Rector, Staff, and Officers Reports

Rector's Annual Report

It's easy to take it for granted, but 2011 was an amazing year. I went back to working full-time, and we have made it through the year! We had help from a grant at the end of 2010 from the diocese, from a special gift from a parishioner, and strong giving from our congregation. At the start of the year, we were not sure how we would manage financially, but we did it, by God's grace. We have also started to grow in membership again, with about a dozen new families who have started to attend our parish through the year.

The year was important for our parish staff, too. Lori Hill started the year as interim secretary, and the vestry decided to call her as regular parish secretary. She has done a fine job, especially in our bulletin design, computer graphics for worship, parish brochures, e-news, and website. We leased a new color copier/multifunction machine, and this has enabled Lori to produce amazing things for our worship and publicity. We also subscribed to Constant Contact for our e-news, and this has helped us have a very high quality weekly e-news. Steve Corey came to us mid-year as our music director, and he has given us continuity in our music leadership. Steve has gradually been introducing new music from a variety of sources for our 10 a.m. Sunday service, which has enriched our worship experience. Steve hopes to add to the music team for the 10 a.m. service in the new year.

We made some important changes in our worship schedule. Starting in the fall, we began a new Saturday evening service, CommUnity, led by Julie Vice. This is a prayer and praise service which is especially designed for those who do not have much Episcopal Church background. We also changed our Sunday morning schedule to 7:30 and 10:00 a.m., with education at 9 a.m. This has simplified our Sunday worship and has given us more time for quality education for all ages.


We continued to develop our adult formation ministries, with evening prayer twice a month, and the home Bible study twice a month. We had another session of our Episcopal Foundations class in the spring. Last fall, we had the Network class on Sunday mornings, which helped participants identify their spiritual gifts, personal style, and passion. I hope that the Network course will be a regular part of what we do each year. We followed the Grateful, Glad, and Giving ministry through mid-year, with very good monthly programs. Because we did not have volunteers to keep this going for another year, we did not follow this ministry in the second half of 2011. I hope that we can look at ways to do this program in the future, with help from the diocese.

Our children's and youth ministries are going very well with the leadership of Barb Nill. Our youth group met regularly through the year, with a variety of discussion, outreach, and fun activities. In the summer of 2011, we started a complete renovation of the portable unit, and this is now ready for use in the beginning of 2012. Thanks to John Stoppelmann, David Langston, Randy Lee, and John Hill for many hours of work on this! Last summer, we had another wonderful Kids Kamp, with the theme of "Lion King." Thanks to Lois Anderson and Lori Hill for their leadership in this great ministry. We are now beginning plans for next summer's Kids Kamp with the theme of "Finding Nemo."

Our parish outreach was focused on the monthly themes of Grateful, Glad, and Giving through the first half of 2011. We have continued our support of the Elk Grove Food Bank through food donations, and for the Alternatives Pregnancy Center with donations of infant things in Advent and Christmas. For Thanksgiving, we adopted five families and provided a Thanksgiving dinner for each family.

In 2012, we will celebrate our 25th Anniversary through the year, with a special celebration with Bishop Beisner on Sunday August 26th. We will also do a planning process for our future in Epiphany and Lent, as we look ahead to the coming years. A major challenge in the year will be to see how we can be financially sustainable for 2013 and beyond. Through 2012, we will offer the course *Financial Peace University*, as a way to help our members gain control of their personal finances. Another important goal for 2012 is to decide how to develop our land for the future, working with the diocese. More immediate goals are to complete the renovation of our worship space and of the portable unit. Our CommUnity service has received a \$5,000 grant from the diocese to help us take this creative service out to the larger community, by having the service in other locations regularly. Helping this service grow and thrive is a major goal for the year. I am grateful for our recent newcomers to our parish and pray that this trend will continue through this year.

