Christmas is coming; the goose is getting fat. Please put a penny in the old man's hat. If you haven't got a penny - a ha'penny will do. If you haven't got a ha'penny -

God bless you!

Many of us know this song from our childhood. It's a Christmas classic that should never be lost. It speaks to our time – when some of us have fat geese, some have geese that are skin and bones because their food had to go to feed the children, and others – well, their goose is cooked.

It speaks of charity – a word that lost a lot of its "oom-pah" when the King James Version of the Bible gave way to modern translations which changed the translation of 1 Corinthians 13. It no longer spoke of "charity," but of "love." ("Now abideth Faith, Hope, and Charity [Love]; but the greatest of these is Charity [Love]") It's still the same word in the original Greek – agape (pronounced ah-gah-pay) – the same word that equals God in 1 John 4:8 - "God is love (agape)." Still, modern translators agree that "charity" is a less-than-correct translation of agape.

What comes of our scholarly correctness is a loss of the knowledge that Christian "love" is not a feeling, but an action. Love in action takes many forms, and may be limited by one's abilities and resources. Few of us could afford to feed the hungry of Greece (much less Rochester) for a year, or probably even a day. But almost all of us can donate a can of tuna to the Greece Food Shelf. Just about any of us can serve a meal at the Salem Nutrition Center or prepare gifts for the youth at the Villa of Hope. And those who cannot can pray for themselves and others alongside the more affluent. "If you haven't got a penny, a half-penny will do; if you haven't got a half-penny, God bless you."

This Christmas, (if not always), find a way to turn your love into charity. Put a few coins in the hand of someone asking for help along the road, or a greenback in the Kettle, or a check in the mail to your favorite organization. Put a toy in the barrel; put food in the pantry; put a pair of mittens on the tree; cut your hair for kids with cancer. Donate clothing, or swing a hammer for Habitat for Humanity. Invite a single person to dinner, and listen to their story. Do something concrete instead of something symbolic.

And for God's sake - as well as your own and others' – let someone love you in the way you need it most. Be a "charity case."

We are all "charity cases," you know. "God so loved (agapao) the world that he gave his only begotten son." God gave, not because we deserved it, but because we needed it – that's charity. "Brothers and sisters if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another" (I John 4:11).

This year, we invite you to join us in celebrating Christmas with your church family. On Saturday, December 5th, we will have a "Hanging of the Greens," decorating the church at 4:30 p.m., with craft activities, a short worship service at 5:30, and Supper at 6:00. On Sunday, December 6th, there will be a New Member Orientation, and reception of new members on December 13th, during worship. On December 13th, the men of the church will prepare breakfast at 8:00 for the United Methodist Women. On Christmas Eve, Tuesday December 24th, there will be two services: a family service at 4:00 p.m., and the traditional candlelight service at 7:00 p.m. An envelope is enclosed for you to make a special contribution to the church for Christmas.

May God bless you and yours, at Christmas, and always.

Thoughts from Deacon Dee:

Christmas is coming!!!! Christmas is coming!!!!

I have heard it said more than once this week and there is a note of panic and terror in the voices saying it. My reaction...Wow, really? I ask myself are they really that upset that Jesus' Birthday is coming? We all like to celebrate and recognize our birthdays with parties and receive gifts. Hummm... I wonder how they will spend Jesus' Birthday.

When asked about the true meaning of Christmas, 70% of children said it's about celebrating the birth of Christ, 39% said it's about being thankful, 37% said it's about spending time with family, and 13% said it's about receiving gifts.

Only 37% of the more than 2,000 adults surveyed claimed Jesus and God to be the reason they celebrate Christmas, according to a report from USA Today. Yet, further reports show that 80% to 90% of Americans observe Christmas. Other reasons people say they celebrate:

Being with family and friends Celebration and joy Giving, sharing, and helping Being thankful

Ask yourself, what kind of birthday present would Jesus want on his birthday? I think you know the answer without a lot of deep thought. My prayer thought this Advent is: what do I need to say NO! to, so I can say YES to God and the ways I should spend time in preparation of Jesus' Birthday.

Imagine if as a family or individual you came up with 12 acts of service you can perform together or as individual during December. For example, shovel snow for a neighbor, donate extra blankets to a homeless shelter, and deliver cookies and cocoa to homebound seniors, buy a gift for the Villa of Hope family Christmas giving or bought extra food for the food shelf as families will need help during this time. Lots of ideas come to mind.

Pay for the person's order in line behind you. Ask the cashier to tell the person it's a gift from God.

Lines, lines, lines. People are in such a hurry with Christmas shopping. Encourage your children or yourself to help spot someone you'll let go in front of you in line. Smile...

Volunteer to help an elderly neighbor or friend gift-wrap presents. Then deliver the wrapped packages to the person with a plate of baked goodies.





By now you will have received our annual stewardship appeal mailing and are considering or have decided on your annual commitment for 2016. We hope you have prayerfully considered how you can support our staff and our programs. One of the key goals in next year's budget was to maintain our programs, keep our facility in good condition and to meet our shared ministries commitment at 100%. This all depends on your response to the appeal for your time, talent and financial support.

Soon, our Church Council will be asked to approve the budget for next year. The Finance Committee has been hard at work to develop that budget. Committee leaders have done their best to submit their needs to support their part of our ongoing programs to keep them meaningful and attractive to our members and potential new members. It's important that we meet all those suggestions in the "Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations" series that were the basis for our recent worship services. Radical Hospitality, Passionate Worship, Intentional Faith Development, Risk Taking Mission and Service, Extravagant Generosity were themes for those services. Are we a warm, inviting congregation to visitors – what do they see and feel when they enter our church? Is there passion to our worship that connects people to God and one another? Do we offer programs that help people develop in their faith through Sunday School and other programs? Do our outreach programs take us to places and tasks outside our comfort zones? Does our giving of time, talent and finances support the first four practices?

Throughout November, you received the stewardship letters, heard or experienced presentations about our outreach, our finances and a family experience. November 22nd was targeted for Commitment Sunday. The results of those commitments and our other sources of income will hopefully support the programs planned for next year. 10 Simple (AND FREE!) Things That YOU (yes, YOU) Can Do TODAY


