PASTOR'S CORNER

A few people commented on the sermon Sunday. People said that they had never thought about the truth that we truly don't own or possess anything. I'm glad that got their attention. I hope we all think about this Biblical truth. Whoever we are, whatever we do, we grasp our existence and our abilities and our possessions for the span of our lives and no more. All that exists belongs to God and it is on loan to us while we are here. I used the example of my ability to read and write. I'm proud of that ability, but I didn't invent the alphabet or write the whole body of literature that has been composed. If someone hadn't taken time and effort to teach me, that whole world of imagination and creativity would be shut tight to me.

If I enjoy reading a good book, there are so many thousands of people that I need to thank for the experience that I can't even begin the task. It's not hard at all if we stop and think about it that way, to see how nobody gets to take credit for much of anything. All we can do is add individual touches and unique variations to the themes that are already out there. Those expressions are so delightful and so inspiring all by themselves that when we stop to think about everything that they rest upon, our minds are exhausted by the depth and the breadth of what has been given to us before we even thought to ask.

There is no doubt that everything I do today is built on the achievements of others in the past. If I stretch my mind out into the future, that experience is just as rich. If I think about what is yet to be fulfilled, I'm soon lost in thoughts about how limitless the possibilities that lie ahead of us are as well. Think for a minute about this truth. Everything that we needed to put a man on the moon was on the earth the first day of creation. What other mysteries and possibilities are waiting to be unpacked by the people who dare to set out to fulfill a dream? That is a tremendous gift as well.

I think it's liberating to understand that it doesn't all depend on me. The march of history and progress is something that we get to participate in and contribute to. We get to benefit from it and we have the privilege of passing it along to others when our time is done. It is not a negative at all that I am participating in something that is much larger than myself and that I have no claim upon. It is a tremendous privilege to take part in something like that. I've used the story of my participation in the construction of a school building one summer during seminary. I get to drive by that school every now and then and I'm glad that I get to be a part of the nurture and cultivation of young minds.

I love that I can see how the things I have done have been taken and used by others in ways that I would never have thought to use them. In the summer of 2012, some folks that I had worked with when I pastored in Augusta, GA stopped by to visit. It was so gratifying to hear that something that I put energy and thought into creating and got to take part in from the beginning, Presbyterian-led summer day camps for children living in housing projects, was still taking place.

What we do matters, and who we get to help along the way makes a difference. We do it largely because it gives us the opportunity to get outside of ourselves, and to be a part of something that is larger and more lasting than we are. When we do those



SEPTEMBER SESSION MINUTE HIGHLIGHTS

- There was no Session held in August.
- The membership transfers of Henry and Beth Ohlandt to Barnwell Presbyterian Church were approved. The membership transfers of Marlee Tonks and Eric Dennis from Pennsylvania were approved.
- The wedding of Katherine McKinney and William Guerin will be held 26 April 2014 in our sanctuary.
- The wedding of Eric Dennis and Marlee Tonks was held on 7 September 2013 in the church sanctuary. Rev. Dennis officiated. A reception followed at the Manse.
- Body and Soul Fitness will be conducting exercise classes in the Omni on Tuesday and Thursday mornings and "boot camp" exercise classes on Monday and Thursday evenings for eight weeks. They will pay \$15 per class to help cover utilities.
- Use of the Omni on 16 November 2013 for a Seniors Banquet was approved for the applicable event fee of \$600.
- Use of the Omni on 30 November 2013 for a birthday party was approved for the applicable event fee of \$600.
- Stewardship and Finance The church was approximately \$30,000 short of funds needed as of 11 August 2013. Committee work on the Fall Giving Program will start soon.

- Building and Grounds The new septic tank drain field for the Omni is finished. Also, the Manse was power washed and various repairs made.
- Christian Education Twelve children attended our Vacation Bible
 School which went well. The children really enjoyed Rev. Dennis, Jay
 Davis, Kathy Fritz and Jo Ringer as
 historic figures who each introduced
 various Bible stories. The Preschool
 has five fulltime and three part-time
 students. The Sunday School curriculum has been ordered.
- Discipleship A Congregational survey is being finalized. Options to update the church directory will be researched.
- Nurture 25 people attended the 5
 September 2013 Nurture Dinner and
 22 people attended the 7 September
 2013 Men's Breakfast. There will not
 be an October Nurture Dinner due
 the busy October church schedule.
 Work continues on updating membership information for the mailing
 and birthday rosters.
- Elders Johnson, McCord, and Murray will end their terms in December 2013. Elders Murray and Manus were elected to the Nominating Committee. A Congregational Meeting will be held on 29 September 2013 to elect a Nominating Committee member-at-large.

FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR

All God's Creatures:

There is an old children's song recently made "popular" once again by a well known Irish touring group called "All God's Creatures Got a Place in the Choir". You can find it on YOUTUBE on the internet in several versions. It proclaims that all things have a place in the choir. Indeed, if you sing there is a place in the choir for YOU! We need voices in all sections and now is the perfect time to join our "merry band of music re-creationists" as we have just begun working on music for the Homecoming/Manse celebration and for Christmas. Even if you want to join us ONLY for these 2 events...this is the time, and this is the place [Wednesdays at 6:00 P.M.; choir loft].

Harmony:

What is it? That question has been changing over the centuries as we ourselves have evolved in time. At first, music [vocal] consisted of a single note sung either with others or with instruments. An early example can be found in Gregorian Chant which gained mainstream popularity around the turn of the 21st century. One note "harmony" was based on the physical and scientific properties developed by the Greeks [approx. 500 B.C.]. Those basic principals still apply.

At some point additional notes became "the norm" with 2 different notes sounding at the same time. At first it was at the octave [same note either higher or lower] and then other notes at the fifth or fourth above/below the principal

note. Both of these "harmony" innovations are based on the scientific/physical properties of the Greeks.

What we think of as "real" or "modern" harmony began when three notes were sounded together. We have J.S. Bach to thank for the ultimate expression of this "modern" style harmony. He took the concept and developed it into all that we know today. The sheer genius of this cannot be fully conveyed in even a single book...it would take many. His work finalized all modern harmony based on a 3 or 4 note chord.

At the beginning of the 20th century we began to expand the sounds or chords that we had accepted as harmonious. It began to include sounds that we hear in modern jazz or even rock music. So, our harmony palette has expanded greatly with numerous new combinations of many note chords.

But, what IS harmony? It is that grouping of sounds [notes stacked on top of each other] that are pleasing or interesting to our ears. We have at this point in our trek through time developed and come to enjoy some amazingly complex harmonies.

May the "chords and harmonies" of our lives be pleasing to God.
