Rector's Reflections

For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. -- Mark 6:18-20a

This is neither the first nor the last account of a prophet of God confronting the secular powers of the day and being killed for doing so. This prophetic tradition is thus thoroughly Biblical and, I would argue, nearly as fraught with danger as it was in Biblical times. No secular authority wants to be told "No" and in today's more tribal and divided culture, "bringing politics into the church" is often more divisive than a theological or worship-related discussion. Couple that with the fact that, in many instances, Christians of good will have a diversity of political opinions, and one must tread lightly in the political arena!

That said, we also need to ask not only "What would Jesus do?" but "What would John the Baptist do?" as we think about the issues of the day. I would wager that neither Jesus nor John would condone the separation of families that has been occurring at our Southern border nor the incarceration of families seeking asylum (a legitimate and legal path to residency). Whatever the politics surrounding the immigration issue, the question of what God's will is in this situation ought to give us at least pause, if not trouble us. --Tom+


