Message from the Pastor:

A friend of mine, Doug Spencer, a retired pastor, writes a weekly commentary on at least one of the Lectionary scriptures, (a list of proposed Bible readings for churches to use in worship). This week He wrote about the third chapter of 1 Samuel (the ninth book of the Old Testament). He got me thinking about prayer, and what God can do. Samuel is a child who has been dedicated to the service of God, and lives in the Temple and spends his time as an "altar boy" for the Priest, Eli. In Samuel's time "the word of the Lord was rare." In the third chapter of 1 Samuel, the boy begins to hear God's call on his life to be a Prophet, one who speaks the word of God. His first prophecy is a word to Eli, the priest. It is bad news, though true, for Eli and his sons (I'll let you read about it in the Bible). Samuel goes on to be the leader of the people for a time, and the prophet to Saul and David, Kings of Israel.

But the story of God's work in the life of Samuel begins long before.

Hannah, a woman who longs to bear a child, comes into the temple to pray for a pregnancy and the birth of a child. She prays so fervently that Eli, the High Priest at the time, thinks she is drunk. God's answer to her prayer is the child Samuel. She expresses her gratitude to God by giving the boy into God's service. God responds by allowing her to give birth to 5 more children. Further, God responds by working through Samuel to bring a revival of the life of his nation: politically, militarily, and spiritually. Just as his mother's emptiness, disappointment and sense of loss was healed through her prayers, the spiritual and social barrenness and loss of his people were also healed, as an unforeseen work of God – the result of her prayer and sacrifice.

Jesus said: "I came that [you] may have life, and have it abundantly." John 10: 10)

The witness of the Bible is that it continues to be the will of God to bring us goodness and abundance of life when we are willing to enter into relationship with God through prayer and sacrifice. It is not the will of God that our trouble continue to define us. I invite us to be in prayer for ourselves, for those around us in need, and for our church as we experience loss and a need for new direction. Our prayers should be as fervent and heartfelt as Hannah's. I invite us to offer not only our prayers, but our presence, our gifts, our service, and our witness. These are the pledges that we make as we become members of the church. These are the ways that God uses to work in us and through us.

Let's see what God can do – through us.

Thoughts from Deacon Dee: Article from Ministry Matters. Why do good churches die?

From an article written By Rebecca Simon Peter. I'm not talking about churches that have an apparent fatal flaw like mean or nasty people, terrible location, clergy sexual misconduct, uninspiring worship or the like. Churches can and do recover from all of those things.

No, I'm talking about good churches that care about people, hold decently inspiring and cohesive services, are doing their best to reach out and respond to a changing world, are led by a committed leader and backed up by laity who truly care. Good churches. Why do *they* die?

Theories abound, including changing demographics, young people leaving the church or not being raised in church at all, the rise in the spiritual but not religious crowd, the appearance of "nones" and "dones" — those who have no religious affiliation or once did but have now retired from church — and the changing culture around us. Yes, these factors all play a part. But churches can and do transcend these factors too.

There is one hidden reason why churches that seem to be doing it all right still die. I want to share that with you today, plus four hints to help you discover if this hidden reason is operative in your church, and what to do about it. The secret reason good churches die is they lack a vision. In fact, I believe 100% of church decline and demise is due to this.

Here's how you know you lack a vision:

- 1. Your current vision doesn't expand assumptions about what is possible. Instead, it describes what you are already doing. For example, let's say your church's vision is "Extending the love of Christ to the heart of our community." Let's say in the past, against all odds, you started an outreach to the homeless with food, clothing and prayer. Once upon a time it seemed impossible to do. But now you are doing it on a regular basis. Guess what? It's no longer a vision. Now it's a program. Time for a new vision. Because a program, no matter how positive, won't keep a church alive.
- **2.** Your questions change from "Who is God calling us to reach" to "How can we avoid losing what we have?" The first question is forward-looking, outward-focused and risky. The second question is backward-looking, inward-centered and cautious. It's a sign that maintaining structure has become more important than doing real ministry. Also, that fear has become more important than the gospel.
- **3.** You have not put your own credibility on the line when articulating what's next. In other words, you are trying to look good, be liked, not rock the boat, save your job or save the church. Jesus put his own credibility on the line when he cast his vision that the kingdom of heaven was at hand. So much so that Rome crucified him for sedition as "King of the Jews." But his vision worked! Here we are 2,000 years later, still organizing around it and implementing it. I'm not saying we will be crucified for having a vision. I am saying that putting our own credibility on the line, for the sake of the vision, is the only way we can be agents of transformation.
- **4. You are waiting for someone else to come up with a vision.** If you are leading in any capacity whether you're in charge of the Rugrats Ministry or you lead a team of 20 denominational executives, it is your responsibility to come up with a vision. That's what leaders do. Waiting for someone else may be a sign that it's time to retire or to retool your understanding of leadership.

