


From the Pastor

MID-GULF CONFERENCE REPORT

Bill Steen, Karen Hoeppner, Kim Vaughan, and Jane Fundyga attended the Mid-Gulf Conference on October 12 at Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Venice. There were 80 people in attendance. The morning started with a Worship service followed by the annual business meeting.

The main theme was Vitality of the Church - how we get there and how to get us back to vitality and God's vision as the Church ages. The bell curve for Vitality starts on the left with God's Dream, God's Vision, Our Dream, and Vitality at the top while the right or descending side is Remembering, Wondering/Questioning, Anxiety and at the bottom Depression. It is recommended that we examine where we are every 5 years and try to bring the Church back to Vitality.

Most of us felt our Churches were in the stages of *Remembering* what used to be and *Anxiety* for the future of our Churches. Based on this information, we agreed that we need to take steps to return to *God's Vision*.

To do this we need to look at the hospitality of the Church, demographics of the people around the Church, and outreach to those around us.

Centering prayer is a step we can also take to get back to God's Vision. There is a phone app to help with this. It is recommended that you start with 2 minutes of prayer in the morning and 2 minutes in the evening and build up to 20 minutes each time.

A segment was discussed on Stewardship and the median giving is .62% and not the 10% tithe. The backgrounds of the presenters were as interesting as the meeting itself.

Prayer Shawl Ministry is now meeting on the third Wednesday of each month at 10 a.m. If you enjoy knitting and/or crocheting, or if you would like to learn, please join us. We create shawls and present them to members and friends of Living Waters who are ill, suffering or those who need a special blessing. TAX TIP—Giving your RMD to Charity

Individuals over 70 1/2 may give their required minimum distribution (RMD) from their IRA to any 503(1) charity such as our church and receive a tax benefit. The tax-free transfer from an IRA, not a 401-K, must be a direct transfer from the IRA to the charity by the administrator of your IRA, or if you have check-writing privileges for your IRA, you can write a check to the charity.

The tax benefits include: a) the RMD is not part of your adjusted gross income; b) you avoid the possibility of having the higher Medicare income surcharge which boosts your Part B and Part D premiums; c) less of your Social Security benefits are being taxed; and, d) you don't need to itemize your deductions to get the tax benefit from the gift.

Memorial Garden Upgrades

Living Water's
Memorial Garden was
created many years
ago and has been
maintained, with love,
ever since.

Through those years,

memorial bricks, statues, a granite Cross, sundial and of course plants have been added to the Garden.

Unfortunately, the Garden has experienced degradation due to climate and environmental conditions, time and even vandalism.

Approximately two years ago, I asked a group of concerned individuals to brainstorm ideas to improve the Memorial Garden. Our group was affectionately called The Friends of the Garden. Discussions went from recommended plant species, to weed populations, to the copious amount of work for something that is hardly used by the congregation. We are all creatures of habit. If you come to church every week and never enter from the east side door to the Narthex, you may not even know that Living Waters has a Memorial Garden. Our discussions then mainly focused on how we could get the congregation into the Garden, not to maintain it, but to enjoy it's beauty, tranquility and mission.

The concept of the original Garden was to keep the entire area as natural as possible, but we discovered that some people were afraid to enter the Garden because they had to walk over uneven concrete blocks, stepping stones and even grass. To allow access to the Garden by EVERY individual, including those using walkers and wheelchairs, we all agreed that a concrete walkway would be required.

After a year of coordination and planning, Phase I developed into a work project. After a few months of digging, installing forms, adding steel mesh and then pouring concrete, a walkway was created to allow everyone to enter and get to the center of the Garden.

Two existing memorial benches were relocated and permanently installed at the end of the walkway along with a beautiful Luther Rose stepping stone created by Gail LeClair that serves as the centerpiece of the Garden. Phase I was completed after installing a flag pole.

We are currently working on Phase II, which is the project to replace the front landscape edger with a two-foot high stone block entrance wall. The entrance wall will include top blocks and a seating area. The concrete foundation and three courses of stone blocks have already been lain. Construction has come to a stop for some required logistics, but will begin again in December. Phase II also includes plans to dedicate three small areas to be used to grow herbs mentioned in the Bible. These herb beds will be outlined with the same stone blocks used on the wall.

The Friends of the Garden have discussed plans to include a Phase III project for the Memorial Garden. This Phase III project may not be a guarded secret, however, it will not be introduced to the congregation until the completion of Phase II, sometime in January of 2020.

I greatly appreciate the dedication and support from The Friends of the Garden. This team of individuals has worked hard to ensure that all upgrades to the Garden have been appropriate to the Garden's mission and serves the entire congregation. Speaking of dedicated funds, I also appreciate and thank everyone who has contributed through the years to the Memorial Garden for reoccurring annual maintenance and these projects. Without your financial support, our discussions would have remained "just talk."

Phase I walkway materials cost approximately \$1,400.00. Phase II materials purchased and recently installed have cost approximately \$250.00. We will need to collect another \$200 by December 1 to complete the wall and install the seating area. Please consider supporting the Garden with dedicated funding for use in the garden only. If we collect more funds than required to complete Phase II, remaining funds will be appropriately used to maintain the Garden, purchase plants or put towards our Phase III project.

Everyone is welcome to take a stroll through and enjoy the upgrades to the Garden. While in the Garden, remember, "Say a prayer, pick a weed."





Safety Team News

The Safety Team has been making progress in several areas to help assure safety, security, and assistance to members of the congregation. As you may have read in an earlier Messenger edition or heard during a Sunday morning announcement, the Safety Team has various areas of responsibility.

This article discusses medical emergencies.

For quick identification purposes Safety Team badges have been purchased and will be worn by members of the Safety Team on Sunday mornings. In case of a medical emergency, various members of the team will summon medical assistance via the alarm system and will follow that up with a call to 9-1-1. Others will render aid to the stricken person, provide comfort to family members and direct emergency responders to the exact location where they are needed.

The first aid kit and AED have been moved to the narthex for more rapid retrieval in case of a medical emergency on Sunday morning during a service. Additionally, plaques showing the church address have been installed on interior walls at the exit doors. That was done to help provide the proper location of the church to the 9-1-1 center.

If you are retired from the medical field or were an EMT, paramedic or other health care provider, we can use your help in this area of responsibility.

Why do we light that tall skinny candle near the baptismal font some Sundays and not others? The Paschal candle is usually located near the baptismal font in most churches. This candle represents the resurrected Jesus among His people.

The candle is lit at Easter. If the church has an Easter Vigil Service which occurs the night prior to Easter morning this candle is processed into the church from darkness. It is the first light. This candle is a reminder that Jesus overcame death and the grave and He is among his people now.

This candle burns from Easter through Ascension. It is then extinguished. We also light it for Baptisms and funerals. The use of the Paschal candle at a Baptism visually reminds us of the connection between the sacrament of Baptism and the resurrection of our Lord. We are reminded that through Jesus' word and promises in Baptism we are raised to new life.

The Pascal candle is also lit at funerals. When you see a Paschal candle lit standing near a casket it is a reminder that this person was a Baptized child of God. The candle serves as a Continued on page 8
