Dear Friends,



I have been thinking about the many ways we are different. The words from my Church History professor, Dr. Terry Todd, have been echoing in my head these last few weeks. Professor Todd would say “things were *different*—not right or wrong—*just different*.” So much of the time we measure what is different from our habits, our culture, and our way of doing things as either wrong or bad. In reality, they are *just different*. For example, the foods that are eaten in Nigeria are different from the foods eaten in the US. This does not make the foods good or bad—*just different!*

Some people like to worship in the traditional setting and others like to worship in more informal ways, like our Prayer & Praise. Neither is right or wrong—*just different!* Pastors come in all kinds, shapes and styles— not right or wrong—*just different!* Denominations—United Methodist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Catholic, Episcopalian, etc, have certain ways of celebrating communion and baptism along with other traditions that are different—not right or wrong—*just different!* Rev. Rukera has been with us for three weeks, I have found that we do some things very differently—not right or wrong—*just different!*

In our differences we find variety which enriches our lives. We think in boarder terms with new possibilities. When we respect our differences, we use our energy to make something happen or to create something new rather than trying to have people do it our way. As we celebrate our differences—not right or wrong—*just different*—we become a richer, more vital church for Jesus Christ.

Safe Sanctuary



We love our children and are concerned for their safety. The 1996 General Conference of the United Methodist Church mandated that each church have a policy and training for children/youth workers and employees to ensure the safety of the children in their charge. Caton UMC began this process with Pastor Betty Bement by installing windows in the classroom doors. Many steps toward the final policy and training have taken place between then and now.

Pastor Beth, Nancy Huber and Marcia Ritter attended a full day workshop a year ago to learn what a safe sanctuary is, why it is needed, and how to write a policy. After meetings, discussions and guidance from our conference Safe Sanctuary leaders a policy was written. That policy was presented to Church Council and approved at the Caton UMC Church Conference in October of 2008. Marcia Ritter went to more training to become a trainer so she can lead us, and other churches in the training of people who wish to work with children and youth.

25 people attended the first training May 31 at Caton UMC. Marcia explained the reasons, and gave statistics showing the need for such a process. The people who wished to work with the children and youth at Caton completed the required paperwork that will be kept in a Confidential Personnel file at the church.

We pray that we will never have an incident at Caton UMC. We need to have a policy to follow if one does occur. It will protect not only the children but also the adults working with them. Being a Safe Sanctuary will deter those who might come here wishing to harm our children.

Can You Help ?

Want a snack, just go to the cabinet or refrigerator and (you) have a snack between meals or in the evening. 250 families in the Caton - Lindley area have no snacking foods and depend upon food stamps and your gifts of food, paper products and soaps to get by week to week. If you sincerely want to help these families with a little food, simply bring one item to church each Sunday. Should each of those who attend church on an average Sunday bring just one item we would have 112 items to pass on to those in need.

The cost of one item is not expensive compared to the help it will give the 250 families in need. Give up the chips, crackers, cookies and soda for one week a month to help those who are struggling to feed their children and themselves. We can all help with supplying food items and not feel guilty of not feeding our children as those in need feel.

Those in need who can receive food stamps can only spend them on food items not, paper products or soaps. How would you handle taking care of a family with children without dishwashing soap, laundry detergent, tooth paste, or shampoo? It is not easy to survive today without paper towels, paper napkins and toilet paper.

Food items needed are spaghetti and pasta, spaghetti sauces, canned meats, tuna fish, gravies, all type of canned fruits and vegetables. Bring your one item a week into church and place it in the shopping cart. Should you forget to bring a item to church, there is a basket in the cart for a small donation of cash. \$1 will go a long way to purchase food by the Pantry of the Angels.

All food, paper product and soap items are taken weekly by Frank and Emma Mosch to the Pantry of Angels at the Presho United Methodist Church. Your gift will be used in a week or so after you place it in the shopping cart. If you or someone you know is in need have them contact Kim Snyder at the Pantry if Angels at 523 7715. Give to the 250 families with children in need in our area who have no full cabinet to feed the children this evening.