I want to thank all our parish staff and leaders, especially our vestry and wardens Eva Moredock and Barbara Nill. Barbara has served as Junior Warden for three years, and has done this very well! I have really appreciated the feedback and support from Eva and Barb through the year. I pray that this anniversary year will be a fun and creative time for our parish, as we give thanks for 25 years of ministry and look forward to many more to come.



What is a New Year's Resolution

A New Year's resolution is a commitment that a person makes to one or more lasting personal goals, projects, or the reforming of a habit.

Quoting Frank Ra (author of the new year's resolution book "A course in happiness"): "Resolutions are more sustainable when shared, both in terms of with whom you share the benefits of your resolution, and with whom you share the path of maintaining your resolution. Peer-support makes a difference in success rate with new year's resolutions". According to Gretchen Rubin (author of best-seller "The Happiness Project"): "You hit a goal, you achieve a goal. You keep a resolution".

This lifestyle change is generally interpreted as advantageous. A New Year's Resolution is generally a goal someone sets out to accomplish in the coming year. Some examples include resolutions to donate to the poor more often, to become more assertive, or to become more environmentally responsible. A key element to a New Year's Resolution that sets it apart from other resolutions is that it is made in anticipation of the New Year, and new beginnings. People committing themselves to a new year's resolution plan to do so for the whole following year.

At watchnight services, many Christians prepare for the year ahead by praying and making these resolutions. A watchnight service is a late-night Christian church service. In many different Christian traditions, a watchnight service is held late on New Year's Eve, and ends after midnight. This provides the opportunity for Christians to review the year that has passed and make, and then prepare for the year ahead by praying and resolving. The services often include singing, praying, exhorting, and preaching.

There are other religious parallels to this tradition. During Judaism's New Year, Rosh Hashanah, through the High Holidays and culminating in Yom Kippur (the Day of Atonement), one is to reflect upon one's wrongdoings over the year and both seek and offer forgiveness. People may act similarly during the Christian fasting period of Lent, though the motive behind this holiday is more of sacrifice than of responsibility. The concept, regardless of creed, is to reflect upon self-improvement annually. Happy New Year! Eva Moredock

Annual Report of the Vestry for 2011

As the new kid on the block as Clerk of the Vestry for 2011, I was unsure as to the Vestry's purpose and the roles of each Vestry member. At the first meeting of 2011, Father Ray and the Vestry members hit the ground running with great enthusiasm. The Vestry serves as representatives of the Parish in matters concerning church property and relations of the parish to its clergy. After clarification of Vestry member roles, the first task of the group was to develop a list of the top 10 "behavioral norms". What are behavioral norms, you ask? They are a charter of how to conduct important business of the church by exercising mutual respect and a positive attitude amongst members during Vestry meetings. This charter has been respectfully observed since its inception and has enabled the Vestry to conduct focused and timely discussions.

In February, a Vestry retreat was held, facilitated by Canon Brit. The three goals set for 2011 were as follows:

- 1) Volunteer recruitment and development for worship services (to recruit by invitation and advertisement, and provide training).
- 2) Leadership Development lay and ordained (to develop a culture to discern, nurture, strengthen, and utilize leaders for St. Mary's).
- 3) Fundraisers and Events (to gather a group of willing volunteers to organize and facilitate and/or work activities).

Much focus is being placed on invitation to improve and enrich the St. Mary's ministries; i.e., recruitment and retention (how to get new people to our church and how to keep them) by use of positive dialogue regarding the aspects about St. Mary's that would attract people to attend. Vestry members were challenged by Father Ray to bring in at least one member for 2011 by personal contacts and by networking. It is hoped St. Mary's congregants will try to meet that challenge as well.

In June, Canon Brit facilitated the Mutual Ministry Review with Vestry members. Emphasis was placed on celebrating what God has done at St. Mary's over the last year, opportunities or gaps that need attention, and what we can do to keep the church's vision, challenges and opportunities in front of us through 2011 by understanding the facts that contribute to the barriers that are present and what can be done to overcome them.

