Christmas Layer Salad

Ingredients:

- 1 (3 oz.) package Lime flavored gelatin
- 1/2 Cup cold water
- 2 (3 oz.) packages Cream Cheese, softened
- 1 (3 oz.) Lemon flavored gelatin
- 1 Cup boiling water
- 1 (3 oz.) package Strawberry flavored gelatin
- 1 Cup boiling water
- 1 (8 1/4 oz.) can crushed pineapple drained
- 1 Cup boiling water
- 1 Cup cold water
- 1 (17 oz.) can Apricots, drained or pureed

Directions:

Dissolve lime gelatin in 1 cup boiling water, stir in 1/2 cup cold water and pineapple. Pour into large ring mold that has been lightly oiled. Chill until firm.

Combine cream cheese and lemon gelatin; mix thoroughly. Add 1 more cup boiling water and 1 cup cold water. Cool: pour over first layer. Chill until firm.

Dissolve strawberry gelatin in third cup of boiling water. Stir in apricots. Cool, pour over lemon layer. Chill until firm. Unmold on large round tray covered with lettuce leaves.

OAK GROVE MISSION PROJECT

We had 31 people show up at the Oak Grove Baptist Church on November 9th to remove the brick from their parsonage. The brick was removed because the ground was constantly expanding and contracting, causing the brick to crack.

There were 7 of the churches from our association that provided workers for this task: Boekerton, FBC Hayti, Holland, Holly Grove, Lilbourn, Oak Grove, and FBC Portageville. There were 20 men and 11 women.

Five of our pastors came to help with this project: John Earl Dunavant from Holland, Dave Lewelling from Holly Grove, Greg Hunt from Pascola, Mike Loftin from Boekerton, and Allen Nichols from Lilbourn.

The Associational Moderator, Bill Clayton also put in a days work.

Terry Hawkins, from Lilbourn, brought his small John Deere front end loader to help move the brick.

Mr. Hoskins from Oak Grove, provided a large front end loader, dump truck, and 2 of his employees to haul the brick off of the property.

Several people brought wheel barrows, sledge hammers, crow bars, and other equipment to use in the task.

The association rented 2 demolition hammers from Mike's Rental in Sikeston.

Work began around 8:00 a.m.

Several men were using the equipment to break the brick loose while the other men and women gathered the brick and loaded wheel barrows and the front end loaders.

Around 11:30 a.m., we broke for lunch. The ladies of Oak Grove, with help from the Associational WMU, provided and served lunch. There were a large variety of soups, sandwiches, and desserts. The meal was great.

Around 4:00 p.m. we stopped working.

The brick on 3 sides of the parsonage had been removed. The east end remains.
