

Greetings Dear Ones,

On Easter Sunday, there are two traditional rituals that collide with each other. In Christian homes where small children dwell, there is a generational debate about which comes first:

The sunrise worship service.....OR

Scampering about the house while hunting for grass nests in baskets filled with multi-colored eggs and chocolate bunnies.

Yes, when Easter happens there are "secular" customs that are very often juggled together with faith customs. And when you really think about it, Easter, the secular custom, is really a bit bizarre, isn't it? There's this Easter bunny; a rabbit that has a nest of eggs. Without a doubt, rabbits do an exceptional job of carrying out the 'be fruitful and multiply' command. And yes, eggs are pretty darn perfect symbols of 'New Life' to come, but bunny rabbits don't lay eggs or make nests.

But children love the Easter bunny because the Easter bunny does not keep lists of who has been 'naughty or nice' like that Santa Claus guy. Sitting on that white-bearded Santa's lap is often a terrifying experience for small children, but hugging the Easter bunny is always a 'warm and fuzzy' experience. The Easter bunny comes to children every Easter without a policy for behavior. The eggs are left everywhere and hopefully they are easily found by even the smallest or the worst seeker. So, all the strange traditions that go along with the Easter bunny are kept alive and maybe even re-invented each and every year by our children.

Maybe, just maybe, we grownups should take a cue from our kids. The empty tomb on Easter morning presents Christians with a vision that has a lot in common with the Easter bunny. The basket is empty until those children become seekers and the eggs are found. That tomb of Jesus on Easter morning is empty, but God wants His children to be seekers, like Mary Magdalene, and to find our Risen Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

This year, here at Living Waters, neither of these two traditional rituals will be celebrated as we normally do, because of the necessity of social distancing and the uncertainty of what's coming next!
