News from the church office

Office -- In December, our office manager Susan Coghill was relocated to the small meeting room while we investigated possible mold in the office. It has been inconvenient for Susan and me, and it may have felt awkward for you, but we needed to take precautions to keep our staff and visitors safe. The lab reported that the mold level is low and we will return to the main office as the year begins.

Leaks and wires -- For many years, the ceiling of the main office has leaked several times a year. Buildings and Grounds Committee has investigated, determining that the leak is caused when leaves block our gutters and water dams up high

enough to find an entrance through the roof flashing. Unattractive wires have been hanging inside the office window to keep the internet electronics away from the leak. A shelf for the electronics is being crafted to keep them high and dry.

Wi-Fi is now accessible in all three buildings on our campus. We encourage you and our guests to use the *Calvin Hall Guest* Wi-Fi, which does not require a password. It also has a strong signal in the Fireside Room. The passwords to the church administrative accounts are being changed and cannot be accessed from the guest Wi-Fi.

Fresh paint and thank you – SookJa and Doug Hansen spent a week preparing and repainting the women's restroom in the Administration Building as part of a planned Buildings and Grounds Committee update. We are awaiting the arrival of a new towel and soap dispenser. The room is clean and sparkling! Drop in and take a look – and thank SookJa and Doug!

Brian McLaren is a leading figure in the emerging church movement and a major figure in post-evangelical thought. His book *We Make the Road by Walking* offers short (2-3)



page) chapters with engaging questions for each week of the church

year. McLaren suggests that "faith was never intended to be a destination... instead it was to be a road, a path, a way out of old and destructive patterns into new and creative ones. As a road, or way, it is always being extended into the future. If a spiritual community only points back to where it has been, it is a dead end or parking lot, not a way. To be a living tradition, a living way, it must forever open itself forward and forever remain unfinished... even as it forever cherishes and learns from the growing treasury of its past."

The Lenten groups will focus on the five chapters related to Lent – for five meetings in five weeks – or your group could continue to meet for Palm Sunday and Easter conversations, or even choose to continue for the rest of the year (the book has a chapter for every week of the year)!

Our stewardship time "Celebrate What's Right with God's World" is based on a film by Dewitt Jones, a former photographer for *National Geographic*. In this film he encouraged each of us to find our own vision, not through a lens, but with a new attitude or perspective inside ourselves, celebrating what is right with the world. If you missed it at church, I would encourage you to watch this incredible film from the comfort of your own computer at *www.celebratewhatsright.com/film*. If we are able to incorporate this vision into our lives, we have the potential to radically improve our individual lives, our church, our Ashland community, and the world.

Several of the 2015 accomplishments and new 2016 goals that we celebrate are:

- During the fall conversations, with almost 90 people participating, our dedicated members identified worship and mission as our top two priorities.
- The Self Study Team delivered, and Session accepted, their final Self Study Report.
- The Pastor Nominating Committee is being formed and will call a new pastor in 2016.

Our stewardship pledge goal is \$211,000, and, as of Dec. 18, we have received a total of \$148,190 in 57 pledges. Last year we received 69 pledges for a total of \$180,062. If you have not yet completed your pledge card, please do so as soon as possible. Winter shelter fills need in our community

Thank you all for what you do for our community's poorest mem-

bers! It's hard to believe that we are only a month or so into the season because we have hosted eight nights already (three additional due to very cold temperatures).

Clearly the need for what we do is

increasing. We've had as many as 38 guests on one night! We are the first shelter of the week, and most of our guests come in cold and tired from three days sleeping on the streets. They are thrilled to get a bowl of soup and a warm place to lay their heads.

Last Tuesday as I was helping the guests in the morning, a man told me that he slept for 9 ½ hours the night before. It was more sleep than he had had the whole week before! We also received thanks from the many grateful guests who received socks, gloves, hats and oth-

> er gifts from the Christmas tree in Calvin Hall. Thank you all for your generous gifts!

For my part, I try to gather food for the evening meal and line up "helpers" for the shelter hosts.

Helpers serve the soup, make coffee, and clean up the kitchen after the meal. Having helpers frees up the hosts to meet the guests and assist them as necessary.