Throughout 2011, many decisions have been made by the Vestry regarding buildings and grounds projects, finances/spending, budgets, office equipment and services, and more which will be addressed in other areas of the Annual Report. Please feel comforted by the fact that your Vestry is working very hard for the good of the church. I feel very privileged to have the opportunity to observe, first hand, the deep commitment, care, compassion, and concern for the church and its congregation as displayed by the Vestry members. Each member has unique gifts and interests to bring to the table, but all agree to seek God's guidance in their works, to seek means to form community, and to hold one another accountable for decisions made for the benefit of the church.

Notes from the Treasurer

As you can see from the Annual Report, we started 2011 knowing we would need to tap into our Reserve Funds. Our 2011 Budget had expenses higher than our estimated income. To meet those expenses we noted that \$26,000 in Reserve Funds would be needed to cover expenses.

At the end of 2011 we had used \$23,200 of the estimated \$26,000. However we also managed to put \$21,400 INTO reserves, leaving a net decrease in reserves of only \$1,800. So as we head into 2012 we start the year with \$34,200 in the Reserve Fund. However, as noted on the 2012 Budget, we will once again need to tap into those reserves to cover expenses in the coming year.

Election:

Nominations for Delegate to the Convention – Deborah Hess, Mary Ann Renzi, Dorothy Stoppelmann, Julie Vice. Nominations from the floor – none. There being no further nominations, Harriett McKinnis moved that nominations be closed, Paula Sink seconded. Motion carried. Poles were declared open at 6:11 pm and ballots were distributed.

Dinner:

Blessing of food by Fr. Ray. Delicious soup and salad dinner served by Fellowship Committee. The new St. Mary's Annual Meeting Band also entertained us during the feast.

Business Meeting:

Election declared closed after one hour.

Motion to accept the minutes from last year was made by Julie Vice and seconded by Clayton Beach. Motion carried.

Treasurer - Susi Jacobo-Vice: Highlights – Looking at the report of budget to actual, our income was more than we spent. That allowed us to set up a reserve account of \$20,000. We also received a Congregational Development Committee grant of \$16,000 to help with our budget for next year. We will need this to get us through 2011 as not enough pledges have come in so far to put us at our goal. The good news is that Fr. Ray is now restored to full time. Pledges - \$128,500 have come in leaving us still about \$8000 short.

Junior Warden's Report – Barbara Nill: One way the year 2010 was wonderful and tiring was being a part of the building renovation. The children's ministry has been a wonderful experience, fostering great relationships with the youth of this parish. Seeing God through the eyes of a child is a special experience. Being part of Grateful Glad and Giving has been enriching, reinforcing the way we should be looking at our relationships. She encourages everyone to try something different. This enables you to work with other people and deepening your relationship with them.

Senior Warden's Report – Angie Taylor: It was a challenging two years but an enriching experience that transformed her life. We grappled with who we are and out of that came a new motto – Opening Hearts and Minds to All. Grateful, Glad and Giving gave us a new attitude. Renewal/Apostolate is a way to help ourselves. Commitment, Celebration, Compassion and Care have been our guiding words, to that she wants to add creativity to reflect the way we work to solve our problems.

"Stone Soup" - Mary Ann Renzi: Mark Nill read a wonderful story about stone soup with the aid of our youth as they made stone soup. The moral is that by working together with everyone contributing what they can, wondrous things will happen. Mary Ann gave special thanks to the 27 parishioners who have brought goodies to share during coffee hour on Sundays and the 53 parishioners who have been involved in all the fellowship events this year.

