We are not going to talk about just how to get out of the Dark Wood, as if life is good only when we are not there. We are going to explore what it might mean for our lives to recognize the gifts of the Dark Wood.

What if times of uncertainty, failure or emptiness are our

opportunities for spiritual awakening?

Open us to the possibility that even—or especially—in the midst of difficulty, loss and uncertainty we can find greater depth, deeper connection, and clearer vision.

Spiritual disciplines for Lenten walk

The season of Lent is often a period of our looking inward and setting aside time for contemplation. The Spring Worship Planning Team has a suite of programs prepared to assist you in your Lenten “Walk with God.” A sensory-rich worship program, Gifts of the Dark Wood, will guide our Sunday services, the Lenten Small Groups will provide an opportunity for fellowship and discussion around Scripture and Brian McLaren’s writings, and we encourage you to adopt your own, personal spiritual disciplines to deepen your Lenten walk.

The first spiritual discipline is to name **gratitude** each day. Some in our community have found it useful to write down things that they are thankful for just before going to sleep at night. Others prefer to jot them down on first awakening to set the tone for the day ahead. Or you

could mix it up, although it’s often easier to keep the discipline going if it’s given its own time within the rhythm of your days. You could write a paragraph of thanksgiving in a journal or keep a gratitude list. Let the Spirit guide you. Give yourself the lift that consciousness of our blessings gives one as we contemplate the passage of Jesus’ ministry, teachings, and sacrifice.

The second spiritual discipline you might want to explore is

Walking Meditation. Again, there are many ways to do it, and there is a lot of help on the internet. The primary focus is on the act of walking, slowly, keenly aware of the movement of your body and the environment within which you’re walking. Throughout history Christians have been drawn to pilgrimage, to walking, to using the physical act of movement to reinforce the spiritual activity

within. We will have the opportunity to walk labyrinth during Holy Week when labyrinth visits Calvin Hall. The outdoor labyrinth at Trinity Episcopal is also available to the public at any time. So as Lent approaches, consider these spiritual practices. Maybe they will hold a gift of the Spirit for you.

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Second Sunday education to feature pilgrimages

Each Monday evening, we need two overnight hosts, especially more men, to spend the night with the guests. In addition, we need help serving food and cleaning up the kitchen. Usually a simple soup meal is offered to warm and nourish people. Caroline Kirkman and Marilyn MacLean find it very helpful to have extra bodies helping them in the kitchen. Arrive as early as 7 p.m. before the shelter opens at 7:30. We are finished by lights-out at 9.

The shelter needs items such as instant oatmeal, snack foods, coffee, tea, and cough drops, and our guests always need socks and warm clothing. If you have coats, jackets, sweatshirts, gloves, hats, or scarves that you are no longer using, please consider donating them to the shelter.

End-of-year 2015 finance report

With thanks to all of the members and friends who have given generously this past year, I am happy to report that our 2015 income exceeded our expenses by almost \$3,000. And this is without using any of the \$13,444 savings we budgeted to use.

Ninety-seven percent of the pledged income was received, and over \$7,000 was received in additional end-of-year offerings from several people who had already completed their pledges.

Net income:	\$4,259
Net loan principal	<u>-\$1,328</u>
Final Net income:	2,931

The balance on our two loans was decreased by almost \$10,000 in 2015, leaving a current balance of \$63,940. Designated memorials and offerings for the sound system loan covered most of the 2015 payments.

With 2016 pledges \$10,000 below the amount received in 2015, it is expected that carryover funds will be needed to cover some of the 2016 expenses.

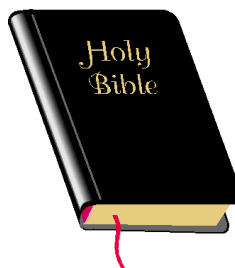
In times of trouble, may the Lord answer your cry.

Dr. John and Gwenda Fletcher will tell stories of their medical and educational mission in the Democratic Republic of Congo on Tuesday, February 2 in Calvin Hall. Dessert will be served at 7:15, followed by their program at 7:30. All are welcome to attend.

Sue and Bill Sager went to Congo to teach English, teach medicine to nurses, lab techs, medical students and medical residents from 1999 to 2004. They lived in the Fletchers'

home while they were taking a five year sabbatical leave.

John is a surgical consultant to the eight hospitals supported by the Presbyterian Community of Congo (CPC). He works with the hospitals' staffs to improve their surgical knowledge, skills, judgment and techniques.

Gwenda serves the CPC as an education consultant. She assists the CPC's Education Department in its efforts to enhance the quality of education in the church's 702

elementary and secondary schools.

In a partnership that values mutual learning and teaching as well as giving and receiving, the Fletchers and their Congolese colleagues work together to help the people of Congo experience the abundant life Jesus promises.

FPC and the Rotary Club of Ashland support the Fletchers.
