



Message from the Pastor:

Easter is coming relatively early this year, on April 5th. Last year it was on April 20th, (although next year it will be back on March 27th.) Many people have asked me how anyone can tell when it is going to be in a given year.

Well, the easy way, of course, is to check a calendar, or a chart that shows the date of Easter over a period of time. (There is one in the United Methodist Book of Worship that gives the dates from 1992 - 2020.) The date of Easter is not set arbitrarily, however, even though it may seem that way. I'll tell you how it is determined, but first some background.

The Church grew up out of the Jewish culture, with its lunar-based calendar, in the midst of the Roman Empire, with its solar-based calendar (the so-called Julian calendar). Later, in 1582, the Gregorian calendar (with Leap Years) was adopted in Western Europe, but not in some other areas where Christians lived, such as Russia and the Ottoman Empire. While all the churches in all the various regions agreed that Easter was their most important Holy Day, they differed as to when it was to be celebrated. Even today, Eastern Orthodox churches calculate Easter according to the Julian calendar.

Easter is intimately tied to the Jewish festival of Passover or "Pesach," which commemorates the deliverance of the Israelites out of bondage in Egypt. (From "Pesach" we get the adjective "*paschal*": having to do with Easter or Passover.) Easter is the Christian commemoration of the deliverance of *all* humanity from the bondage of sin and death by the death and resurrection of Jesus. Jesus celebrated the meal that begins Passover with his disciples on the night before his death. For many years the Church celebrated Passover as a commemoration of the crucifixion of Jesus. It was celebrated on the fourteenth day of the Jewish lunar month of Nisan, the date of the first Good Friday. Over the first three centuries of the Church, it also came to be a celebration of the resurrection. The Gospels tell us that Jesus rose on the first day of the week (Sunday), the day after the Passover Sabbath. It was argued by some Church leaders that the Resurrection celebration should be on Sunday, rather than whatever day of the week the 14th of Nisan fell. Some regions began to observe the Sunday after 14th of Nisan for Passover. There were also different ways of calculating when Nisan started, since no one was using the lunar calendar anymore. In 325 A.D., the Church agreed that Easter would be a Resurrection celebration on Sunday, and so it is to this day.

So, I promised to tell you how the date of Easter is determined... Easter is the first Sunday after the full moon following the Vernal (spring) Equinox. That means that Easter may fall anywhere from March 22nd to April 25th, (and it does!).

Simple! Aren't you glad you asked?

May your Easter be filled with blessings!

Message from Deacon Dee:

- Have you ever said, *THEY NEVER ASK ME* to help?
- Have you ever said, I *WISH* I could do that?
- Have you ever said, I *WOULD LIKE TO TRY THAT*...
- Have you ever said, I *WISH I COULD* make a difference?
- What's stops *YOU* from *VOLUNTEERING* or *DOING SOMETHING*???

1 PERSON can make a difference. I sat in the school yard in Nicaragua last month with 150 children and youth. I could see many changes from 9 years ago my first time seeing it. More classroom buildings, running water, real bathrooms, and outstanding classroom teaching. There was joy on the kids faces as they were learning and growing together. Their future depends on education. The country dropout rate is 60% by 6th grade. The hope is they will be equipped to sustain themselves and live healthy, productive lives. We sponsor a child in 2nd grade thanks to GUMC Young Adult, Vicki Standhart (1 PERSON who said I need to do this!).

The Mission of Peace (for U.M. Youth of the Northeast) to see the church in action. This journey began in 1986, when 1 YOUTH asked a Bishop how youth could help transform the world. The answer was *YOU CAN*. Each year since, different youth travel areas of the world as Followers of Christ. I attended 6 times. Brad and Vicki have gone. It is life changing for the participants and people there. Spiritual Journey + hearing the situation of the people = Transformation. 1 PERSON to 1 PERSON.

In 2003, the MOP trip to Nicaragua. A missionary shared the info that 80% of country people are in poverty. Desperate people lived in survival mode. She showed the youth and adults the garbage dump where 175 families lived. A Youth asked, YOU live here and YOU know about this, so what can YOU do about it? She stayed up all night and prayed. She came back and the answer to prayer was a plan to buy land to offer a new home to the Christian families and give them the opportunity to move out to the country and live a new life.

The People moved to Chacoente in 2003. The Christian School was started by the families in 2005. Now the neighborhood children come. Hope and a future were now available to the people. Today, a hot meal and good learning will help kids have a better future. The first graduating class happened. Area children come from near and far to attend this school.

LIVES WERE CHANGED BY 1 PERSON + 1 PERSON= Many lives have changed...Ask Emily Kester, Ellegra/Rhyse Nier, Missy Symonds, Jonathan Standhart or Chris Collins or ME.

SO... at Greece UMC don't wait for someone to ask you if you can help. Pray and ask what can I do??? We are going thru many transitions and we need to change our ways of thinking. We NEED Leaders, Sunday morning Greeters and projection people, Outreach opportunities and so much more can be done in the name of Christ to the World. WE need DOERS of the WORD.

SO... WHAT CAN YOU DO? Pray about it... and ask the question...YOU ARE NEEDED!!!

In a book called “Enough” – “Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity” Adam Hamilton discusses what he calls the “Four Keys to Contentment”.. He is senior pastor of the UMC of the Resurrection in Leawood, Kansas, one of the fastest growing, most highly visible churches in the country. He goes on to list and discuss them: 1) “Remember that it could be worse”, 2) “Ask yourself, “How long will this make me happy””, 3) “Develop a grateful heart”, 4) “Ask yourself “Where does my soul find true satisfaction””.

In the third, “Develop a grateful heart” , he says “Gratitude is essential if we are to be content. We can spend a lot of time looking at what’s wrong or missing in our lives. We can focus on things we don’t like and focus on disappointments. The alternative is to search for things we do like and be grateful for them; we can give thanks for blessings in our lives. To quote him “Likewise when we begin to be grateful and express gratitude to God, over time we find our hearts have changed and we are grateful for what we have. Then we are able to be content”.

What are the focuses in your life – the disappointments, what’s missing or are you grateful for what you do have? Where do you stand in considering what you’ll give back to God from your blessings? Again, to quote the author, “Our tithes and offerings are a tangible sign of our desire to live wholly for God. They are an expression of gratitude, worship and praise. They demonstrate that we put God first in our lives. They are an investment in God’s work through the church. And, without a doubt, they are pleasing to God.”

Who chooses which sins are worse than others?

How would you rate the following sins...? Is one worse than another?

These things (and many more) happen every day.

- That lady at the grocery store who drags her 4 year old daughter to the car, all the while hurling insults and threats.
- Gluttony
- That teenager who snuck out of her house to meet up with her boyfriend and have premarital sex.
- Murder.
- The youth league baseball coach who swears at the kids when they need 'motivation'.
- The dad who sits on his computer at night watching online pornography.
- Stealing.
- The school teacher who gets high 'once in a while', just to cope.
- Prostitution.
- People who gossip.
- Putting someone down – either in front of them or behind their back
- The guy on the riding mower, who lusts after his neighbor's wife while she's sunning herself on her deck.
- Extra-marital sex.
- That person at the traffic light who just wished the guy who sped past him would get into a car accident.
- The 6th grader who lied to his parents when they asked him if he had done his homework.

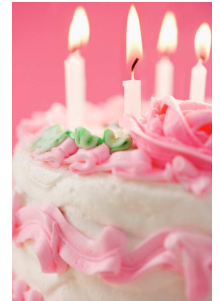
