Do No Harm Do Good

Stay in Love with God

-John Wesley (as paraphrased by Bishop Reuben Job)

As a United Methodist pastor is ready to be ordained, they stand before the entire Conference, and are asked the 19 "Historic Questions." These were formulated by John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, and have been asked of every Methodist preacher from the very beginning. Two of the historic questions are: "Do you know the General Rules of our Church?" and "Will you Keep them?"

The General Rules are not just for the clergy of the church, nor are they a requirement for salvation, but rather, they are a guide for those who have sought salvation in Christ, and want to continue as his disciples. They have been distilled by Bishop Reuben Job into these "Three Simple Rules:" Do No harm, Do Good, and Stay in Love with God.

Wesley suggests things to avoid that might cause harm, and things to embrace that might do good for God and others. He also suggests ways to (in Bishop Job's words) "stay in love with God." Wesley uses the words, "attend upon the ordinances of God." The "ordinances are: Public Worship of God, Ministry of the Word (read or expounded), The Lord's Supper or Holy Communion, Family and Private Prayer, Searching the Scriptures, and Fasting or Abstinence.

God may be encountered in many places and many activities, including strolling in the forest, driving along the coast, or curled up in a favorite chair.. However, Wesley knew that there are certain places and certain activities where one is *sure* to encounter and be in relationship with God. The "ordinances" are places where God has promised to be present. They are places where I open myself and invite God in. They are places where people are actively looking for God. Whenever two or three are gathered to worship, God has promised to be there. Whenever we pray, we open ourselves to God's presence and invite God into our lives with response to our prayers. As we read the Bible, study the Word, and listen as the Word is taught and preached, we encounter the message that God has prepared for us from the beginning. As we fast, or deny our bodily desires in other ways, we create an awareness of need within us that God can, and will, fill. And as we take into ourselves the bread and (unfermented) wine of The Lord's Supper, we receive in our selves the Spirit of the living, saving Christ.

What you do after you say, "yes" to God in your life is discipleship. Discipleship is staying in love with God, and staying in love with God requires being where God is. You may find many places where you may be aware of God's presence. But why not look first where God has promised to be, where you can be sure to encounter God. It happens that all of those places can be found in the fellowship of the church. I invite you to join us for worship. I encourage you to spend time with friends from church, or get to know a few. I urge you to pray and listen for answers. Do it by yourself if you choose, but it's even more satisfying with others. Read the Bible and really think about it. Read the margin notes and footnotes; join a Bible study.

Living the life of a disciple of Jesus Christ may raise lots of questions, raise many challenges, and may not be easy. But the General Rules are simple: Do No Harm, Do Good, Stay In Love With God.

Proposal for New Worship Times and Format

I want you to be aware of, and have a chance to comment on, a proposal from me and the worship staff, coming out of discussions in the church over the past couple of years. We are inviting you, the congregation, to comment (share your thoughts and opinions, worries or excitement) on this proposal. No final decisions have been made. This has not yet been approved by the Church Council; be assured that it will be approved by Church Council before it is implemented.

We are proposing that we change our worship and education times (currently 8:15 worship without choir, 9:30 Sunday School, and 10:45 worship with choir) to the following:

9:00 Traditional worship with choir

10:00 Education and Fellowship Time

11:00 Non-traditional worship with the Praise Band leading music.

Traditional Worship is intended to mean "the worship service that we have been used to."

Non-Traditional Worship will include scripture, preaching, and singing, but may also include drama, dialogues, video, and other expressions of worship.

It is our hope to provide new ways for new people to experience worship and become disciples of Jesus Christ, while keeping a place for those who find strength for their journey of discipleship in a more traditional style. I like to think of it in terms of the "improvements" being made to I-390 near the U of R. We are providing new "on-ramps", new ways for people to get involved in the journey.

We are inviting people to comment, and we have set up a special e-mail account for that purpose: gumcworshipteam@gmail.com. You may also speak to me in person, or call or write to me (or Deacon Dee Finch, or Music Director Sharon Neary, or Praise Team coordinator Ed Klingenberger) at the church (1924 Maiden Lane, Rochester 14626, phone: 585-225-1880). We are hoping to begin the new schedule on Sunday September 7, 2014.

Thoughts from Deacon Dee:

Recently I read a book entitled, 10 Temptations of Church: Why Churches Decline & What to Do About It, by Flowers and Vannoy. The book reminded me that we seem to look at Church through different needs and experiences. I began to wonder what does the Church mean to you? We want the Church to be there in times of need: Marriage, Baptism, Death, and Emotional/Life Problems. For others it might be for spiritual growth and preparation to share the Good News about Jesus and bring love and hope. Can you articulate what the Church is for you? Is God/Jesus part of it? Below are just a few thoughts that were in the book.

The book reminds us of 10 Temptations we fall into as we are inheriting a faith community that started 2,000 year ago. As I read I realized this is a book about Hope for the future of the Church, if we are willing to ask some hard questions. Some of the info revealed does apply to GUMC,. It points out we need to look in the mirror at what and how we do Church as we continue to survive and change. We should be looking around at the churches that are growing around us as we struggle as a congregation to survive in a busy town and we live our busy lives with time or energy constraints.

