When Something's Free. Until it Isn't

Fraud Watch Network

An 84 year old widow called the AARP Fraud Watch Network after accepting a free trial offer for skin cream she had seen a famous personality touting on television. She had no idea she needed to cancel after receiving the free trial. She was sent more product at a cost of \$200 and is fighting to return the product and get her money back.

HOW IT WORKS:

- ◆ Free trial offers often lure you into accepting a free product or subscription, but require you to cancel after receiving your offer.
- ◆ When you don't cancel, you received more product, whether it's face cream or magazines, and you're stuck with the bill.
- ◆ Often the fine print makes it very difficult to cancel in time to avoid a charge.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

- ◆ Unfortunately, the tactics are generally legal, unless the seller fails to disclose that you will be charged following the free offer.
- ◆ These kinds of offers are all over the place, so be very careful to read the fine print before accepting a free trial or simply decline the offer.

- ◆ It's a good idea to search online for reviews about the company offering the free trial— you can learn a lot about potential customer service issues this way.
- ◆ Review your credit card statement regularly. Keep an eye out for unauthorized charges.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

- ◆ If an unauthorized change appears on your statement, don't call the toll free number next to it to dispute the charge. Rather, call your credit card company's customer service number to report it. You'll have a better chance of canceling out the charge this way.
- ◆ If you get caught in this trap, file a consumer complaint with the Federal Trade Commission and the Better Business Bureau.
- ◆ When it comes to fraud, vigilance is our number one weapon. You have the power to protect yourself and your loved ones from scams.

Is there a right way to fall?

Of course, avoiding a fall is best. But if you feel yourself about to take a tumble, there are things you can do to help lower the chances of a serious injury.

For Instance:

- ◆ Crouch down. That way you won't have as far to tumble.
- ◆ Try to relax your body, instead of going stiff.
- ◆ Try to fall on the fleshy parts of your body—for example, on your bottom,
 - ◆ not your side.

If you do fall, it's best not to get up right away. Take a moment to make sure you haven't injured yourself, especially your head. If you are concerned, call for help. If you think you are OK, scoot or crawl to a couch or chair. Then use it to support yourself as you get back up. If you have a headache, feel dizzy or are in pain, talk with your doctor right away. **Help fall-proof your home. Watch simple steps to help you stay upright.**

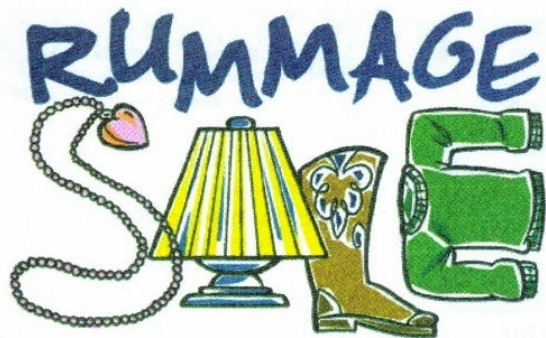

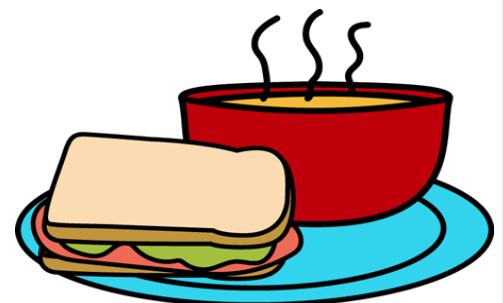

WHY?

I'll bet you didn't know all this information or even wanted to!

1. Why do men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's clothes have buttons on the left?

Answer: When buttons were invented, they were very expensive and worn primarily by the rich. Since most people are right-handed, it is easier to push buttons on the right through holes on the left. Because wealthy women were dressed by maids, dressmakers put the buttons on the maid's right. And that's where women's buttons have remained.

2. Why do ships and aircraft use "mayday" as their call for help?

Answer: This comes from the French word *m'aidez* meaning "Help me" and is pronounced, approximately, "mayday"

3. Why are zero scores in tennis called "love"?

Answer: In France, where tennis became popular, the round zero on the scoreboard looked like an egg and was called "*l'oeuf*", which is French for "the egg". When tennis was introduced in the US, Americans (naturally), mispronounced it "love".

4. Why do X's at the end of a letter signify kisses?

Answer: In the Middle Ages, when many people were unable to read or write, documents were often signed using an X. Kissing the X represented an oath to fulfill obligations specified in the document. The X and the kiss eventually became synonymous.

5. Why is shifting responsibility to someone else called "passing the buck"?

Answer: In card games it was once customary to pass on item, called a buck, from player to player to indicate whose turn it was to deal. If a player did not wish to assume the responsibility of dealing, he would "pass the buck" to the next player.

6. Why do people clink their glasses before drinking a toast?

Answer: In earlier times it used to be common for someone to try to kill an enemy by offering him a poisoned drink. To prove to a guest that a drink was safe, it became customary for a guest to pour a small amount of his drink into the glass of the host. Both men would drink it simultaneously. When a guest trusted his host, he would only touch or clink the host's glass with his own.

