They do not want any religious influence in the celebration. ‘What’s Christ got to do with Christmas?’ is their view.”

I don’t mean to say we *want* Christ out of Christmas. It’s just that Christmas has become so much more than the celebration of the Savior’s birth. We, along with the world, can easily lose focus of what is important. Rather than seeing Christmas as a tremendous blessing, we view it as a burden – another day we have to clean the house, bake cookies, buy gifts, and go to all those programs...

Again this year we are blessed to make Christ the biggest part of our CHRISTmas celebration. Midweek Advent Services will “Prepare the Way” for our grand celebration of the newborn King. Do come and be a part of either our Wednesday morning or evening Services. Our theme, “Prepare the Way” will indeed do just that. Our anticipation of Christmas will have God’s people “Rejoicing in the Way” of our Lord. Amazing how much our Lord loves us – to be like us – to live as we live – to die for us.

Our Lord’s birthday celebration at Christmas “Prepares the Way” for Jesus to take on all your sins at the cross. Christ doesn’t get in the way of our celebration of Christmas. He IS the celebration of CHRISTmas. May the celebration of the newborn King in His Holy House this Christmas be a blessing to you and yours.

A King Well Ahead of His Time

St. Athanasius was a 4th century bishop from Alexandria and a champion of the Nicene (and that is to say, the truly universal Christian) faith. The extensive Athanasian Creed (LSB 319-20), which gives a lengthy explanation of the Holy Trinity, was named in his honor, though probably not written by his pen. However, one known work attributed to Athanasius is *De Incarnatione Verbi Dei* ("On the Incarnation of the Word"), which is always appropriate for this time of year. This early church father says in this work: "What king that ever was, before he had strength to call 'father' and 'mother,' reigned and gained triumph over his enemies?"

It's paradoxical (to say the least) to think of the reality of God dwelling in human flesh, even as a helpless infant. The God who created and sustains the universe and everything therein, who rescued his people from Egypt, who destroyed hundreds of thousands of his people's enemies--this God now rests in a manger, unable to say "father" or "mother." His resurrection and victory over death were long prophesied, even in the Garden of Eden (Gen. 3:15) to mark Him as a King well ahead of His time.

Christ's birth was unlike any other birth. Of the great patriarchs, Abel was born of Adam, Noah of Lamech, Abraham of Terah, Isaac of Abraham, Jacob of Isaac, David of Jesse, Solomon of David: each of these great men had a father to whom he could point as the maker of his existence, in part. But who was born of a virgin only? "*Not by human flesh and blood, by the Spirit of our God, was the Word of God made flesh – woman's Offspring, pure and fresh.*" (LSB 332:2) After the time of Moses' birth, his parents hid him from the Egyptians. He was made known through the house of Pharaoh when he was discovered. David was virtually unknown by many in his neighborhood and Samuel until this prophet asked Jesse if he had another son. David was anointed and then all knew of him. But it was not only man who announced Christ's birth; a star also proclaimed that the God of God and Light of Light had come into the world.

St. John said at the beginning of his Gospel: "*The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made through Him, yet the world did not know Him. He came to His own, and His own people did not receive Him. But to all who did receive Him, who believed in His Name, He gave the right to become children of God, who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen His glory, glory as of the only Son of the Father, full of grace and truth.*" (John 1:9-14) In knowing Jesus Christ, His disciples truly knew God. The man Jesus Christ was the way in which God chose to reveal Himself. While there was infinitely more to know about God, He wanted to be recognized in a finite body. The same can be said of His disciples today. We receive Him, believe in His Name, and so have been given the right to become children of God. And while there still is infinitely more to know about our God, we still recognize Him in the infinite Word joined to finite things: water, bread, and wine distributed by finite men. Let us seek to know God more fully in these gifts in which we recognize Him.

