A calling...

Not too long ago there was an ad for phone service that used the line, "Can you hear me now?" The people would take all kinds of position to get into hearing range. In the town of Caton, many of you know that cell phone service is limited. In my house I must be sitting or standing by my big picture window in the front to get any reception.

I often wonder if that is what God says to us. "Can you hear me now?" In the book of 1 Samuel, we read about Samuel when God calls to him. The Lord called out, "Samuel, Samuel." Samuel ran to Eli, his mentor, "Here I am!" Eli said that he had not called the boy. So Samuel went back to bed. Once again he heard the call, "Samuel, Samuel." So he went back to Eli, again Eli said that he had not called him. This happened a third time and Eli realized that the Lord was calling Samuel. He told Samuel if there was another call to respond with these words, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." And God spoke to Samuel.

God speaks to us! We sometimes must get in a place that we have reception. With caller ID when our phone rings we can decide if we want to talk that person. The same is true with God. We decide if we will pick up the call. We have to spend time with God if we what to hear the message. Our hearts must be open to hearing God's call. You see, God usually calls us out of our comfort zone—that is God calls us to do something new! As I have explained to some of you, God has called me back to Nigeria. It is not a whim or something that I have thought up —God has called me to be a missionary with the people of Nigeria. God calls us and we have to decide if we will say yes! What is God calling you to do?

Annual Conference to be held May 28-30, 2009

The annual conference is described by the church's *Book of Discipline* as the "basic unit" of the church. The United States has 63 annual conferences, supervised by 50 bishops. There are 59 annual conferences outside the United States, which are supervised by 18 bishops. An annual conference is comprised of local churches, which are organized into districts. A district is a geographical division with approximately 50 local churches, but this number varies in each annual conference. Each district has a district superintendent who provides leadership within the district and the annual conference. We are in the North Central New York Conference and our District Superintendent is Rev. Dr. Richard Barton.

Organizational body—The annual conference has a central office and professional staff that coordinate and conduct ministry and the business of the conference. Our central office is in Cicero, New York.

Annual Conference sessions--Each year, all clergy members and an equal number of lay members selected from the local churches attend their conference's Annual Conference session, which may last 3-5 days. The bishop presides over these meetings. Bishop Marcus Matthews will preside at the North Central New York Annual Conference May 28-30, 2009 held in Liverpool, New York. Myrna Hawbaker is the Lay Member to Conference from Caton UMC. Mort Gridley, Jr will be a member at large (Equalization member). The members will worship, celebrate ministry and do the business of the church together.



Red Bird Mission Trip

July 18-25 is the week set aside for our Red Bird team to join with three other teams from New Jersey and head to Kentucky. Red Bird Mission and Clinic strives to meet these needs through ministry in five areas: Education, Health and Wellness, Community Outreach, Economic Opportunity, and Community Housing Improvement." Helping Hands~Helping Others

Our church just finished a mission week in our hometown of the Caton area. No one wanted to travel this year for whatever reason so we did a local mission. This is the first time and it was awesome. There were kids and adults from 9 to 80 helping in one way or the other. People arrived at 8am and packed lunches and we gathered for devotions and job assignments and then picked the tools needed and left with our crews of from 3 to 8 people depending of job and skills needed. We returned about 4:30 cleaned up, had supper while talking about what we had done, the people we met and where we had seen Jesus that day. Over the week we met and got to know a

number of new folks from our area. Some built a 48 foot ramp, raked lawns, stripped 4 layers of shingles off one side of a roof and installed new sheathing and shingles.

Others repaired a roof on a trailer, installed a new fence for an elderly couple with a dog which can now go outside and run, repaired and replaced spindles on a porch so the woman can allow the kids on the porch without having to be outside with them every minute, installed a new exterior door and so on. Other team members prepared meals, packaged frozen vegetables at the Food Bank of the Southern Tier, worked at the Pantry of Angels and put together 31 health kits. The best part is we got to know those who attend our church better, especially the youth. What an awesome week!

Thanks to all who worked, for all who prayed and for those who contributed financially to make this week long mission event a success!

Jessica Teeter shares her thoughts, "I would recommend that others go on a mission trip like Helping Hands~ Helping Others because mission trips are probably one of the most rewarding experiences you can ever have. When I go on a mission trip I feel like I usually benefit more than the people I worked for did. I believe that a gift is not a gift if you expect something back. Not many people are humble enough to just let you do something for them out of love, and it's really nice to be able to truly give someone a gift and have it all be in the name of Jesus. I don't know why but truly giving someone something gives you a huge amount of personal satisfaction. Even though I could have been in Myrtle Beach laying in the sun and getting a nice tan, it was nice to get to know my church family a little better while helping others with the few things that I could do. I couldn't believe the thanks that came from the people we helped out. One woman was near tears because we painted some rooms in her house and her shed and even walked her dogs. By helping people out on a mission trip, I forever became a part of their life and they will always remember our group's kindness.

Not that vacations are a bad thing or anything like that, but if I would have been in Myrtle Beach no one would have been likely to remember me after I left and I certainly wouldn't have made a very large impact in many people's lives. That's why everyone should go on a mission trip at some point in their lives because even if you are not the most physically capable or knowledgeable person in the world you can make a lasting impact on someone's life and they will remember your kindness."

With so many in our area losing their jobs as a result of the serious economic down turn, help is imperative in supplying food, soaps and paper products. In the Caton-Lindley area alone there are over 250 families a week that need our help. Many of these families include children and the elderly. You can do so much good by bringing to church just one item a week. When shopping pick up an extra item for the "Pantry of Angels" to distribute. Each week your generosity will help and it takes just a little effort from us. If everyone can bring just one item a week we would have over 112 items in the food shopping cart for that week, or simply drop a dollar in the basket, your support will go a long way in feeding those without jobs at this time.

Our food items are taken to the "Pantry of Angels" in Presho by Frank & Emma Mosch for distribution. Food items needed are: pasta, sauces, soups, canned goods (including meats), tuna fish, gravies, canned vegetables and canned fruits. Paper products are: paper towels, paper napkins and toilet paper. Soap items are: hand soap, dish washing soap, cleaning detergents, shampoos and tooth paste.

The way the food stamp program is structured they cannot purchase soap or paper products with food stamps. When there is very little cash that must cover heating costs and the everyday living costs, any help is very much appreciated.