7. Why is someone who is feeling great "on cloud nine"?

Answer: Types of clouds are numbered according to the altitudes they attain, with nine being the highest cloud. If someone is said to be on cloud nine, that person is floating well above worldly cares.

8. Why were many coin collections jar banks shaped like pigs?

Answer: Long ago, dishes and cookware in Europe were made of dense orange clay called "pygg". When people saved coins in jars made of this clay, the jars became known as "pygg banks." When an English potter misunderstood the word, he made a container that resembled a pig. And it caught on.

Origin of The Easter Bunny

The Easter Bunny is a symbol that originated with the pagan festival of Eastre. The goddess, Eastre, was worshipped by the Anglo-Saxons through her earthly symbol, the hare or rabbit.

The date of Easter is determined by the moon whose symbolism is strongly tied to that of the hare. In fact, the hare is the symbol for the moon. Ever since the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D., Easter has been celebrated on the first Sunday following the first full moon after March 21st.

The Easter bunny was introduced to American folklore by the German settlers who arrived in the Pennsylvania Dutch country during the 1700s. The arrival of the "Oschter Haws" was considered "childhood's greatest pleasure" next to a visit from Christ-Kindel on Christmas Eve. The children believed that if they were good the "Oschter Haws" would lay a nest of colored eggs.

The children would build their nest in a secluded place in the home, the barn or the garden. Boys would use their caps and girls their bonnets to make the nests. The use of elaborate Easter baskets came later as the tradition of the Easter bunny spread through out the country.

Creamy Lemon {or Lime!} Bars

20 Nilla Wafers, finely crushed
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1/2 cup flour
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) cold real butter

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese
2 eggs, at room temp
2 Tbsp. flour
1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
powdered sugar

1 cup granulated sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
3 Tbsp. grated lemon peel, divided
1/4 tsp. Baking Powder



Preheat oven to 350°F. Line 8-inch square baking pan with foil, with ends of foil extending over sides of pan. Spray lightly with non-stick spray and set aside.

In a bowl, combine Nilla Wafer crumbs, 1/2 cup flour and the brown sugar. Chop butter into small pieces and then cut into crumb mixture with a pastry blender. Press crumb mixture firmly onto bottom of prepared pan. Bake 15 min.

While crust is cooking, beat cream cheese and granulated sugar with electric mixer on medium speed until well blended. Add eggs, vanilla, 2 Tbsp. flour, and baking powder; mix well. Blend in 1 Tbsp. lemon zest, and lemon juice and then pour mixture over crust.

Bake 25 to 30 min. or until center is set. Cool completely. Cover and refrigerate at *least* 2 hours, but preferably overnight. These bars improve with time. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and remaining 2 Tbsp. grated lemon peel just before cutting into squares to serve. Store leftover squares in refrigerator. (As if you'll have leftovers!)