Thanksgivings – Father Ray: Recognition for Fr. Roy Coloma and Fr. Ray Potter. We could not continue without their help. Thank you to the outgoing vestry – Carl King, Angie Taylor and Richard Lange. Round of applause and plant and balloon to each of the outgoing vestry. Angie presented Fr. Ray and Barbara Nill with Starbucks cards as her thanks and encouragement to continue meeting over coffee. Thanks to all the officers for the wonderful work they have done. Thank you to Greg Mason who is serving as our interim music and Lori Hill serving as our interim church secretary and Maria Yearwood who has served about 20 years in our nursery. Thank you to Mark Voskuil who has worked in the office for the last ten years. Recognition of all the members who have served on the various committees, too numerous to list here.. Deb Hess presented a special thank you to Randy Lee and Dave Langston for all their work serving as the Sextons of our parish and doing all the needed repairs on the buildings and grounds. Acknowledgement of the special effort from Lynn Holman who serves both as our worship chairperson and Fr. Ray's right hand man.

Building Planning/Renovation Annual Report

St. Mary's continues to be in need of much TLC. The renovation of the church continued this year with the installation of the cabinets on the musician side of the church. The cabinets did get installed but they are not complete yet as they still need doors and finish trim to be installed. The church renovation stalled a little bit do to the major attention the classrooms (portables) needed. The work on the portables was very extensive. We removed all the siding on the exterior. During the process, we encountered a large amount of dry rot to the actual structure of the building. Most of the dry rot began at the roof line and continued down into the floor structure. A mighty crew of 3-4 guys worked most Monday's, Wednesday's and Friday's, and put the building back together. We got the outside weather tight and painted and moved inside to continue the renovation. The inside work consisted of removing all the carpet, removing the paneling on the inside of the exterior walls and assuring enough insulation was in the walls. Once those items where accomplished, the mighty crew began putting the inside back together. This included new drywall on the interior, correcting any electrical problems, painting the interior with some VERY FUN colors and installing a new laminate floor. With the work on the electrical, we were able to put in some much needed exterior lighting. The lighting facing the church is on a dusk to dawn sensor, to make sure the courtyard of the church is lit. The back side of the portables has a very neat lighting feature. The lights remain on from dusk to dawn, but only at 50%. When motion is detected, the lights come on to 100%. With new siding, new paint, repaired roof, cool colors on the inside and new flooring, these portables can now be used and hopefully show the parents and the children of St. Mary's how much they mean to us. Now it is time to move back into the church and complete that renovation. Once again, thanks for your patience.

A very special thanks goes out to David Langston, Randy Lee and John Hill.

CommUnity Saturday Service

Wow, what a year! Last year at this time, I was writing an article about our music ministry and the significant changes we had undergone with Shannon Castaneda leaving for Colorado. During this year it was eventually decided that Quest and the 11am Rite II service would blend into one service at 10am.

This is when I realized I could no longer ignore my calling. After speaking with Father Ray and then gaining approval from the Vestry, we started a complimentary non-Eucharistic service on Saturday Evening at 6pm. The service is designed for people less familiar with the formal church service and more geared to those who may not regularly attend any church. This service was branded as CommUnity.

CommUnity is different from St. Mary's other two services (and the former Quest service) in many ways including how the music, prayers, videos and skits are used to connect those attending the service not only to the Historical presence of God but also to the ways that God continues to work and move in our world today. The focus on Our Loving God, which is active today and not a dusty relic from the dark ages, is central. While this service is contemporary and in some ways even post-modern, it remains true to the Episcopal way and takes serious our Commission to "restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ" (BCP page 855) by combining scripture, reason, and tradition.

CommUnity has been celebrating for just about four months. We continue to have room to grow. While many times "numbers" are considered a determinate of success, we do not view the services' success based on the number of people attending. We have instead focused on the spread of the message. We have focused on extensive media outreach and promotion. We established an email to be contacted at (CommUnity.St.Marys@gmail.com) and a Facebook page (We have already passed 50 "likes"....Are you one of them? If not, become one! Type CommUnity St. Mary's and hit the "like" button). We also have a tab on the St. Mary's website and have started connecting with the Youth and Young Adult and the Communications Directors at the Diocesan level for their support.

