From the Rector: "True Love"

"Love is life's end! an end, but never ending;
All joys, all sweets, all happiness, awarding;
Love is life's wealth, (ne'er spent, but ever spending,)
More rich by giving, taking by discarding;
Love's life's reward, rewarding in rewarding;
Then from they wretched heart fond care remove;
Ah! shouldst thou live but once love's sweets to prove,
Thou wilt not love to live, unless thou live to love."

More poetry has been dedicated to either singing the praises of love or lamenting the pain of lost love than any other topic. The topic of love is so prominent in Shakespeare's works it is not surprising that he is so often quoted on Hallmark cards. While some poets write about the dignity or Godliness of true love, others take a somewhat more basic view of love. To quote from the movie, "Dead Poets Society," Robin Williams' character, an English teacher at an all-boys boarding school, tells his charges that "the purpose of poetry is to woo women."

In the quote above, from Sir Edmund Spenser, the last line is quite striking, "Thou wilt not love to live, unless thou live to love." While Spenser is overtly referencing romantic love between two people, it has some import for Christians. Unless we live a life dedicated to loving others, our lives will not be worth living. We were all created by God to live loving lives. We were created to love God, as God loves us. We were created to love others, ALL others, as God loves us. That is what our time here on earth is about - loving, or at least, learning to love. But it is probably one of the hardest things for us to learn. HOW do we love others?

Author Victor Hugo once said,

"The first symptom of love in a young man is timidity, in a girl it is boldness. The two sexes have a tendency to approach, and each assumes the qualities of the other."

While Mr. Hugo was utilizing a stereotype of what the typical young man and woman were like, it is an interesting observation of how people approach someone they love. We tend to take on their qualities, their ethos, as if attempting to bond ourselves to them through familiarity. True love causes us to see deep into the other person, to self-identify with their nature, their person, their being. We want to be with them, to bond ourselves to them, to find a way that our own inner selves might match up with their inner self. As if, since the goal is for two to become one, then we must find a match, a complimentary other that makes a complete whole, like two puzzle pieces coming together. To do that, we may take on some of the aspects of the other, as they take on some of our aspects, allowing the edges to come together in harmony.

Warden's Report (submitted by Glenn Hunt):

We would like to thank our friends from Campanella for their performance at the Ukrainian Prayer service. We would also look forward to having more interactive events with them.

The following two lines are from the previous report but still valid.

We still could use more voices and opinions to serve on the Vestry. Please see Father Court or any of the Vestry members if you are interested.

If you know anyone that is competent in website design, please let us know. We wish to update our current website.

As we move forward with the discernment process, we will still be looking for ideas, random thoughts and suggestions as to how we should proceed. This is not a process that is entirely dependent upon what the vestry and rector decide. We want and need your input on this in the coming months.

Father Court and Julie will be moving into the rectory in the middle of May. As one last major improvement / upgrade, the air conditioning system will be restored to normal working condition. Barring any unforeseen issues this should take care of the building for the foreseeable future.

We will also hope to start having at least one service per month outside, as weather permits. Announcements on this will be forthcoming from Father Court.

We welcome suggestions for exterior landscaping along the main circular drive. It was suggested that flowers be planted as an attention-draw for cars / people going by on Walters. If you have an idea, please contact Jim Brooks. Another idea is possibly adding a different sign on which we can change and include announcements of events.

We look forward to seeing both our parishioners and friends in the community garden. Announcements on garden set -up and related items will be coming from Jim or Meredith.

April Vestry Recap:

The vestry meeting was opened with a prayer by Bill Perley.

Father Court started the meeting with feedback from the Holy Week services. We were pleased to see our numbers for all services had increased from the previous year which is an excellent start for us. For those members that attend via Zoom we had heard there may be occasional issues with transmission quality. Please let us know as you are able when this happens in order that we may address the issues.

It was brought up that non-Episcopalians may not be aware of exactly what services like Evensong are about, and that a way to attract more visitors / get our name out in the public eye would be a brief synopsis of them, either through the website or electronic means. If anyone has other suggestions, please let us know.

The vestry approved what we hope would be the last hurdle in the foreseeable future in the rectory rehabilitation with the upgrade / repair of the A/C units on the lower lever. We were also informed that the issues with the dimmer switches and some of the lights in the Narthex will be addressed in the next few weeks. Let there be light!

Mike Piskel also reiterated that we are looking for ways to spruce up / make the main circular entrance more noticeable / eye catching. Please bring any suggestions to Jim Brooks.

Father Court also gave us a brief update on his attendance at the College of Congregational Development. This is a two-year course on dealing with congregational issues. Since there were eight different models that would take up too much time to discuss at one meeting, it was decided that Father Court would select the three best options that best apply to St. Giles before the vestry takes up this matter. These models are guidelines as to how we continue with our discernment process. As mentioned previously, we want and need everyone's support on this. Any and all ideas will be considered as confidential if you wish, but the process is not meant to be done by just Father Court and the Vestry.

Lastly we congratulate Father Court on completing his first year with us. The meeting ended with the compline led by Martha McGuire.








The Northfield Township Recycling program

resumed on Monday, April 4, 2022, during normal Road District business hours of 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, and will end for the year on Friday, October 28, 2022 at 3:00 p.m. They are located at 237 Melvin Drive in Northbrook, just north of St. Giles.

They handle a lot of items that cannot be picked up curbside, including tires, electronics [not monitors], fluorescent bulbs, paint and more. They will also take things such as bicycles, clothing and toys that are in useable condition.

In addition, their partnership with the Village of Northbrook provides an additional opportunity to recycle with an added drop-off location in Northbrook. The Village of Northbrook (www.northbrook.il.us) will be receiving at the garage behind the Village Hall on Cedar. Check the Village's web site to verify the times, dates and list of accepted recyclables.
