Message from the Pastor:

You may not think about it, but pastors are also individual Christians living in the world. It is not automatic that we live moral lives, or that we are good stewards of all that God has entrusted to us. Like all Christians, we have to make decisions and commitments about our habits and our stewardship, and then live them out. I introduce my comments in this way this month because I am inviting you into a challenge.

For a number of years, we have budgeted more expenses than we expected to receive in income. We have reconciled this shortfall in years past in a few different ways. One way was for people (staff and laypersons) to forego requesting reimbursement for supplies or services that they provided for church events and programs. Another was to defer or delay regular maintenance on the church building (while making necessary repairs). We also have not paid our share of the Upper NY Conference budget. (Each and every United Methodist church is assigned a share of the expenses of the conference, based on the church's income, as reported on our annual report.) Since 2010, we have been making progress toward fully meeting that obligation – in 2013, we met 75% of our obligation; in 2014, however, we are running closer to 50%.

For the year 2015, due primarily to deaths and members moving away, our anticipated giving is down significantly. I have, therefore, been working with the Staff-Parish Relations (personnel) Committee, and the Finance Committee, to implement some difficult changes. On January 11, at 12:00, we will hold a congregational meeting that is called a Church Conference. We will elect Trustees, and vote on changes to our Endowment Fund that will pay for some recent repairs. I will also be asking you, the congregation, to approve 1) the elimination of the Church Secretary as a paid position, and 2) the reduction of the Nurturing Ministries Coordinator (Deacon Dee) from full-time to a 1/2-time position, beginning July 1, 2015. These changes will reduce our staff costs by about \$33,000 this year, and about \$48,000 annually. They will also require increased participation by the laity of the church. I will also be asking you to join me in increasing our commitment to giving to this church, and working on fundraising events and projects.

I mentioned a challenge in the first paragraph. I plan to increase my giving to the church in the new year, and I want to challenge you to join me, match me, or exceed me. I will increase my giving by \$15 per week, or a little more than 17%. I challenge you to see if you can make any increase in your giving. If you are not giving anything, I challenge you to try \$15 per week. If your giving is sporadic, I challenge you to become a regular giver. If you are able, I challenge you to match my increase, either in percentage or dollars, or exceed it. (Consider also, that our household also supports another church in a similar way.)

I am not asking those who have experienced financial setbacks or crises to participate in this challenge. However, I am asking all members and participants in the life of the congregation to prayerfully consider how they can give additional time or money to provide for the ongoing ministry of our church.

I know that this is a difficult subject, and some folks are offended by the pastor talking about his personal giving. It may seem like bragging. Know that I, too, struggle with what to give. I also know that we need to increase our efforts to reach new folks with the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and to encourage them to participate in our ministry. May God be with us as we greet all the challenges of a new year!

Thoughts from Deacon Dee:

Nurturing Ministries Coordinator has been a Staff Position here for many years long before I got here. It is a wonderful job and ministry for me. There is and has been a lot of spiritual growth found by participating in small group opportunities. But it takes many volunteers to BE the church in our doors and out of them. Did you know I was asked to come here back in 1989 when the position was created? I declined it at the same time because I was invited to go to a church that was in trouble. Both pastors left and the Christian Educator position had been cut. It was where I needed to be and I knew God had a bigger plan than I did. Now I am here serving as this church almost 30 years later. Now it has to make some difficult decisions about ministry and staffing due to lack of financial stability. More and more activities/opportunities will be needed to be led or done by volunteers in the future. I ask you to prayerfully consider how you can serve and please come chat with me about areas you are interested in volunteering. We can be specific about roles and one-time events versus Ministry Team involvement.

Education – Sunday School for all ages, Small groups, Vacation Adventures, Nursery, Youth class and activities

Hospitality – Fellowship Hour (providing goodies for Coffee Hr), Memorial Service Ministry, Greeting/welcoming people on Sunday and people using the building is important.

Fellowship – Social Activities are important for the congregation to have fun together with Game Nights and activities. Community meals and gatherings over food.

Caring for others: Heart to Heart – People who care about homebound members by calling them and keeping them connected. Taking Communion to the homebound and hospital visits.

Church Conference Meeting

On Sunday, January 11, 2015, at 12 noon, we will hold a Church Conference for the purpose of:

- 1) electing Trustees,
- 2) approval of changes to our Endowment Fund to allow for payment of repairs to the windows in the steeple (already accomplished), and changes in where funds are invested, and
- 3) voting on the elimination of the position of Church Secretary and the reduction of the position of Nurturing Ministries Coordinator to 1/2-time, beginning July 1, 2015.

All members of the church will be able to vote. Anyone who participates in the life of the church may express their opinion.

