Pray for each other so that you can live together whole and healed.

(James 5:16 in The Message translation)

We have several different prayer groups in our church. One is a phone chain that passes requests from person to person. Another is an e-mail prayer group, where the requests are sent to a number of people who have agreed to pray. There are also groups that include, as part of their activities, prayer for our church, and for the members, friends, and loved ones of our church, as well as anyone in need. These are only some of the "official" prayers; in addition there are several individuals who pray without ceasing, and promote prayer in all aspects of our congregational life. I don't know if it is true or not, but it seems as though they have been more active than usual lately. I know my prayer list is long.

There is a story about prayer that I want to share with you. Usually, I write my own words in the newsletter, but when somebody else has told this good a story, I like to share it. It is told by William R. White in his book, Stories for the Journey (1988). It refers to Mark 2:1-12 in the Bible; you might want to read that first.

"What is your favorite Bible story, Papa?" the little girl asked her father as he tucked her under the sheets.

"Let me see," he said as he sat on the edge of the bed. "There are so many that I love. The story of the four men who carried their paralyzed friend to Jesus on a pallet, lowering him through the roof, is one of my favorites because it reminds me of how your uncle Hans was healed."

"I don't know that story," the little girl said hopefully. "Please tell it to me, Papa."

"Many years ago," the father began, "Hans and his wife, Enid, escaped the war in Europe so that he could continue his life of teaching in the seminary. At first things were difficult because his English was not good, but soon, he became one of our seminary's most beloved teachers. The students loved him because he was warm and gentle and when he spoke the scriptures came alive."

"Hans and Enid were very much in love. Nearly every day they took long walks together, holding hands. It warmed the hearts of students and faculty alike to see them sitting close to each other in church."

"Then one day Enid died. Hans was struck with sorrow. For weeks he would not eat or take walks. The seminary president, along with three friends, visited him regularly, but he felt lonely and depressed. He was experiencing the dark night of the soul."

"On one of their visits, Hans said to his friends, 'I am no longer able to pray to God. In fact, I am not certain I believe in God.'

"After a moment of silence, the seminary president said, 'Then we will believe for you. We will make your confession for you. We will pray for you.'

"The other friends looked bewildered by their president's words, but not knowing what else to say, they agreed."

"In the days ahead the four men met daily for prayer. They made confession on behalf of Uncle Hans. They asked God to restore the gift of faith to their dear friend and they continued to visit him in his home."

"Then, after many months, the four men all gathered in Hans's living room. He smiled before he spoke. 'It is no longer necessary for you to pray for me. Today, I would like you to pray with me.'

"The dark night of the soul had passed."

There was a long silence before the little girl spoke. "Uncle Hans was just like the little boy in the Bible story, wasn't he, Papa? Only instead of a pallet to carry him to Jesus, his friends used prayer."

The father nodded and kissed his daughter.

Carry those you love to Jesus in prayer!

Thoughts from Deacon Dee:

At the SoHo Wednesday group we have been reading the Gospel of John using Immersion Bible Studies to keep us on track. We read about the Holy Spirit creating and sustaining the Church. It reminded me of where we are at this time.

- The author said, "The church of Jesus Christ is not like a grocery store, although many churchgoers seem to treat it that way. In grocery store you presume that someone else has prepared everything so that you merely have to go there, pick what you want, pay for it, and leave. Your interest is not in helping all the other people in the store find what they need. You are concerned only with your own grocery list. You may or may not see people you know and speak to them, but it is not why you go to the grocery store. You go for yourself and for those for whom you prepare food. If the store should close, it may be inconvenient; but you'll soon find another place to shop."
- The author continues, "For some of people, the church is something that has been put together by someone else. They have nothing to do making sure everything needed is available. They come to church to get something for themselves; and might say "I didn't get anything out of that service." Many times churchgoers only say hi to people they know; the strangers or visitors are not their concern. Having paid for what they came for, they leave. Should the church fail and close, or fail to provide the goods they are used to, they will simply go to another." For some the church is nothing more than a philosophical club or historical society, a place where those who believe the same religious doctrine gather to hear it once more and then leave." Time to evaluate yourself and your being on the journey seeking Jesus/God.

She says it's time to turn in the shopping cart and put away the list and see the church more as Jesus envisioned it and just live it in and out of our doors!

- The Nurture Ministries Position has been at Greece UMC a long time.

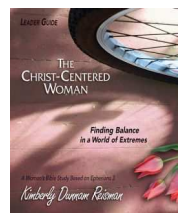

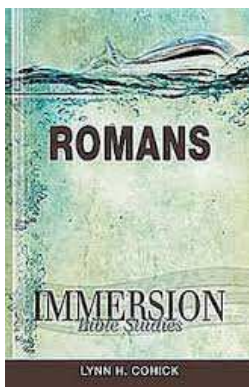
Pastor Matt's Summer Bible Study Immersion Study Guide: Romans

The Bookman's Tale *by Charlie Lovette*



Hay-on-Wye, 1995. Peter Byerly isn't sure what drew him into this particular bookshop. Nine months earlier, the death of his beloved wife, Amanda, had left him shattered. The young antiquarian bookseller relocated from North Carolina to the English countryside, hoping to rediscover the joy he once took in collecting and restoring rare books. But upon opening an eighteenth-century study of Shakespeare forgeries, Peter is shocked when a portrait of Amanda tumbles out of its pages. Of course, it isn't really her. The watercolor is clearly Victorian. Yet the resemblance is uncanny, and Peter becomes obsessed with learning the picture's origins.

As he follows the trail back first to the Victorian era and then to Shakespeare's time, Peter communes with Amanda's spirit, learns the truth about his own past, and discovers a book that might definitively prove Shakespeare was, indeed, the author of all his plays

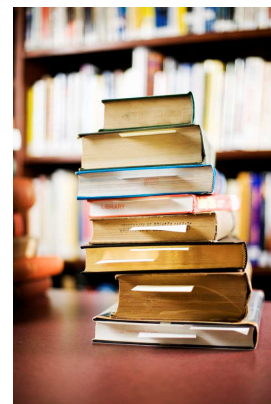

From Annual Conference 2014 – Bishop Webb's Opening Worship

The following is a small excerpt from Bishop Webb's opening worship from Annual Conference a couple weeks ago. Very powerful. Please read this whole thing.

The story is told about a young preacher who was pastoring a very traditional and established church. The church was beginning to experience phenomenal growth. It got to the place where the sanctuary was no longer suitable for the congregation. They were going to have to buy or build a new sanctuary.

The young preacher had a vision, but she had to come to the church meeting and present her vision to the church and hear from the church. So she came to the meeting ready to share her vision of how God was leading the church to expand their facility. She finished her presentation and waited for a response from the church members that had gathered.

Fairly quickly, a gentleman rose to his feet and said, "Preacher I thank God for you, but we can't move from this building." The young preacher stood there not knowing what to say. The church member continued, "Pastor, we can't move from this building because that pulpit you preach from – my grandfather used to preach from that pulpit. This chair I just arose from is where my daddy used to pray. And this post that I'm standing next to, I accepted Christ standing right next to this post. Now preacher, I don't mean any harm, but we can't move from this building."

The young preacher stood there not knowing what to say. While she was gathering her thoughts, an older sainted sister in the rear of the room stood to her feet. She said, "Pastor, I would like to make a motion that we give that brother the post and move on with the plan."

I wonder if there are some posts we need to give away, SO THAT we can move on with the plan!

Imagine what God might do in us and through us if every United Methodist faith community in Upper New York in the next year made a commitment to evangelism – boldly claiming and sharing with others our relationship with Jesus.
