Please know that I cannot thank individually in this report all of those I would like to... however to Scott Siers for being Jr. Warden for the last three years and doing so with such a calming presence... to the Vestry who had a very busy and at times tumultuous year and yet each of you had such a positive energy and attitude for St. Mary's and the work we were called to do... to Father David for starting off our year with us and Anne for finishing the year and for the 5 associates and long term supply who helped to keep the church moving in between...to Randy for keeping the grounds looking nice and doing many of the odd jobs we have had... to Lori for her hard work in the office and last but certainly not least to each one of you who came to worship with us at St. Mary's- it is each of you that keep the church acting as Christ in the world. Thanks so much for the honor of allowing me to be your Sr. Warden this year!

So, what happened this year? It was in many ways a tale of two halves. As your Sr. Warden in January I said I would do all I could to be transparent about our common life. We had called Fr. David came to us with information that he would be leaving for a full time hospice position. So by June, we were back beginning a new search process. Even though many of the bigger goals had to be put on hold, I felt we remained very positive and focused on the future.

While I wish I could have gotten to more of the big goals of the church during the year, I will say that we achieved several wonderful things:

- Started a new venture with Tim Gianelli and the use of the property for a monthly yard sale/flea market. (2nd Sat.)
- Continue to have a successful relationship with both Mama's Bootcamp (M, W, Th evenings) and The Free Church of Tonga (Sunday afternoon) who both utilize our church on a regular basis and make our church more visible to the community by their presence.
- Held our first outdoor contemporary Christian concert and have plans to do more in the future.
- Continued to do our outreach projects, including Coats and Backpack for the homeless, food collection for Elk Grove Food Bank, baby items for the Pregnancy Center, adopt-a-family, Thanksgiving baskets (7 this year!), Child Spree, Trunk-or-Treat and many more!!
- Started having Holy Communion at CommUnity once a month followed by a Holy Spirit potluck.
- Began a knitting and crochet ministry to make and hand out prayer shawls to anyone in need of one.
- And we have begun the process of calling a new music director. Thanks Kathy Lawler for your help with music over the past couple years!

As I am leaving the Vestry, I know that we are in a good place with capable leadership. We have increased our reserve fund over the last year to an amount that allows us to no longer worry financially about what the next year will hold. We have hired an amazing new Priest in Charge who will continue to move St. Mary's in the direction led by the Spirit and I have every faith that those big goals will soon be a reality.

Thank you for allowing me the privilege of serving you through this transition and may God bless each of you and God bless St. Mary's.

Annual Report of the Vestry for 2014

January saw our vestry finishing up some business from the previous year. We wanted to purchase a new church membership software for the office, our new HVAC unit had arrived and was about to be installed, and we were waiting for the final paperwork to be signed on our new loan agreement (for the east property) with the Diocese. The month ended with our Annual Meeting and the election of officers and vestry members. We happily welcomed a full slate of vestry members!

During February, the new HVAC was installed (thank you Peter Kabaale), the new vestry was installed and the vestry held their annual retreat. Vestry started discussing the need for repairs to our handicap entrance ramp and what to do with the stained glass windows removed for Our Merciful Savior many years ago. Progress has been made and we are still working on both of these issues.

During March, vestry started meeting on Sunday afternoon. A list of possible projects was developed. Discussion was started about continuing both the Fireworks Booth and the Flea Market. Vestry also approved hosting a Christian Concert in May with Jeff Anderson as the entertainment.

April brought the sad news that Fr. David had accepted a full time position with Hospice. We were sad to know he was leaving but understood it was a wonderful offer for him. We also lost one vestry member because of work conflicts.

May found the vestry starting the calling process again. It was still fresh in our minds so it was easier to begin. There were lots of papers to complete, questions to develop and questions to answer and still needed to attend to the running and repairs to the church. Everyone on vestry was kept very busy!

June and July were bustling months with getting the fireworks booth up and running, welcoming our fourth associate priest (Pastor Ron Zoesch), learning that Canon Britt was leaving, a good lead on how to continue the Flea Market, continued work on the search process paperwork, and forming a search committee for a new Music Director.

August presented two great accomplishments: First, Tim Gianelli will hold Flea Markets on the second Saturday of each month (weather permitting) and give St. Mary's 10% of the proceeds. Eventually he will grow this to include other venders. He will organize and we will receive the booth fees. Second, vestry approved the next step in the discernment process for Julie Vice to seek ordination.

September and October flew by as vestry continued to work on the search process, start getting candidates to run for vestry, continue with the new Flea Market arrangement and prepare for the visit of the Bishop at the end of November. We also had a lead on a Boy Scout that might be interested in rebuilding our entrance ramp as his Eagle Scout project.

November and December - where did they go? Vestry learned that the Music Director Search Committee had not found anyone, that we had four candidates ready to run for the four openings on vestry and our stewardship drive produced enough pledges to almost meet the proposed budget (and more were expected to come in). With this news, vestry approved the budget for 2015. But, the best news of all was that we have a new Priest in Charge (PIC). Everything has been approved, signed and accepted. A great big welcome to Rev. Anne Largent Smith!!