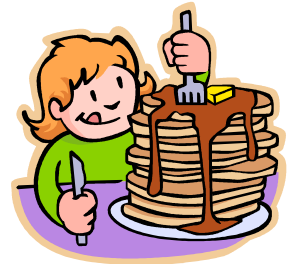

Lay Bible Institute — Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, will hold a four session Lay Bible Institute on the topic of "Are We Still Fighting the Crusades?" on Jan. 11, 18, 25, and Feb. 1, 2012 in Sieck Hall, Room 202 on the Seminary campus. Crusade is still a powerful word. Whether applied to current armed conflicts or used as anti-Christian polemic, certain ideas and images of the crusades seem to be alive and well. But what were the crusades, really? This course will define crusade, examine the religious origins of the crusading movement, recount the conquest of the Holy Land (as well as its subsequent loss), and explore the expansion of the crusading idea beyond the Middle Ages. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In response to concerns raised by members of the congregation regarding women's suffrage at Christ Lutheran, the Elders Committee began a study of the issue during their Spring retreat. It has been the practice at Christ Lutheran that only male members of the congregation are entitled to vote. This practice is dictated by Article IV of the Constitution.

After careful consideration and prayerful study, the Elders Committee resolved to hold a series of educational congregational studies led by our Pastors on the matter with the intent to hold a Voters Meeting to determine the congregation's will regarding this practice.

The Elders believe it is important for these meetings to include Christ Lutheran members only and therefore will not conduct them during our regular Sunday Bible Study but during a specially scheduled time. We plan to conduct these meetings in February and March of next year. Once these meetings are concluded, a Voter's Meeting would be held during the last week of April or first week of May.

Notes on the Liturgy #17 — Sanctus

The Sanctus is a rich burst of praise sung before the Lord's Supper. It continues the Preface. The Proper Preface concluded with the words, "Therefore with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven we laud and magnify your glorious name, evermore praising you and saying:" With that introduction, the Sanctus begins with the [cherubim's] praise found in Isaiah 6:3, "***Holy, holy, holy Lord God of Sabaoth (which is Hebrew for "heavenly hosts"); heav'n and earth are full of Thy glory..."***"

The church may be visibly separated by geography, language, false doctrine, time, death, etc. but we are in reality one body in Christ. In regard to the Lord's Supper Paul says, "Because there is one loaf, we, who are many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf (I Cor. 10:17)." Thus, we sing the angel's praise. We join with the angels and the whole church, for together we are one church. Outwardly we are divided but in Christ we are one body.

The Sanctus continues with the Benedictus that says, "Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest." These words are drawn from Psalm 118:25-26 and Matthew 21:9. Hosanna means, "save now" and became an expression of praise. Historically, it was customary for the Jewish Passover to end with the singing of Psalms 115-118. The Gospel of Mark tells us that Jesus and his disciples concluded the Passover/first Communion by singing a hymn (Mk 14:26). These are also the same words that the crowds greeted Jesus with as He triumphantly entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. They are the words used to greet the promised Messiah. It is no accident that this triumphant greeting is combined with the words of praise heard in the heavenly throne room. The combination of the "Holy, holy, holy" and the same words that the crowds greeted Jesus with on Palm Sunday serves as a confession that this Jesus who now comes to us in, with and under the bread and wine is the Triune God who Isaiah saw in the heavenly throne room.

Theologically, the last phrase of the Sanctus points us to the elements in Communion. Our 'Hosanna...Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord" finds its fulfillment in the reception of the Sacrament. Under the masks of bread and wine, Jesus comes to us and gives us His very own body and blood for our forgiveness. Interestingly, Reformed churches expunged this portion of the Sanctus for the very reason that they deny the truth of Jesus' words when He said, "This is my body, This is my blood." (Lutheran Worship History and Practice, pg. 422)

(The following information is from the Missouri District regarding Joplin.)

Current financial gifts given through the Missouri District have increased to \$148,152.80 (11/16/11). These gifts have been received by the Missouri District to aid Immanuel Lutheran Church to provide needed assistance to Joplin residents.

Trent Davis, Immanuel's director of disaster response, sent the following: "We have a couple of large projects in progress that are waiting on plumbing, HVAC and electricians, people who are licensed in other states can work on our projects as long as things are done to code. If we could make a special appeal that would be helpful, once the mechanicals are done there will then be inside work for teams to do Dec-Feb where we are also a bit thin on teams at the moment."
