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plans for her also. We know that to be absent from the body is to be present with the Lord. It behooves us to be ready at any moment to meet our Maker. An old country song said, "Everybody wants to go to Heaven, but no one wants to die," and so it is.

you are at work, it can seem like an eternity. If you are enjoying some recreation, it can pass quickly. What does eight hours mean to you? If we knew that in eight hours we would be in eternity, what would we do?

The point I want to make is this: savour each moment of life as the nectar from the honeycomb. Treat it as a special gift from God, for it is just that. Live it in expectation of seeing our Saviour face to face the next moment. It could happen just that way. Life is good—Heaven is "gooder."



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The Sin of Low Expectations

t times, when listening to people talk, I feel that God is on hospice care! Christians remind me of the children of Israel while in the wilderness—absolutely nothing is right. It is easy to diagnose problems but more difficult to prescribe a remedy. The remedy always begins and ends with God! If Moses had a problem with the children of Israel, he would turn to God. Sometimes the remedy was sweet. At other times, it was horrible, but the remedy always accomplished its purpose.

If God gave us choices concerning victories, how bold would we be? God gave Joash a chance to determine how many victories he would have over Syria. The story is found in II Kings 13:15-20. I want to dwell for just a moment on II Kings 13:18-19, "And he said, Take the arrows. And he took them. And he said unto the king of Israel, Smite upon the ground. And he smote thrice, and stayed. And the man of God was wroth with him, and said, Thou shouldest have smitten five or six times; then hadst thou smitten Syria till thou hadst consumed it: whereas now thou shalt smite Syria but thrice."

If we applied these actions to today, I wonder what the results would be. If our efforts for the advancement of the Gospel were dependant on our striking, how many times would we strike? Some in their efforts try once, and if there is not instant success, they walk away defeated and despondent.

John Gill says of Joash, "He might think this action trifling, and beneath him, only was willing to please the prophet, but did not do it with a good will, and therefore smote no more; though this was an emblem of his smiting the Syrians, which he might not understand."

That about describes the situation today. Joash went through the motions without any enthusiasm or expectation that his actions had any value at all. There had to be some awareness that this action had something to do with the battle for the prophet had just said, "The arrow of the LORD'S deliverance, and the arrow of deliverance from Syria: for thou shalt smite the Syrians in Aphek till thou hast consumed them" (verse 17). Aphek was a city in the land of Israel where the Syrians were routed in Ahab's time. The Bible says that

100,000 were slain near Aphek on one day, and 27,000 were killed by the fall of the wall of Aphek, (I Kings 20:26-30). Hence some read the words here to mean "as in Aphek."

The lessons here are very simple.

- (1) How big are our expectations? Are we looking for three strikes then out? How many times would we strike the ground, one time or ten times? Does it ever bother you to hear Christians talk about what cannot be done in our day as opposed to what great opportunities we have?
- (2) Are we satisfied living in defeat? I can tell you some are! Their fellowship is around defeat rather than victory. If some had victory, they would not even recognise it.
- (3) On whom do we blame our defeats? According to the prophet there could have been many victories, but three were given. I am sure, knowing the history of Israel, that God would be blamed for their future defeats when all the time THE SIN OF LOW EXPECTATIONS was the real reason.

On a recent Sunday morning, a lady named Donna attended the morning service. She was known to the congregation because at one time she attended regularly. Whatever the reasons might have been for her drifting away from the Lord and being out of church makes no difference. She was there on this particular Sunday. When the invitation was given, she came

forward and renewed her commitment to the Lord. One of the ladies who dealt with her reported her conviction and agony in repentance. When she received assurance of her renewed relationship with the Lord, she testified to that fact. If that was the end of the story, one may well say that event was repeated in hundreds of congregations that same morning. However, that is not the entire story. Paul Harvey would say, "Now for the rest of the story!"

Donna went home after church a happy pilgrim. I am sure she spent time with her family and experienced a good day. She attended the evening service and gave witness to her joy in having renewed her fellowship with the Lord. After the service, she was on her way to get petrol for her car and had a fatal accident. It was just eight short hours from the time of her repentance until her home going. What a story, and it is a true story without embellishment. That is what really happened.

This story about Donna is an apt illustration of the Scripture recorded in Proverbs 27:1, Boast not thyself of tomorrow; for thou knowest not what a day may bring forth. This story brings our attention to the fact we are to be prepared at all times to meet the Lord Jesus.

No doubt Donna had many plans for her future; however, our Lord had

ccepting a call to preach is no small Amatter. Paul said, According to the glorious gospel of the blessed God, which was committed to my trust. And I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry" (I Timothy 1:11-12). The Lord personally called Paul and put him into the ministry to preach the wondrous Gospel of Christ to a lost and dying world.