Notes from the Treasurer

The 2014 St. Mary's Budget was based on St. Mary's having a Part-Time Priest-in-Charge. Our 2014 Budge allowed for St. Mary's to cover all operating costs, and keep current on our Promissory Note payments to the Diocese and yet not have to use any Reserve Funds.

We estimated we would be able to increase our Reserve Funds by about \$1,000. However due to a number of factors, our Reserve Fund actually increased by \$56,596.87.

Those factors being:

- Fr. David left St. Mary's in the middle of June, thus no payroll for a Priest-in-Charge for 6-months.
- No Music Accompanist was hired during the year, thus no funds were expensed from this line item.
- Income was higher than expected, and expenses were less than expected.
- St. Mary's received a \$15,956.87 donation via the Episcopal Foundation of Northern California.

Thus at the end of 2014, St. Mary's had a Reserve Fund with a balance of \$141,296.87.

SAINT MARY'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH 27th ANNUAL PARISH MEETING MINUTES January 26, 2014

Opening prayer led by Fr. David at 11:35 am

Voting Instructions: There are two ballots – one for vestry and one for delegates. The vestry candidates were introduced and spoke a little about themselves. It was wonderful to have more candidates than slots on the Vestry! The candidates for Diocesan Convention were announced. Dorothy Stoppelmann and Mary Ann Renzi have volunteered to be alternates, if needed, for the Convention. The Convention this year is one day and being held in Santa Rosa. Mark Voskuil, Mary Ann Renzi and Lynn Holman will count the ballots. Nominations from the floor were opened. There being no nominations, Lynn Holman moved that nominations be closed. Scott Siers seconded. Motion carried. Polls declared open at 11:45. A brief recess was called for voting.

Annual Meeting Minutes from last year: Scott moved we approve the minutes. Harriet seconded. Motion carried.

Reports:

Rector: Fr. David gave a very animated presentation of the State of the Congregation.

Treasurer: Susi Jacobo-Vice presented the financial reports. This year was a transition year, going from a full time to a part time rector. During this time, were able to put \$58,600 into our reserve fund. We also were able to accomplish some much needed repairs on the property such as installing a new well pump, replacing the west side HVAC unit and repairing the back sidewalk. We have started repaying the loan against the East parcel. Actual pledges for 2014 are now \$94,250. The 2014 budget includes regular givers who did not pledge this year. They are included in givers of record. It is a balanced budget! Fr. David recognized all Susi's efforts! (round of applause).

Sexton: Randy Lee was recognized for his all his dedication. Each ministry was then called forward for recognition and participation in building a special communal art work.

Sunday School: Barbara Nill reported on her joys working with the other teachers and the cute little noise makers of our congregation. They are averaging 3 to 6 children each week.

Knit and Crochet Prayer Shawl Ministry: Mary Beth Voskuil reported on the new ministry of knitting and crocheting prayer shawls. She explained what a prayer shawl is, some of the reasons one might be presented to someone, and how you can help to spread this ministry. All members of this ministry came forward to be recognized and participate in the communal art work.

Junior Warden Report: Scott Siers thanked the entire congregation for stepping up to keep the congregation going during our transition. He also thanked all vestry members and Susi Jacobo-Vice as treasurer and Lois Anderson as clerk for their dedicated work. He then covered some of the vestry work through the year.

Senior Warden: Mary Ann Renzi thanked all for being here. You are our church. She then covered more of what the vestry worked on for the year, especially for their work during the calling process which was truly a learning process. One of the major questions was "How do we define a half time priest?" She ended by stating her trust that the Holy Spirit is active and working among us to bring us a glorious future.

Outgoing Vestry: Mary Ann Renzi, Mark Voskuil and Lynn Holman were given presents and thanks for their work.

Communal Art Work: The last of the ministries were recognized (for a small church, we are very active and have a lot of different ministries) and participate in the building of the art work. Fr. David finished it by adding water and a candle. This was to show that with each person doing a small part, there are no holes.

Election: Polls were declared closed. Great thanks to those who counted. The new vestry members are: Judy Cullum, Frances Hartzog, Ellen Kabaale and Harriet McKinnis. A round of applause to those who did not win and an invitation to become active in other ministries. Kathy Lawler, Julie Vice and Dalise Gada will be our representatives to Convention in November.

EGWINS: Eva Moredock was invited to present a report on EGWINS, the community effort to feed and shelter the homeless in our area. It has been a success. People have been helped. The program is constantly making adjustments to serve the people better.

Final Reports: Fr. David reported that the licensing of our Eucharistic Ministers, as required by the Diocese, is almost completed. He also urged those who are interested in seeking ordination to attend the next Parish Ministry Committee meeting.

Fr. Howdy blessed the food. Meeting closed with an invitation to get food and the new vestry to hold a brief meeting to elect the wardens and other business. Closed at 1:06 pm.