Charles Darwin said, "It is not the strongest of the species that survive, nor the most intelligent, but the ones most responsive to change." It is our human nature that we like things the way they have been or are right now. Habits are easy to form. We like comfort and knowing Church will remain the same for us, but this book reminds me there is no guarantee that GUMC will be here in 10 years without change. Our comfort levels might be stretched a bit but if we are to be open to all outside our doors then something needs to happen. Are we just going to say it's ok to let the future people deal with it all? The new ways to do things as we offer being a faithful Church?

Our Bishop has said more than once, if the 1950s return we are so ready to do Church. But they are not going to return to the way we did it then so what can we do to include 3 generations of people out there who are not walking in our doors today? That is a question I am pondering and hope you will step into conversation with Matt and I and others who are committed to learning how to create a renewal @GUMC.

Moses lived with the people of God in the desert for 40 years. They were unhappy people a lot of the time. Complaining and wanting to go back to what they knew, Moses interceded for them to God. God provided an answer. Those brave enough to gaze with eyes of faith were healed, those who refused to gaze suffered and died. (Numbers 21:7-9). They sure had a wakeup call to be willing to change.

This book is worth reading and I hope we have opportunity to gather for discussion. It is about getting vision of the future and what can be. The people who were in the early church grew to have understanding they were to share the Good News to the world and literally went there. Leaders in GUMC history had vision of what could be and many of you were part of it in faith.

If we are the Church today YOU & Me, a leader or not...we all need to be part of the future Church.





Kabul Beauty School: An American Woman Goes Behind the Veil

by Deborah Rodriguez

Soon after the fall of the Taliban, in 2001, Deborah Rodriguez went to Afghanistan as part of a group offering humanitarian aid to this war-torn nation. Surrounded by men and women whose skills—as doctors, nurses, and therapists—seemed eminently more practical than her own, Rodriguez, a hair-dresser and mother of two from Michigan, despaired of being of any real use. Yet she soon found she had a gift for befriending Afghans, and once her profession became known she was eagerly sought out by Westerners desperate for a good haircut and by Afghan women, who have a long and proud tradition of running their own beauty salons. Thus an idea was born.

With the help of corporate and international sponsors, the Kabul Beauty School welcomed its first class in 2003. Well meaning but sometimes brazen, Rodriguez stumbled through language barriers, overstepped cultural customs, and constantly juggled the challenges of a postwar nation even as she learned how to empower her students to become their families' breadwinners by learning the fundamentals of coloring techniques, haircutting, and makeup.

It's always difficult to find something new to say about giving, but a page in Max Lucado's devotional Bible does a great job of talking about Tithing; the following isn't a complete quote, but summarizes some of what he says, so here goes:

"You don't give for God's sake. You give for your sake. "The purpose of tithing is to teach you to always put God first in your lives" (Deutoronomy 14:23)."" He goes on to describe how every action of your regular giving shows how each step teaches you something about tithing. First completing the date reminds us we are time-bound creatures. That everything we have will rust or burn – best to give while you can.

The bank won't cash your check made out to God, so you make it out to the church or group that earned your trust. Next comes the amount – the moment of truth. You're not just entering an amount, you're making a confession. A confession that God owns it all anyway. What do you enter in the memo line? Some of it goes for salaries, some for the light bill, some for music, some for outreach, etc., so if you're like me, you simply put "Pledge". All in all, it's a partial payment for what the church has done for you in raising your family or maintaining your nearness to God. Max Lucado ends with "Or, perhaps, best yet, it's for you. It's a moment for you to clip yet another strand from the rope of earth so that when he returns you won't be tied up."

Barbara Glanz, internationally known author, speaker, and consultant specializing in creative communication, likes to stress the importance of adding a personal "signature" to our work. She shares a variety of stories, illustrating this concept of "differentiating yourself"-- from an airline pilot who randomly selected several passengers to send a hand-written note, thanking them for their business-- to the manager who decided to attach Kleenex to memos that he knew his employees wouldn't like very much. But my favorite example is the story of Johnny, a grocery store cashier (with Down Syndrome) who decided to enclose a typewritten "thought for the day" strip, tucked "with a flourish" into each customer's grocery bag. Pretty soon, the line at Johnny's checkout was three times longer than anyone else's! Not only did Johnny delight his customers, but he inspired other store workers: for example, one of the meat packers loved Snoopy, so he bought 50,000 Snoopy stickers and added a sticker each time he packaged a piece of meat. That workplace had spirit!

What's So Important About Ministry Shares Anyways? (aka Apportioned Funds)?

As United Methodists, we believe that that every person is of sacred worth, and that every person has valuable gifts and graces that make a difference in the world. We also know that by working together, we can accomplish much more than we can alone. That is part of the reason we participate in what we call a "connectional church" structure.

When people contribute to a local United Methodist Church, they support the ministries of that church in that community. Their financial contributions help provide spiritual programs and services for that community, including staff costs, materials, and building maintenance.

But we also work together, beyond our own churches and communities, to share God's gifts with the world. The "first mile" of this sharing takes place through "apportioned funds," or what we in Upper New York Conference call "ministry shares." There are Conference and District Ministry Shares, which support ministries regionally, and General Church Ministry Shares, which support ministries throughout the world.

Together, through our connected congregations and those who support them, we accomplish what no single church, district or annual conference ever could hope to do. In this way, each individual, each family, each congregation gives a fair share for the church's work. We combine our prayers, presence, gifts and service to make a significant difference in the lives of God's people...in every place we can...as often as we can.