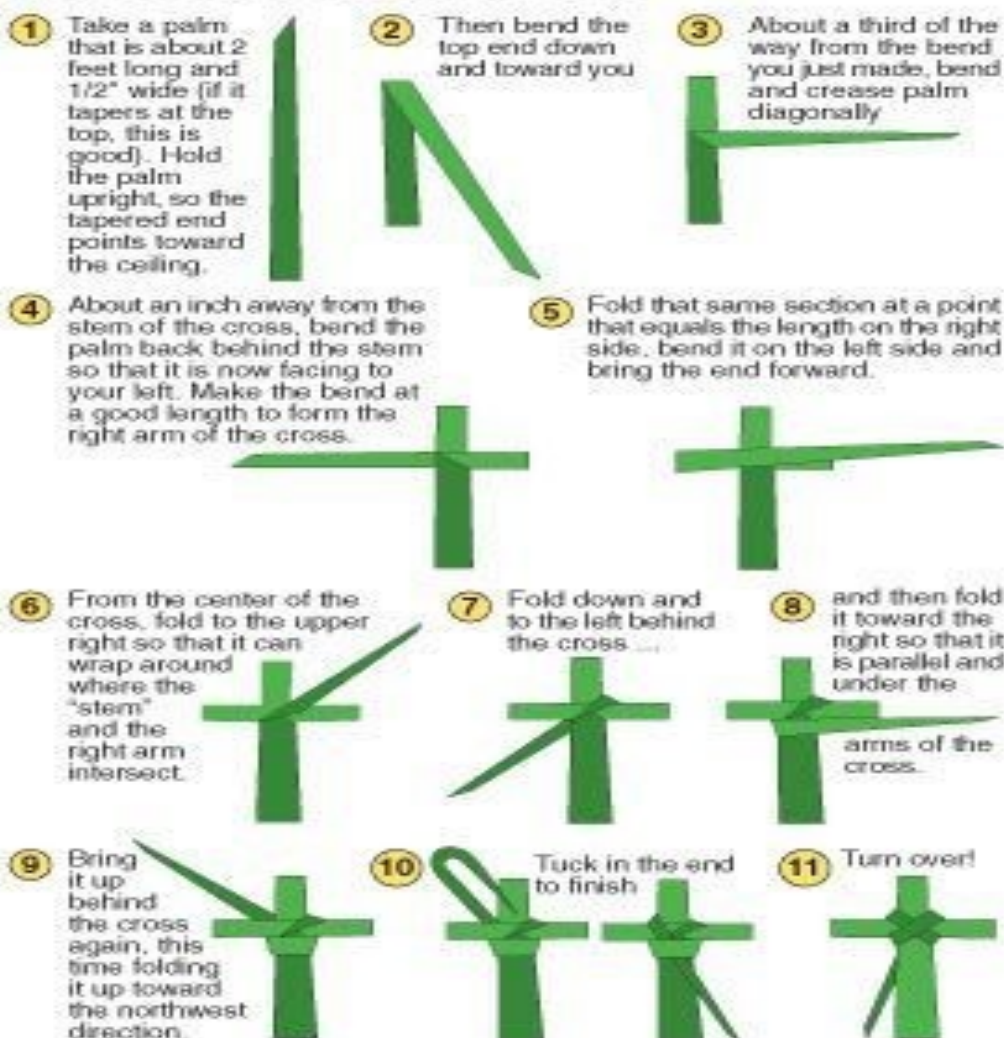

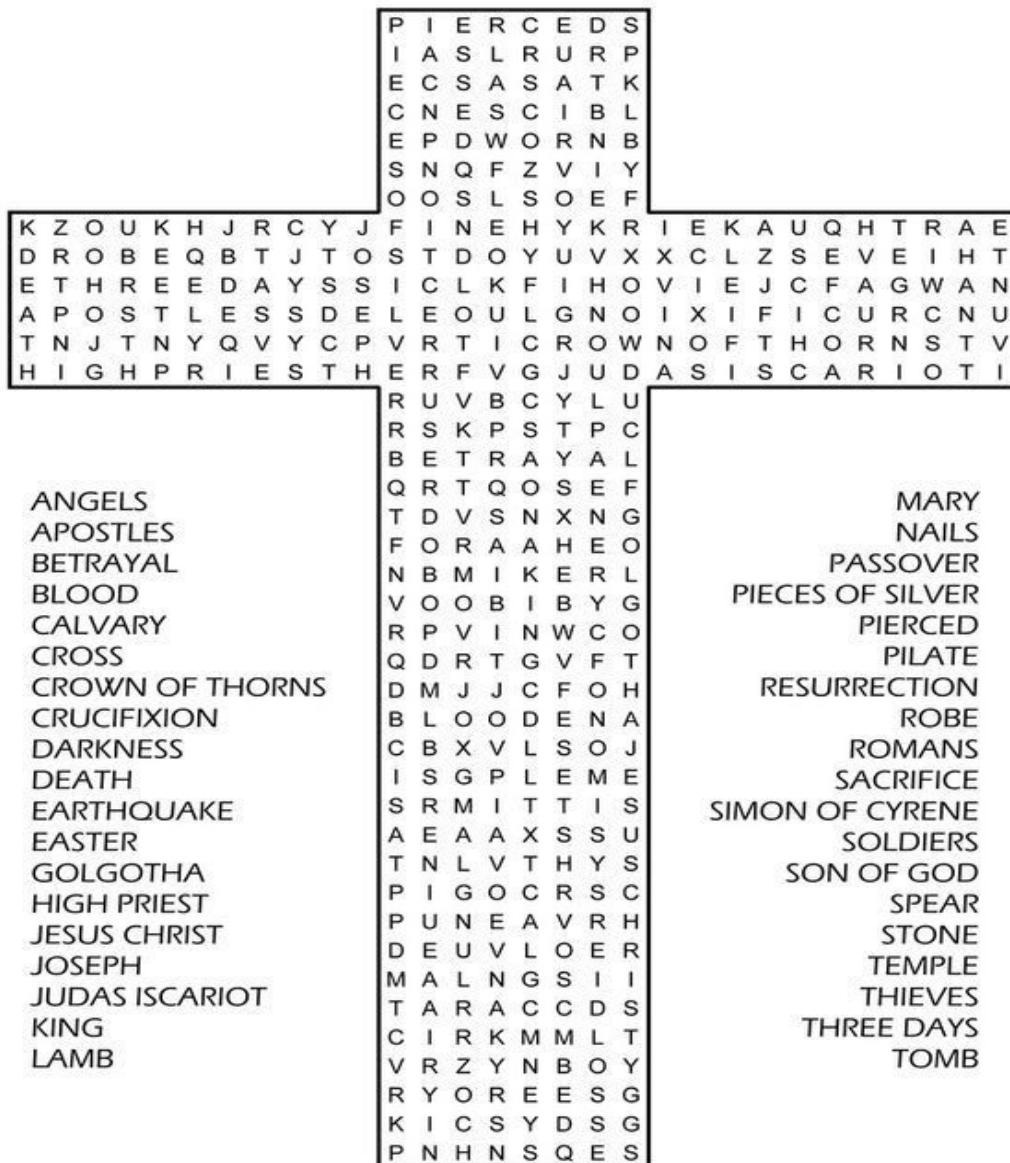
