# Christianity as an 'inside out' lifestyle

"Our lives are a result of what we have become in the depths of our being—what we call our spirit, will, or heart. From there we see our world and interpret reality. From there we make choices, break forth into action, and try to change our world. That is why the greatest need of collective humanity is the renovation of our heart."

Dallas Willard and Jan Johnson, Renovation of the Heart in Daily Practice: Experiments in Spiritual Formation, p. 15

The Bible reveals that our Creator measures and values on a different scale than we do, paying attention to very different factors and criteria. In fact, it is safe to say that 'reversal' is God's most common way of interacting with us. Think "the last shall be first" and remember how Jesus persistently chooses to spend his time not with religious leaders but outcasts. Adam and Eve 'fall from grace' but are clothed and watched over as they move from the protective, limiting space of the Garden into the larger world. In both the Old and New Testaments, faithful couples late in life are blessed with children (Abraham and Sara, Zechariah and Elizabeth). When God sends Samuel to find a replacement for Saul, it is the runt of the family, David, who is chosen, just as God chose a murderer to free the chosen people from their captivity in Egypt, perhaps freeing Moses in the process from his guilt and embarrassment over first looking the other way for years as he lived in the luxury of Pharaoh's family while his own people were abused as slaves and then killing a slave-driver in a moment of hot indignation. Just as significantly, we can trace the course of slow movement over millennia of shaping those chosen to be the Divine Demonstration Project toward an ever-deepening understanding of Who God Really Is and what 'right relationship' means and requires.



For Abraham, it seems the only real requirement was the readiness to go where he was sent, until that fateful moment when he was used to transform the meaning of child sacrifice from killing the child to giving one's life to bring children into healthy maturity. Rather than ending life, Abraham and the descendants of the Promise were called into the struggles of long-term, committed relationships, with all the heartaches of watching their children battle for positions of preference, believing any love shown to a sibling meant a lessening of the love remaining for them. Through victory and captivity, the people tried to figure out how to please their God, coming back again and again to the rulebooks that seemed to suggest a transactional relationship with God through which rewards could be purchased by shallow obedience to the letter of an ever-growing list of 'thou shalls' and 'thou shall nots."

And then came Jesus, who not only turned all those rules upside down but also tried again and again to draw attention away from external appearances to focus on internal transformation of the heart, soul and will. As Richard Rohr describes it, the move takes us away from the 'cleaning up' model of right relationship, in which the primary goal is getting others to live more morally pure lives by instituting punishments in the here and now and threatening eternal, conscious punishment in the life to come, to lives of 'waking up' to the joy, beauty and freedom from fear that results from changed hearts. Of course, when we are transformed within, others will notice changes in our behavior as well. Less a single-minded dedication to perfect living, and more joy, peace and an outward focus that considers how others are faring in life.

We still struggle, even with all the potential advantages of accumulated wisdom, to truly believe we are forgiven. Our religion too often still teaches a simplistic message that focuses more on the dangers of failing our God than encouraging a more complex, deeper and far more Christlike, joyful response to our salvation. Rather than making more and more space within the depths of our being for Christ to transform us, we fall back on the failed strategy of coercing others to submit to an understanding of the Bible as God's rulebook rather than a long, deep love letter meant to wake up the very best of who we are created to be.

God's rule, as Jesus so clearly states and demonstrates, is a 'rule' of love. May we commit ourselves more and more to the simple but challenging process of allowing the Spirit to work in and through us to enliven the Christness we each carry.

#### The Final Financial Quarter

Therefore, we are asking all of you to check that you are current with your pledged giving, and if possible, to dig a little deeper so we can finish the year on a sound financial basis.

Remember, while your dollars may be given to the church, it is really your response to a loving God who gives us all of life's blessings!

The UMW will be looking at how they can work with or in support of CASC to accomplish shared goals and areas of ministry focus.

#### STEPPING FORWARD IN FAITH

By now most, if not all, of you should have received a letter from your finance team about the stewardship drive for 2020 (if you haven't, please contact the church office at 360-424-3628). Included with that letter is a form for you to fill out. **BUT WAIT!** Before you fill it out (or put it aside or throw it out), here are a few things to consider:

As I wrote in the September newsletter (what??? You didn't read it??? You don't remember it??? Well, you're in luck, because I'm going to repeat it!) "Our church is truly at a crossroad. We can dwell on the negative (dear elderly members dying, mainline churches struggling, a world rocked by violence, political struggles, etc.). Or we can move forward, recognizing that this could be an exciting moment, with several new opportunities arising. We have a dedicated staff, and a wonderful laity group of committed volunteers. Your Church Council has been working to address the question of what is our vision for the next 5 – 10 years, and where do we feel God calling us to be in ministry here in Skagit County!"

If you are wondering why you need to pledge instead of just giving on a regular basis, imagine how hard it would be in your personal life if you had NO idea what your income was going to be! Pledges allow your finance team to estimate what dollars we are going to have to work with for 2020. Remember that a pledge is not a binding legal document. It is simply your estimate of what you hope to give to the church in the coming year. Any additional giving or gifts are a pleasant surprise (& always welcome!) In this modern world, we even have the option of using your credit card & auto pay.

How can you give money if you have no idea where that money is going to go and what motivates those numbers? We recognize that it may feel more rewarding to give to a special cause, like flood relief or diapers for needy children. However, if we don't keep the church functioning, none of that is possible. That is why we encourage <u>everyone</u> to attend one of these short meetings where finance questions will be answered and a proposed 2020 budget will be available:

Monday, October 28th at 7:00 pm

Wednesday, October 30<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 pm

Sunday, November 3<sup>rd</sup> following the 10:30 worship, with a free potato feed luncheon

We have purposely selected an evening, an afternoon, and a post-worship time, in the hopes that one of these will be convenient for everyone.

Finally, the most important part of a stewardship campaign is **PRAYER**! Before you fill out that form, please spend a few minutes thinking about all the ways the Lord has blessed you. He gives us everything, and only asks for a tenth (tithe) in return! He is counting on us to do his work here in this place, at this time. Take time to pray and then fill out your pledge form, keeping the top portion for your records, and turning the bottom portion in, by either dropping it in the offering plate or bringing/mailing it in to the office. November 17<sup>th</sup> will be Stewardship Sunday when we will celebrate your responses.