Recently, we have begun to see some amazing and positive things beginning to happen. The Holy Spirit is acting in new and exciting ways and we look forward to where this will lead us. CommUnity is on the cutting edge of a new and exciting way to "do church" that is consistent with the mission of the diocese and the Bishop's address at Convention and I believe that it is because of this, CommUnity just received a \$5000 grant from the Diocese's Commission on Vitalization to assist in taking CommUnity outside of the church walls- where **our** CommUnity meets **the** community.

I hope that each of you will take me up on this impersonal (intended to be personal) invitation to Come and See! Every Saturday we gather at 6pm and would **love** to have you join us!

Finance Committee Annual Report

The Finance Committee, including Susi Jacobo-Vice, Scott Anderson, and Paul Merrill, met January 12, 2012 to complete our work for 2011 and to review the 2012 Budget and Income projections for this report.

- 1. Review of the Financial Reports from December 2011:
 - a. December income remained consistent for the parish. Total income for the year was 92% of budget and 95.3% of budget based upon actual pledges made. This is pretty good!
 - b. Actual operations expenses for the year exceeded the budget by about \$4100. These expenses were monitored monthly by vestry and were within expectations.
 - c. Pledge income was 96% of actual pledges made for 2011, an excellent response from the parish.
 - d. It is important to note that the 2011 budget included the use of \$26,000 in reserve funds of which \$23,300 were actually needed.
 - e. In summary, the budget plan for 2011 was well conceived and actual income was close to actual expenses in support of the ongoing mission and ministry of St. Mary's Church.
- 2. Review of the 2012 Budget:
 - a. For 2012, the projected income is a challenge and presents St. Mary's with an immediate need to plan for both 2012 expenses, and to plan for ministry and operations in 2013.
 - b. At the meeting, the current projected pledge income for 2012 is \$118,910, well below the target of \$130,000. The current reserve fund has \$34,000 available for use which can be used to balance the 2012 budget. However, a plan that exhausts the reserve fund is not sustainable. St. Mary's had the good fortune to receive a \$10,000 gift in 2011 which is part of this reserve. The development and implementation of a sustainable financial and ministry plan is an urgent and necessary priority for 2012.
- 3. Review of issues that continue to be "in process" related to financial health and financial obligations:
 - a. St. Mary's has a designated new building fund balance of \$70,000.
 - b. The Diocese of Northern California (DNC) is holding for St. Mary's an amount estimated to be near \$700,000 to support St. Mary's new building plan.
 - c. A conversation with DNC regarding both of these new building fund resources, and developing a current and conjoint plan and vision for St. Mary's is recommended.
 - d. At this time, it is also important to remember that St. Mary's is responsible for beginning payments to the DNC in 2013 for the eastern parcel.

Finally, I wish to close this report by thanking Rod Pugh and Scott Anderson for serving on this committee. And especially I want to thank Susi Jacobo-Vice for her great diligence and invaluable service to St. Mary's Church in her work as our Treasurer. As I depart from the position of Finance Committee Chairperson, it is clear to me that the quality of Susi's work and the clarity of her reports have been the core means whereby St. Mary's has been able to clearly understand, plan, and move forward in our ministry. Thank you Susi, you are wonderful!

Thanks to all those who participated with the many tasks that needed to be done. Planning started in March and the event was not complete until the unsold product was inventoried and returned, and accounts settled in the middle of July. I think that the 5 days that we actually were out in the booth selling fireworks were the hottest days of the entire summer. Sometimes that happens! Kudos to those who participated in the "sweat fellowship". It really was a joy to spend quality time with people who I see only in passing on Sundays, or those I see only occasionally because they attend the other service, and especially those who I had not met at all before. So if there is anything to do differently, it is to somehow bring more customers into our parking lot and reduce expenses. I am open to any ideas that others might have to bring in more traffic. With respect to expenses, there are fixed costs such as fire extinguisher rental, license, inspection, and insurance fees, and booth rental, which could be paid for as gifts from members. And let us all pray for a better 2012!
