My Fellow Lions:

I am honored to serve as your District Governor this year and look forward to the rest of my Lions year! My Vice District Governors (1st VDG Ev Lyons and 2nd VDG Heidi Zacchera) and I are busy with Cabinet meetings, Zone meetings, and official club visits. During these meetings I highlight the Global Action Team and how its three components—Leadership, Membership, and Service function as a continuum and further the Lions mission to be the global leader in community and humanitarian service.

I am pleased that our Zone Chairs are emphasizing Service and are asking Club Presidents to share their Service Projects during their Zone meetings this year. It is gratifying for me to hear at zone meetings and during club visits how our clubs' many exciting Service Projects are having such a positive impact on our communities. Thank you all for your SERVICE!!

Our Global Leadership Team has been very active. On September 8th all Zone Chairs were trained. And on October 6th we conducted Guiding Lions Training. Thanks to GLT Peter Nevers for organizing and to 1st VDG Ev Lyons for facilitating the training.

The Global Membership Team led by GMT Jim Trompeter continues to encourage clubs to use the MD23 Membership Plan to increase membership. Two of our clubs recently held a joint membership night resulting in the addition of three new members. Another club is planning an open house/membership evening later in the year. Thanks also to Orientation Chair PCC Alan Daninhirsch for conducting a New Member Orientation seminar with new members from 9 different clubs attending. Another New Member Orientation seminar is planned for March 21, 2019.

Let's extend our congratulations to the newest club in our district – the Glastonbury Centennial Lions Club! Many of you were present on October 27th to hear congratulatory remarks from our Area GMT PCC Mahesh Chitnis from New Jersey.

We have now established individual Service Accounts at the district level. LCI initiatives include Diabetes, Vision, Childhood Cancer, Environment, and Hunger. We also added VIP Fishing and Hearing Preservation. This allows clubs to contribute funds to district-wide projects.

We are moving forward with our MD 23 Diabetes project led by PCC Alan Daninhirsch to establish a oneweek day camp for children with Type 1 diabetes in the summer of 2019. District Diabetes Chair Wendella Battey is also planning a pilot program in the Hartford school system to test for diabetes.

I believe that partnering is a key element to the success of our Lions clubs in the coming years. In the area of Environment, we met with the Litchfield Hills Audubon Society (of which Lion Carol and I are members) and the Sharon CT Audubon Center. Both organizations are interested in expanding environmental awareness and interest to our schools. I plan to involve our Leo clubs as one part of this effort.

Let's all support Lions Day with the United Nations (LDUN) this year on March 9, 2019! Our Cabinet members and PDGs have been very generous in sponsoring seats for Leos on our planned Lions/Leos bus trip. See the ad by LDUN Chair PDG Dave Roberts in this issue of the District Spirit for more information.

PCC Dan DiVirgilio is serving as District LCIF Coordinator this year. LCIF Campaign 100 is the most ambitious fundraising effort in LCIF's history. We rely on and appreciate the generous donations

of our clubs in support of LCIF. This year, I am asking each Lion to consider making an individual donation to LCIF as well. Just access the newly redesigned website www.lionsclubs.org. Also consider reaching out to businesses in your community and asking them to support LCIF with their contributions. Remember that our foundation is consistently rated as one of the best in the world.

In regard to partnerships, we are currently meeting with Rotary Clubs, Elks Lodges, and the McCall Foundation to address the Opioid crisis. This is perhaps the single most pressing issue affecting our society today. Its impact is felt in all our communities and touches many of the initiatives in our district: Youth, Veterans, the Homeless and Hungry, etc. Our efforts will focus on awareness and education. Lion Bob Bessel and 2nd VDG Heidi Zacchera are spearheading District 23B representation on the Opioid Task Force.