You can tell when you are in the presence of a visionary leader, congregation or denomination. It's exciting, invigorating and a little bit scary. You sense purposeful movement, forward direction and perhaps more faith than you yourself currently possess.

Here's the point: If they can do it, you can do it! Good churches don't need to die. And good leaders don't need to let them! Envision a future that expands assumptions about what is possible, get back to asking the right questions, take risks and be the one to get the ball rolling. This has the power to unify even the most disparate group.

Then, new life is not only possible, it's inevitable!

From Dee: What's next will require the Church to Be the Church and for people to step up and regroup.

Message from SPRC:

As you may know, a congregational meeting was held on Sunday January 11. The major issue before this Church Conference was the SPRC recommendation that we reduce Deacon Dee's Nurturing Ministries Coordinator position to ½ time, starting in July and that we eliminate Amada Lowell's position of Church Secretary as soon as possible. Approximately 100 people attended, listened to a detailed presentation, and participated in a lively discussion period. The recommendation was adopted.

These changes were motivated by a recognition that, due to moves and deaths, the church's income for this year will likely be substantially lower than what is needed to function as we have in the past. The changes reduce the personnel budget in ways that will have the smallest possible impact on programs, services and attendance and will allow a more balanced budget for 2015.

We all deeply regret that these steps were necessary and our hearts go out to Mandy Lowell and her family and to Deacon Finch as they face change and uncertainty. We thank Mandy for her many years of professional service.

These changes also represent a challenge to all of us. I believe that if we continue to support our church and its programs and services with renewed commitments of time, talent and money, GUMC can survive and grow and spread the word of God's grace in the coming months and years.

STEWARDSHIP



At the recent charge conference, we voted to eliminate the Church Secretary position as paid staff and to reduce the Deacon position to half time effective July 1st, 2015. While this brings our budget in balance, it puts more emphasis on the need for congregational stewardship, especially in the time/talent categories.

At the conference several questions were raised and, hopefully, satisfactorily answered. There certainly are ways we could avoid some of these changes. It was estimated that a 25% increase in our individual giving would cover the current budget gap. One time extra donations would cover the gap for this year, but wouldn't solve the fiscal problem for the long-term. The conclusion was that the only practical solutions were those that were approved.

How can you help? First of all, see what you can do to increase your annual giving either through increasing your commitment or making additional donations as you can manage. Secondly, consider where you can help. Stewardship of time and talent are necessary; here are some examples of stewardship opportunities for dedicated leadership or support from the Charge Conference presentation:

Education: Sunday School, small group studies, vacation adventures (VBS), Nursery, Youth activities

Hospitality: Fellowship hour, Greeting/welcome center, memorial service receptions

Fellowship/Family Life: Game nights, special events

Caring for Others (Heart to Heart): call on homebound and hospitalized, take communion to those same people.

Mission beyond our walls: Food and clothing projects, Bible classes for elderly, mission trips

Lead or support fundraisers: Chicken bbqs, pig roasts, pasta dinners, etc., Church community meal gatherings,

Summerfest, etc.

Other tasks: Keep outside sign current, promote camp and retreat opportunities, coordinate communication and publicity

Church Office: Phone and physical coverage daily (9:00am-1:00pm), computer skills, produce worship service bulletins and inserts, coordinate volunteers, manage supplies inventory, keep master office calendar, update web calendar, maintain shut-in list and do bulletin mailing, maintain college student list, maintain church pew materials, filing, maintain membership records and produce reports, and other responsibilities as needed.

That's a long list of areas where you could help (bet you didn't realize just how much is being done everyday at our church). If there are areas you feel you can be of help, contact the church office and let them know of your area of interest.

Like most main-line churches today, the challenge boils down to getting new members. Again, our committee leaders are trying new things to appeal to potential members, i.e. the new Sunday schedule, adding a contemporary worship. There are a lot of things we can do as existing members, including taking a second look at our commitment for next year, increasing our budget gap giving, supporting new programs, being an open, friendly, welcoming congregation, sharing ideas with committee leaders and just plain old fashioned filling the pews on Sunday mornings.

If you have not yet submitted your commitment for 2015, please do so as soon as possible to help the finance committee determine exactly where we stand so we can plan for the year.
