

My sisters and brothers, have you ever imagined what it would be like to be homeless a home? We may not want to imagine it because we know our life would be very miserable—no place to eat, rest and sleep, no place to take a shower. Oh yes, we would all be in trouble. We could get sick easily and be stinky. How about our spiritual home? All people need a place where our spirit can rest, relax, and get refreshed from the burdens in our lives. In this sense, our churches have been spiritual homes for people in our community. This is because our grandparents and great grandparents did a great job of building up God's house together with their spiritual gifts and talents.

I discovered this fact from a little history I read about our churches. Since we celebrate our churches' homecomings in September and October, I would love to look at the histories of Relief and Mt. Olive. I bet our church histories will convince you that although our churches are small, we have been spiritual homes and have enlarged God's comfort and love in our communities.

Did you know that Relief church started with Union Sunday School held in a barn in the



1880's? Soon a school house was erected near the site of the present church, and the Union Sunday School continued to meet in the school house. Then in 1890 at an evangelical meeting led by Rev. Frank Strother, George Thomas Massie became a convert to the Methodist church and donated the lot. Our present church building was built in 1891 and was named Relief MECS Church. It was necessary to build our church because there was no church at "Lickspittle" on Middle Road. To show God's comfort to the area, Mr. Strother set out to raise money to build our church. He said the church would bring the people of Lickspittle relief so the new church was named "Relief." Our church became the center of God's comfort to the community and grew.

How about Mt. Olive's history? In 1843, land was deeded to build a U.B. Church and school house. Then, in 1869 Mt. Olive church was built of wood-frame construction in Hayfield. Our church has served the Hayfield community for over 150 years. While we served the community, our faith also grew. From our church lay people, four members of Mt. Olive became ministers. While focusing on the growth of our faith, the "Olive Oyls" and our youth have contributed in many ways to our community. We do many mission projects like going on mission trips, helping people clean houses and mulch their gardens, and having "Disciples on Deck." We buy hams on Christmas for the needy. We also sponsor the annual cookie exchange, which has been held since **1996.** The children also learn the importance of sharing, manifesting the love of God to others as they are met, including those of different nations of origin and cultures. We believe that Faith means Find others for Jesus Christ; Answer the call; In missions everywhere; Teach and practice discipleship; and Honor God in all you do!

With this amazing cooperation, our grandparents and parents built the foundation of our vision to bring God's comfort, love, and relief to people.

Our churches' histories remind me of two Hebrew words, *Sabar* and *Habas*. *Sabar* means "broken in pieces, crushed, smashed, or destroyed." Brokenhearted means our hearts have been shattered and torn to pieces. The verb, "*Habas*" means "wrapping around, covering, soothing, or releasing pain with olive oil." So "binding up the brokenhearted" means soothing a shattered heart with oil or ointment. The verb gives me the image of the Good Samaritan, who bandaged an injured person after pouring oil and

wine on their wounds. Just like a Good Samaritan, God has bound up people's wounded hearts and has restored our spirits through our churches because we are God's holy temple. God encourages us to be "comforters and counselors" to our community and the world.

Our churches are our spiritual home where God soothes our shattered and wounded hearts with God's comfort and love. In this place, our grandparents and parents laughed, while they enjoyed fellowship and ate delicious fried chicken and biscuits and gravy. Sometimes, they tearfully wrestled with God because their life burdens were so heavy. They became a testimony of God's comfort and love as God's temple. Continuously, we also have shared our laughter, prayers, and tears with each other with confidence in God's comfort. In these places, we have learned that God has reserved a room for all of us in heaven. We are privileged to belong to Jesus Christ and be a part of the body of Christ. As a part of Christ body, we have a responsibility to build up God's house with our spiritual gifts and talents. Since God provides us spiritual gifts to restore wounded hearts, it is our responsibility to use the spiritual gifts we've been given to make God's house strong and beautiful. You may be tempted to ask "Why me? Or "Why do I have to bring something?" This question may come from our low confidence about what God has given to us. I bet God responds to our question "Why me?" with another question "Why not you?" So, let's look around at what we have. Let's bring our God given gifts and abilities and continue to build up a beautiful and vital spiritual home just as our grandparents and parents did. Then you will be amazed how God makes our church our "sweet, sweet, spiritual home" and expand God's comfort in a big way. Can I get an "Amen"? —Seung Hae

Also, in October the group will be decorating small bags for goodies for the VA Outpatient Center in Kernstown to be distributed the week of Veterans Day. Each month, the members look forward to coloring sheets and

word searches that are related to the time of the year.

We are gearing up for our busy time of the year. During the next couple of months, we will be collecting filled Samaritan Purse Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes, a complete meal for a family of four, for Thanksgiving to be distributed in several schools, and bed blankets and other blankets to be distributed to various agencies in the area.

For September: We will distribute shoeboxes to be filled for the Samaritan Purse Operation Christmas Child Program. Shoeboxes will be available on the table in the back of the Sanctuary. Now is the time to start collecting items for these boxes, as back to school supplies are still on sale in many places.

These boxes are due back by October. With each box, please fill out a label (which is in each box) with the age and gender of what is in the box. Also, please don't forget that when we send each box, a shipping and handling charge of \$9 must also be included. These boxes go all around the world. Included with the \$9 donation—this provides for training, and to equip local churches to use Ministry Partner Guides. This resource shows churches how to share the Good News of the Lord in a child-friendly way. Also, this donation provides The Greatest Gift Gospel Booklets, which is written in the children's language and distributed with each shoebox gift. Boxes can be put on the front pew in the Sanctuary or in the Willing Workers Classroom on or before the due time of October 6th.

For October and November: We will again be collecting Thanksgiving Bags. You can buy an item each week, and then put together a Thanksgiving Bag to be distributed to area schools on Monday, November 25th. Bags MUST be at the church on or before November 24th. Grocery bags are available in the back of the Sanctuary. Once a bag has been completed, they can be brought and put either on the front pew of the Sanctuary or in the Willing Workers Classroom on or any time before the due date of November 24th.

Here are the items needed for each bag: 1 large can of green beans or two smaller cans, 1 box turkey stuffing mix, 1 can of cranberry sauce, 1 packet of Idaho mashed potatoes (only those that need only water), 1 box of pie crust mix (9 oz.), 1 small can (5 oz.) evaporated milk, 1 can turkey gravy, 1 \$15 gift card (to buy turkey & ½ doz. eggs). This bag will total approximately \$25. Due on or before November 24th.

<u>September, October, & November</u>: During these three months, we will also collect blankets. All New blankets are accepted, pillows, or sleeping bags. Particularly needed are all sizes of bed blankets. These can be brought anytime, and also, others items, please leave on the front pew of the Sanctuary or in the Willing Workers Classroom.

Thanks for your support of the mission and outreach in our community and around the world with these projects. This lets folks know that there are others who care.