Staff-Parish Relations Committee

Staff/Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) Addresses the Personnel Budget

On November 25, the Church Council did not vote on an operating budget for the year beginning January 1, 2015. This was because the planned expenditures (minimally higher than the 2014 plan) significantly exceed the income that is projected for 2015.

The Church Council directed the Finance Committee to submit a more balanced budget at the January Church Council meeting. In support of this effort, the SPRC met in December to review staffing with the aim of reducing the personnel budget in ways that will have the smallest possible impact on programs, services and attendance.

After a great deal of prayer and Christian dialog, this motion was adopted on Thursday December 11:

"The SPRC recommends that the Church Council (or a Church Conference):

- 1) Reduce the Deacon Nurturing Ministries position to half time effective July 1, 2015.
- 2)Eliminate the paid Administrative Secretary position immediately, notifying the incumbent in accordance with our established policies. (Interpretation: Effective after four weeks' notice from the CC action Not later than March 1, 2015.)"

The expectation is that this and other initiatives to close the budget gap will be the subject of a Congregational meeting during January. "


New Pastor Bible Study: Exodus

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY



Our Thanksgiving Kelly's pie sale was a success once again, as the coalition raised \$3,235 towards our house sponsorship for 2015. This helps bring our on hand money to a little over \$38,000 towards the sponsorship fee of \$65,000. Thanks for your support; if you purchase a pie(s) we hope you enjoyed them, if you didn't you missed out on a treat.

We continue to push for a groundbreaking in early Spring 2015, and are awaiting a lot and family assignment from the local Habitat chapter. If you're interested in what they're doing, take a look at their website at www.RochesterHabitat.org. This chapter is over 200 homes being built in the City of Rochester, making a big difference in what's called the Josana district – (named for the streets in the area, i.e. Jay, Otis, Scio, Ames, etc.)

Once we know the lot and get closer to groundbreaking, we'll be looking to support the project by asking for donations to sponsor a sq. foot, buy a box of nails, etc. Future fundraisers include an Ash Wednesday spaghetti dinner at Hope Lutheran (they have a program during lent of Wednesday night dinners, and generously let us sponsor the first Wednesday of Lent with net proceeds going toward our project), 2x4 signing, etc. In the meantime, you can help by placing used clothing in the St.Pauly shed in our parking lot, used print cartridges, batteries, etc. in the ImagineIt box inside the main entrance and with your prayers.

STEWARDSHIP



To date, we've received 77 commitments towards 2015, totaling \$153,767. If our outstanding commitments, based on last year, come in, we will have commitments of approximately \$186.000. This combined with other income, i.e. extra mile giving, Storybook rental, etc., should total \$325,000 towards an expense budget of \$352,000. This leaves a shortfall of \$26,000 for 2015.

Our expenses for next year include staffing, conference shared ministries, facility costs, office services, education programs, music ministries and other programs. Our various committees are hard at work trying to determine ways to close that gap, but, frankly, our committee leaders have been, doing their best to limit outgoing costs over the last few years.

Like most main-line churches today, the challenge boils down to getting new members. Again, our committee leaders are trying new things to appeal to potential members, i.e. the new Sunday schedule, adding a contemporary worship. There are a lot of things we can do as existing members, including taking a second look at our commitment for next year, increasing our budget gap giving, supporting new programs, being an open, friendly, welcoming congregation, sharing ideas with committee leaders and just plain old fashioned filling the pews on Sunday mornings.

If you have not yet submitted your commitment for 2015, please do so as soon as possible to help the finance committee determine exactly where we stand so we can plan for the year.

Finance Monthly Report:

November numbers are as follows:

- Usable income for the year is \$289,510.20. We have spent \$289,510.10. We have yet to spend for November \$11,204.44. Total to spend is \$300,714.64. Subtract usable from yet to spend leaves \$11,416.52 as a deficit.
- We now have 77 pledges in for a total of \$153,767. We have 40 pledges still out totaling 51,400.00. Pledge cards are available at the church or you can just call me with the amount.
- Budget time is upon us and we need firm numbers as the Budget is prepared.

Many, many thanks to everyone who contributed to these two projects, either by shopping, donating, or helping set-up and distribute the wealth.

Mittens and hats would've been a good idea for December 12, from 4:00 pm - 8:00 pm, when members of our congregation supported the Salvation Army's Red Kettle campaign at Greece Ridge Center. Thanks to Gale Huber for organizing our group of jolly elves to ring those bells!

Finally, we filled 10 Christmas Bags with food; 5 were picked up by people who phoned in a request and 5 were delivered to the Food Shelf. We also provided a turkey to each family requesting a food bag since we had 17 "extra turkeys" left from Thanksgiving!


