his friends," (John 15:13 NAS95). God gave the greatest love that He could to you. He took upon flesh and gave up His life upon a cross for your sins, so that you could spend eternity in paradise with Him, the Creator of all.

Christians do not be astray long, but remember why we pray, remember why we read the Bible, to draw closer to Jesus. Remember why we gather in church to worship, because we love Him for, He first loved us, and He has not forgotten His love for us.

And to the church, remember why you gather weekly. You are not a social club. You are not a list of programs. You are not a bunch of numbers on tithe boxes. You are the body of Christ. You are co-heirs with the Son of God, the Messiah. You are loved and highly valued for you are His bride. The things that take place in your walls are out of love for Him and for all created in His image who do not know Him yet. Go out to them, and when they come let them in to hear about His love for them that they would receive Christ as Savior and become apart of His body, loving Him by repenting and obeying as we are all to do.





"Groundhog Day", was celebrated in the 1860s. The name never caught on.

Groundhog Day



Although this ritual, which typically centers on the observation of the Behavior of the *Marmota monax* when it observes (or neglects to observe) its own shadow, has been traced back to the first half of the 19th century, our earliest known use of *Groundhog Day* comes in the early 1850s.

The 2nd of February is known to our natives of the mountain by the not very euphonious name of ground-hog day. It is believed, by them, to be a certain index of the weather for the first six weeks.

While it is unclear what name was given to February 2nd prior to this point the holiday appears to have been well-established by the time it began being referred to as *Groundhog Day*, as many of the early citations of this use indicate that *El Día de la Marmota* was widely known.

To-day, of all other days, from time immemorial, is rendered "famousest of all," from its peculiar name, "groundhog's day." It is said that upon the second day of February, the ground-hogs (woodchucks) come from their burrows, and, seeing no shadows of themselves, remain out—a sure sign of a commencement of pleasant weather.







Presidents Day

Back in my school days, February was an important month — not just because it included the eagerly-anticipated Valentine's Day, but because even though it was the shortest month of the year, it encompassed two holidays for which public schools were closed: Lincoln's Birthday (February 12) and Washington's Birthday (February 22). Two school-free days for the kids, two days off for working parents, and terrific bargains on bedding, linen, and towels at department store white sales. What wasn't to like about February?

Nowadays, though, many of us — whether we be employees or students — don't get any weekdays off at all in February, or we're offered a single holiday that falls on the third Monday in February and is neither Lincoln's nor Washington's Birthday but some hybrid known as "Presidents' Day." What happened to our traditional February holidays? And just what the heck are we commemorating on "Presidents' Day"?

Some of us think we're observing George Washington's Birthday (perpetually moved to more convenient Monday dates since 1971), some of us think we're celebrating the combined birthdays of George Washington and Abraham Lincoln (two formerly separate holidays smushed into one), and some of us think we're honoring the memory of all U.S. presidents past and present. 

Leap Day: February 29, 2020

A Leap Day, February 29, is added to the calendar during <u>leap years</u>. This extra day, also called Leap Year Day, makes the year 366 days long – not 365 days, like a common year.

Leap Day has been a day of traditions, folklore and superstitions ever since Leap Years were first introduced by <u>Julius Caesar</u> over 2000 years ago.

The Why of Leap Day.....Leap days are needed to keep our <u>calendar</u> in alignment with the Earth's revolutions around the Sun.



It takes the Earth approximately 365.242189 days – or 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, and 45 seconds – to circle once around the Sun. This is called a <u>tropical year</u>. Without an extra, or intercalary, day on February 29 nearly every four years, we would lose almost six hours every year. After only 100 years, a calendar without leap years would be off by approximately 24 days in relation to fixed seasonal days such as the <u>vernal equinox</u> or the <u>winter solstice</u>.

The <u>length of a year on Earth</u> is defined by the time it takes our planet to complete a full orbit around the Sun. Called a <u>tropical year</u>, solar year, astronomical year or equinoctial year, it is approximately 365.242189 days long on average. Its length changes slightly over time.

Because a <u>common year</u> has 365 days in today's <u>Gregorian calendar</u>, a <u>leap day</u> is regularly added to bring it in sync with the tropical year.

Without leap days, our calendar would be off by 1 day approximately every 4 years, causing the <u>astronomical seasons</u> to occur at an increasingly later date as time goes by. In less than 50 years, the <u>March equinox</u> would be in April and the <u>June solstice</u> would occur in July.

Women Propose to Their Men

According to an old Irish legend, or possibly history, St Brigid struck a deal with St Patrick to allow women to propose to men – and not just the other way around – every four years.

This is believed to have been introduced to balance the traditional roles of men and women in a similar way to how <u>leap day</u> balances the calendar.

12 Pairs of Gloves

In some places, leap day has been known as "Bachelors' Day" for the same reason. A man was expected to pay a penalty, such as a gown or money, if he refused a marriage proposal from a woman on Leap Day.

In many European countries, especially in the upper classes of society, tradition dictates that any man who refuses a woman's proposal on February 29 has to buy her 12 pairs of gloves. The intention is that the woman can wear the gloves to hide the embarrassment of not having an engagement ring. During the middle ages there were laws governing this tradition.

Leap Day Babies World Record

People born on February 29 are all invited to join The Honor Society of Leap Year Day Babies.

When do Leap Day Babies Celebrate Their Birthdays? Either February 28 or March 1 usually as they prefer.

According to the Guinness Book of Records, there are <u>Leap Day World Record Holders</u> both of a family producing three consecutive generations born on February 29 and of the number of children born on February 29 in the same family.

Fresh Strawberry Upside Down Cake

Prep 15 m Cook 50 m Ready In 1 h 20 m

- 2 cups crushed fresh strawberries
- 1 (6 ounce) package strawberry flavored Jell-O (mix)
- 3 cups miniature marshmallows
 - 1 (18 ounce) package yellow cake mix, batter prepared as directed on package

Preheat an oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).

Spread crushed strawberries on the bottom of a 9x13 inch baking pan. Evenly sprinkle strawberries with the dry gelatin powder, and top with mini marshmallows.

Prepare the cake mix as directed on the package, and pour on top of the marshmallows. Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, about 40 to 50 minutes. Cool in the pan for 15 minutes. Run a knife around the pan to loosen the sides, and turn the cake out onto a serving tray. Store cake in the refrigerator.
