EXPLORING ALL SOULS – Small Group Ministry session BELONGING IN COMMUNITY: BEING A UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST CONGREGANT

OPENING WORDS & CHALICE LIGHTING:

PURPOSE: We come together to build connections and to talk about what deeply matters.

CHECK IN: How is it with your spirit? What did you leave behind to be here today?

READING OF GROUP COVENANT We will be here for about an hour and while here, we will abide by a set of agreed upon ground rules (called a Covenant). For the sake of time, here are the proposed ground rules (covenant):

- 1. We will practice deep listening. This means we will simply listen when another talks without "cross talk" (commenting, interrupting, negating, or giving advice).
- 2. We will share the time equally and fairly.
- 3. We will share our reflections from our own personal experiences

FOCUS: Belonging in Community

Each person in the group speaks uninterrupted; if time remains, general response and conversation are welcome.
