If there is no resurrection from the dead,

Then not even Christ has been raised.

And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless

And so is your faith.

(1 Corinthians 15: 13-14)

Paul, in his first letter to the Corinthians, states his case clearly and succinctly: Easter, he says, is the defining event in Christianity. Without Jesus' resurrection, all our words, all our ministry is pointless exercise – and we are lying to ourselves. If this is the case then we are, among all people, the most to be pitied.

But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead...(!)

(1 (orinthians 15: 20)

As Christians, we are an *Easter people*. We believe in God's love and forgiving grace. We believe that nothing, not even death, can separate us from that love and grace. Why? Because we believe that death is not the end, that Jesus, in his resurrection, conquered death once and for all - for all people. If we do not recognize Jesus as the Risen Christ, then no other part of Christianity means anything.

It is easy for Easter to be neglected in our world, in our society. The *Holy Day* has become a *holiday*, complete with an extended shopping season, and cute mascots that have nothing to do with the Christian celebration. The worship part of Easter can become something that gets squeezed in if there is time. When that happens, the events that we celebrate at Easter – the resurrection of Jesus, and his promise that we too will be raised like him – fade into the background.

Whatever else you do to celebrate Easter on April 20<sup>th</sup>, find the time to worship. If you are with out-of-town family, go to their church, or visit a church if they don't attend one. If they are here, bring them to our worship; we'll make room. We will have services at 7:00 a.m. in the garden, at 8:15, and at 10:45. The Good News of the resurrection will be proclaimed in scripture and in song. If you are away from home and family, you can probably find a church within driving distance. If you can't worship with others, find a way to worship privately, thanking God for the great gift of life, now and forever, through Jesus Christ.

It's what we're all about.



#### **Great House**

by Nicole Cross



For twenty-five years, a reclusive American novelist has been writing at the desk she inherited from a young Chilean poet who disappeared at the hands of Pinochet's secret police; one day a girl claiming to be the poet's daughter arrives to take it away, sending the writer's life reeling. Across the ocean, in the leafy suburbs of London, a man caring for his dying wife discovers, among her papers, a lock of hair that unravels a terrible secret. In Jerusalem, an antiques dealer slowly reassembles his father's study, plundered by the Nazis in Budapest in 1944.

Connecting these stories is a desk of many drawers that exerts a power over those who possess it or have given it away. As the narrators of **Great House** make their confessions, the desk takes on more and more meaning, and comes finally to stand for all that has been taken from them, and all that binds them to what has disappeared.

**Great House** is a story haunted by questions: What do we pass on to our children and how do they absorb our dreams and losses? How do we respond to disappearance, destruction, and change?