Buildings and Grounds Annual Report

Having not kept a detailed log of every hour and/or activity, I can only produce a sketch of what the duties of Sexton has entailed. The following list is an overview of the types of things I have done in 2014. Please understand that this is NOT a comprehensive report.

- St Mary's sits on 4 acres of land, most of which becomes a fire hazard if the weeds are not trimmed and mowed several times during the spring and early summer. At other times of the year, lawn mowing is mostly cosmetic, but yard work also includes breaking fallen limbs (and old blackberry vines/rose trimmings etc) into the Yard Waste cans.
- I supervised the removal of the Fruitless Mulberry at the SW corner of the main building, and removed a dead Ornamental Plum tree from the Parking Lot.
- I mapped out most of the Electrical & Sprinkler Systems.
- Numerous repairs to the sprinklers were made, and the timers were set for a once weekly watering (when needed).
- Several electrical issues were resolved (more so than the usual replacement of light bulbs).
- Several times during the year, the banners on the front signage need to be swapped out, to reflect current events, and IF given advance notice of an event such as a Marriage, Baptism, Memorial Service, etc., I have (tried to) make time to inspect the property to make sure it is presentable.
- Every Thursday, a decision is made regarding the need to roll the waste cans out to the street, and if so, return to the church Friday evening to bring the cans back in. This detail also includes picking up trash that drifts onto the property from surrounding areas, and emptying waste baskets inside the church.
- Blowing out the Parking Lot.
- Annual inspection and lubrication of the bell.
- Seasonal adjustment of timer for the Parking Lot Lights.
- Being on call to respond to any emergencies at the church, and pulling things into and out of storage as may be requested.

As I have said in the past, I am not capable of attending to all of the maintenance on my own, either for safety reasons, or the lack of proper tools, therefore I am asking for any kind of help I can get with grounds keeping duties, but I will NOT burden any person in particular with a request to "step up to the plate". Below is a field of items that I feel need to be taken up by the vestry (perhaps the entire congregation) and dealt with.

Please Note: While there is not enough room to itemize everything that needs to be done to keep St. Mary's functioning, there are some items in particular that are sorely in need of attention:

- 1) There is a gaping hole in the barn roof, which is accelerating the decay of that building.
- 2) The front steps/ramp leading into the Sanctuary are in need of a restoration.
- 3) The tree on the East side of the Portables has a lot of dead wood that needs to be removed.
- 4) The Pump House is a few good wind gusts from falling over, so needs to be rebuilt.
- 5) I almost forgot to mention that the church is technically NOT in compliance with ADA requirements for wheelchair access, as the parking lot does not properly ramp up to the sidewalk.
- 6) the list goes on.

P.S. I would like to thank Peter Kabaale for the splendid work he did on the HVAC unit near the entrance, and also to Jones Electric for the times they came out to the property and explained how I could do things (without charging the church for it).

Liturgical Ministries

The goal of our liturgical ministries is to enable us to enter into a communal experience of God in Word and Sacrament. As the Body of Christ has many parts, so our communal worship is expressed in a diversity of forms. Making this happen requires a labor of love by many people.



Adult Formation

The adult formation class meets on Sunday mornings between the 7:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. services. We started the year studying the Book of Genesis. The book of Genesis is one of the most important books in the Bible. As it is the first book in God's Word, it gives us the foundation for almost everything else that happens or is taught in Scripture. We followed the patriarchal history of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph. The book of Genesis covers roughly the first 2,100 years of human history, from the creation of the world by God to the death of the Israelite, Joseph.

Our second study of the year we are currently studying the Book of Exodus which begins more than four hundred years after Joseph, his brothers, and the Pharaoh he once served have all died. We follow Moses life and his call by God to deliver the Israelites' from slavery in Egypt. We are studying the Laws that God has given to the Israelites, in order to guide them in their relationship with Him.

During Lent this year the adult formation class used the book "Scriptures for the Church Seasons - Lent 2014 - God's Gift of Life". This book is a Lenten study based on the Sunday readings from the Revised Common Lectionary. Through the study of the readings each Sunday for Lent we experienced the blessings of the life given to us through the ministry, suffering, crucifixion, and resurrection of Jesus.

During Advent the adult formation class used the book "Scriptures for the Church Seasons – Advent 2014 – The Lord Is Our Light". Through the study of the readings each Sunday for Advent we came to understand the meaning of our Advent hope, it's message of salvation, and how we are called to live in the meantime.

During Lent we also had an evening Soup and Lenten study. We used the book by Adam Hamilton "The Way – Walking in the Footsteps of Jesus". The book took us on a journey through the life and ministry of Jesus. There was also an accompanying DVD that took us to the holy land to travel to the same places that Jesus traveled. Thank you to those who provided soup and bread for us each week of the Lenten study.

For the first time during Lent we did the Stations of the Cross each Friday night for a total of six Friday nights. Each Friday night a different Stations of the Cross was presented, from Mary's view, to justice and how we care for each other.
