Well, it's been so long since we have been able to get together is seems like a month of Sundays . . . Oh wait, it has been a month of Sundays! Actually, it has been a bit over a month.

There has been a lot of discussion about whether all this quarantine stuff is constitutional or not. While advising people on how to stay safe and use caution would likely have been very well received, the heavy handedness and restrictions being enforced upon the people is what has angered many. I must say, I would likely have been a lot more cooperative myself if the government had suggested, and advised, but left it up to me to decide, rather than telling me had to do something, or that I cannot do something.

And already, some who are reading this are thinking of Romans 13 and other passages that tell us to obey our civil authorities for they are ordained of God. That is true. But it is not the whole truth. Almost as frustrating as the government decrees are those who follow them without question. There are at least five times in Scripture when people disobeyed the government – they practiced civil disobedience – and in so doing they were completely within the will of God and most were honored/blessed for it.

- 1. The Egyptian mid-wives who refused to slaughter the male babies of the Jews
- 2. The soldiers who refused to kill Jonathon in spite of King Saul's command
- 3. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abed-Nego when they refused to bow to the stature
- 4. Daniel, when he prayed even though there was a decree to not pray for 30 days
- 5. Queen Vashti rejecting the king's order to show her beauty at the banquet
- 6. Peter and John when they preached Jesus in spite of the restrictions from the Sanhedrin

In each of the above examples, those committing civil disobedience recognized that the civil authority was legitimate, and they sought to show honor even while maintaining that their allegiance was to a higher authority.

Each of us must evaluate our own life from time to time, and ask ourselves why we do what we do. That which motivates us, that which we seek to obey, is our authority. Sometimes, if we are not careful, we can allow ourselves to be our own authority. Other times we may allow the scrutiny of others to be our authority. Perhaps something else has become the authority in your life.... But ultimately, is Jesus – as revealed to us in the Scriptures – you're highest authority? Do we really forsake all else in our pursuit of obedience to Him?

As we begin to move past this most recent disruption of our lives and even society, before we settle into the same routines as before, ponder who you will submit to, and what that realization may mean for you....

#### Turn It Off and Turn It Back On

In addition to being a pastor, I drive a school bus. (I am so very blessed to have not one, but two jobs that I truly love.) It has become somewhat of a joke among our drivers: When something goes wrong, the standard solution is, "Turn your bus off and turn it back on." Surprisingly, that does cure many problems!

Lately I have been praying a lot about where we as a church go from here. Our church has done a great job staying in touch with each other and helping each other when possible. I am proud of them. But otherwise, the coronovirus has brought just about everything to a stand-still in our church. Our regular weekly and monthly activities have been put on hold for several weeks. This is true of many churches.

I have come to think that perhaps this is not a bad thing after all. Like a school bus, a computer problem often has the same solution: "Turn it off and turn it back on." I believe we have been given a perfect opportunity to "reboot" as a church.

Too often what most churches do can become routine and ritualistic. People arrive Sunday mornings with preset ideas of what is going to occur. We have announcements. We have a prayer or two. We sing songs. We take up an offering. We listen to a sermon. We have an invitation. We go home. It's how we do things. It's that with which we are comfortable. It's what is expected.

Now please understand me, I am not being critical. I pastor a great church. The people love God, one another, and their pastor. Great unity and harmony characterize our family. They truly want God's will. In this positive context I believe we have been given a terrific opportunity to take a step back, reevaluate what we have been doing, and start afresh and anew.

Our church has been praying that God will move in our midst in miraculous ways. We are asking Him to do something extraordinary. It's what we believe God wants. It's what we want. That has become our church's eager and prayerful hope and expectation.

Remember: Moses had a reboot in his life. After 40 years of wilderness solitude God then used Him in powerful ways. Joseph had a reboot in his life. After years in slavery and imprisonment God then used Him in powerful ways. David had a reboot in his life. He spent years hiding from Saul before God then used him in powerful ways.

Hopefully we will begin functioning very soon. Are we willing to risk changing? Are we willing to abandon routine and ritual so God can then use us in powerful ways? Are willing to do something completely new and different?

I believe we would be foolish if we missed this opportunity to "reboot." We would be foolish to hope that things get back to "normal." We would be foolish to return to "business as usual."

With much prayer and great humility let us ask God what HE now wants to do, what He now wants US to do.