One of my goals this year is to strengthen communication between our district and our individual Lions club members. We are developing strategies to make sure there is effective 2-way communication. On a personal note, Lion Carol and I continue to produce our cable access TV show "Lion Around CT with Carol and Harry." Our halfhour weekly show has been airing for 5 years and is seen on 6 cable access TV stations as well as on our Charter home studio website. LCI and International President Gudrun have set ambitious goals for us this year, especially in the area of Service. My theme for this year is LIGHTS! CAMERA! ACTION!

Greetings, Happy Holidays, and a Healthy New Year.


I had the opportunity to attend four Zone meetings this past month. The quality of the discussions and the questions asked were probably the best that I have heard. All the meeting discussed Service Projects and how we could better serve our local communities.

Not only are Service Projects great for our communities, they are also a great vehicle for sourcing new members particularly the smaller clubs. Service project bring a focus different than a fund raiser. People coming to an Eye Screening, Clothing Drive and Highway Cleanup are going to be different than those coming to Fundraisers such as Dances, Breakfasts, or Car Shows.

The 2018 Veteran's Stand Down took place on Friday, Sept 21st 2018 in Rocky Hill. Over 20 Lions helped do eye and hearing screenings. We also had help from student nurses from CCSU. Also, MANY pairs of reading glasses were distributed. This year the event happened to coincide with the USA/Canada forum, so it was great to get all the volunteers we did this year. This results from this year's event (as provided by Lion Dan Uitti)

Overall, 1001 Veterans were provided access to over 100 service providers from Federal, State, Local, Veterans and Social Services organizations.

I would like to thank all Lions that volunteered their time and energy in assisting during the event. As usual, it was "organized chaos" at times, but everything worked out well.

I do have a special shout-out for Lion Stephen Polezonis. How can we do all that? Simply put, as the greatest Association on the planet we will accomplish it all with **TEAMWORK**. We change people's lives for the better each and every day all across the globe. With your financial commitment to

Empowering Service and your communities we can do this and more.

Did you know that \$100 can pay for two cataract surgeries? Did you know that \$100 for Youth will fund Lions Quest curriculum to an entire classroom for one year? Did you know that \$100 can provide for Diabetes Screenings for 18 at risk people?

LCIF is asking for the following to be a model club. \$250 per member per year for three years total \$750. The best part it doesn't have to be all out of your pocket. You can get a business, friend, family member, coworker to share the investment in our association. Please do not be afraid to ask others. They want to contribute we just need to give them a solid good reason and I have just given you 7 most worthwhile causes. Harwinton Lions Club

Harwinton Lions Club Funds Glucose Monitors at Diabetes Center

A \$1,000 donation from the Harwinton Lions Club will help fund programs at Charlotte Hungerford Hospital's Diabetes Center in Torrington, including the newest continuous glucose monitoring technology for its patients. This is the 15th consecutive year that the Lions have donated to help diabetes patients at the Center.

"Once again we are so thankful to the Harwinton Lions Club for their generosity and support in assisting us to offer the latest technology and education to our patients," said Lois Pelletier, Program Coordinator at CHH Diabetes and Endocrinology. The donation will be used to fund new glucose monitors, which are given to patients to wear for a week. The devices take a reading of blood sugar levels every five minutes. After seven days the monitors are returned to the Diabetes Center, where physicians analyze the data. The information collected allows caregivers to study patterns and identify unrecognized periods of low blood sugar, and is used by Diabetes Center staff to adjust insulin levels and offer lifestyle and medication modifications.

"My husband and daughter are both Type 2 diabetics," says Harwinton Lions Diabetes Chair Regina Neri. "I know personally the struggles that they both have gone through trying to keep their diabetes under control. The help they have received from the CHH Diabetes Center has helped them immensely."

Lions Club International (LCI) established a Diabetes Awareness Program to assist local Lions Clubs in conducting and supporting local and large-scale efforts leading to the control and treatment of diabetes and its complications through education, prevention, and research. Lions have worked with

community healthcare organizations to provide diabetes screenings, educational programs and funding, camps, and other assistance to people with diabetes.



In what has become an annual tradition for the Harwinton Lions, District 23B Governor Harry Schuh, Harwinton Lions Diabetes Chair Regina Neri, and Lions Past President David Neri presented the check to Dr. Egils Bogdanovics and Lois Pelletier, RN, CDE, at the CHH Diabetes Center in Torrington.

MyLion

East Windsor Lions Club

The East Windsor Lions Club held its 47th Annual Turkey Shoot each Sunday from October 14th thru November 18th at the Lions Club's shooting grounds at 37 North Road (CT 140) in East Windsor.

During the "shoot," shooters use shotguns from a distance of 25-yards to shoot at targets with turkeys emblazoned on them. There are twenty shooters in each round, and the shooter whose shot that is closest to the bulls-eye wins the round.

Shooters can win prizes ranging from frozen turkeys, hams, and beef roasts, to gift cards and cash. Tickets for each round of shooting cost from \$2.25 to \$3.50, depending on the prize being awarded for that round. There are also "special" shooting rounds, where shooters can win larger prizes.

Shotgun ammo is provided, and there are shotguns available to use for persons without shotguns who are interested in shooting. There was also a special for Kids 12 & under—they got 1 free ticket to shoot (in a "small bird" round).

The East Windsor Lions Club Turkey Shoot has provided SAFE fun for the entire family for the past 46 years of this event, which supports the sight-saving and other charitable activities of the club and is its largest fundraising event each year.

The East Windsor Lions Club 47th Turkey Shoot brought out quite a number of "hunters".

Suggested Childhood Cancer (ACTION!) Projects

Imagine for a moment that you are the parents of Justin, who at age 13 had spent two years with osteosarcoma, going back and forth to the hospital, appointments and missing school friends. You are a mixed bag of hopefulness and awakening reality. Here are Lion/Leo service suggestions in honor of Justin and his mom, Ronee, who mentioned unmet needs during Justin's journey.

1. Wear a GOLD ribbon on Feb. 15th, International Childhood Cancer Day (order for everyone at your club or workplace from American Cancer Society, the Ribbon Factory, or Oriental Trading)

Why: Raise awareness that although cancer in children is only 1% of all cancers in the world, one child may mean the world to you.

2. Stuff/donate Care Bags for a Teen: things like a quick acting thermometer, really good heating pad for chemo ravaged muscles, more mature coloring books/colored pencils, soothing lotions and baby wipes that don't sting sensitive skin, and comfortable head scarves.

Why: younger children may get more toys, attention, and cuteness perks than teens.

3. Sponsor/hold a meeting/partner an event at a local art gallery, photography studio, or salon with Flashes of Hope (flashesofhope.org/chapters/Hartfor d) and share your proceeds.

Why: professional stylists and photographers capture young cancer patients/family with free photos that, for some, are enduring memories.

4. Offer your club's services or funds for projects like Art from the Heart (volunteers redecorate a child's room for homecoming), via the Wilton, CT based organization:

Circle of Care, a member organization of ctcanceralliance.org that cares for families and children with cancer.

Why: patients love to look forward to something.

5. Sponsor a Family Fun Day at a local athletic club, dance studio, playground, or other recreational venue for families and other caregivers.

A proud son of Big Sky Country (Montana), Keith grew up in Great Falls where his father was mayor, ran Herbert Hoover's presidential campaign in 1928, was a Charter Member of the local Lions Club and eventually, became an International Director. After graduating from Montana State University with a degree in journalism, plus two years in the Army, Keith began, with his beloved wife of 57 years Betty at his side, a journey across America (Albuquerque, Virginia, Indiana, and Upstate New York).

He used his skills and training as either a newspaperman or corporate communications specialist.

Eventually Tom Shearer of New Britain's Fafnir Bearing selected him to be their Communications Director. After 12-and-a-half years, Keith literally turned the lights off at that great American manufacturing corporation.

Always proud of being a Lion, Keith is never with-out a Lions pin, or many Lions pins, on his lapel. He is a Past Club President, Past District Governor, USA/Canada Forum Presenter and is a recipient of Lionism's highest awards: Melvin Jones, Ambassador of Sight, and Knight of the Blind.

As District Governor, he sat with Charlie Kaman (Founder and

Chairman of the Kaman Corporation) and George Salt, CEO at the time, and asked, "What can we do as Lions to help your beloved Fidelco Guide Dog Program?"

"We need better transportation," was the response.

During Keith's reign, the money was raised from Connecticut's three districts for a new van.

Keith says, "I have been very happy as a Lion all these years. They have been like a family. I have been proud to serve." And Lionism has been proud to have you.




Plainville Lions Club

Windsor Locks Lions Receive Anthem Foundation Grant

In July of this year, Windsor Locks Lions Club President, Lion Kathy Doody approached her Board and Directors requesting permission to apply for a grant sponsored by the Anthem Foundation. The basis of the grant was to pair Lions Club members with volunteer employees from Anthem Insurance Company in local community projects.

An application was filed and in mid-September, the Club was notified that they had been selected to receive a grant in the amount of \$1,500 to paint and make repairs to the Little League facilities at the town's Pesci Park. The Little League facility has a history of its own, as it was the home field for the 1965 Little League World Series Champions.

After a bit of negotiations, the grant request was increased to \$1,850, to cover additional expenses. The Club's selection was one of three requests granted statewide by the Anthem Foundation.

Preliminary work to repair siding to the Announcer's Booth, Snack Bar, and the Covered Bleachers was completed on September 27th. In addition to the wood replacement and trim work, primer coats were applied to the new wood.

On Saturday, September 29th, some sixty Lions, Leos, and Little League parents responded to the "Call to Serve." In addition to the volunteers, two of the members of the 1995 World Champions made appearances to reminisce about playing ball on the historic site. Work began at 9:00 a.m., and by 1:00 p.m., new coats of paint had been made to the Announcer's Booth, Snack Bar, and the outside and inside walls of the covered bleacher sections. Final work, the painting of the bleachers was accomplished by Adam Chirico, as part of his Eagle Scout project.

The painting and repair work to the facilities received coverage from a reporter from the Hartford Courant.

What Is CLERF?

CLERF, the Connecticut Lions Eye Research Foundation was created in 1956. Prior to the early 1950s, assistance (either medical or financial) provided to Connecticut residents was available to those already blind.

Recognizing the dearth of financial assistance available for research into the causes of blindness and available treatments, the Multiple District 23 Council of Governors created CLERF. Most clubs have responded generously to the continuing need for financial support, allowing the foundation to provide grants totaling more than \$7 million over the years.

Major support has gone to Yale University for establishment of a Macular Degeneration Research Center and to UCONN for establishment of a Vascular Eye Center. In addition to the above, CLERF, through the Connecticut Lions Eye Health Program, supports adult Glaucoma and Diabetic eye disease screenings, the Eye Donor Program, Sight Saver Day, and the KidSight USA pediatric eye screening program.

Several years ago, a CLERF grant of \$100,000 that was matched by LCIF, allowed the purchase of 23 new screening cameras that are currently being used in the KidSight USA program.

CLERF's Knight of the Blind Award was created to promote Connecticut's foundation and at the same time, recognize people who have given unselfishly of their time and efforts to promote its goals. Individuals, clubs and others may nominate someone for this award by submitting an application and contributing a total of \$1,000 in full or over 5 years.

Project Planning: A Primer

What elements make for a successful project? As we start planning new service projects, we want to make sure that we're covering all the bases.

At the very least, your project plan should include the following:

- Project Scope (What you're doing)
- Project Deliverables (end result)
- Project Timeline (Start to Finish)
- Budget
- Human Resources (Do you have the right seats filled on the bus?)
- Communications (between team members)
- Promotional Needs

If you're missing any of these items on your project plan, you'll find yourself scrambling around at the last minute to cover areas you didn't anticipate.

Remember: Proper Planning Prevents Poor Projects!
