Message from the Pastor:

In the bleak mid-winter, frosty wind made moan,

Earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone;

Snow had fallen, snow on snow, snow on snow,

In the bleak midwinter, long ago. — C.G. Rossetti, 1872

You may recognize these words from the Christmas carol, *In the Bleak Midwinter*. Others will recognize the scene from day-to-day life this year in Western New York. Through the winter things are cold and gray, the trees are bare. Things appear to be dead. The weather gets to be extreme and burdensome. Yet we know from our experience that every spring the crocuses pop out of the ground, the trees begin to bud, and the grass takes on its spring green color. The new life that Spring brings to nature is a gift of God that we have come to expect and look forward to each year. That hope gets us through many a dreary day!

Having that kind of faith and expectation is harder in our own lives. We believe the promise of Spring because we have seen it. New life for ourselves does not seem as sure. When our lives are dark and cold and bare, it is awfully difficult to see that newness may come. Some of us have had the cold soak into us all the way into our souls, so that our spirits are as frosty as our fingers and toes. Perhaps the events of life – sadness, illness, death, frustration, loss – have caused us to close up, to stop feeling because it is too painful. Maybe we have not turned to the Lord in so long that we figure that our souls are too cold for Jesus to come in, even for a visit. Maybe we feel not only that our situation is beyond hope, but that we are beyond hope. But no heart is so cold, no human life so inhospitable that the love of God, and the forgiving and saving grace of Jesus Christ cannot live there. As the cold of winter could not deter Jesus' birth, the coldness of the world and human hearts will not deter his coming to thaw them out.

God sent Jesus into our world to give us the assurance of his willingness and ability to bring new life to us. As he walked among us, he came to know our struggles and pain. As he was crucified, he knew our suffering and death. On Easter, however, when he left the tomb and met the disciples in their grief, he showed that our suffering, our pain, even our death are not the end, even though they appear to be. Joy is more real, and more powerful than suffering. Life is more real and more powerful than death.

Resurrection is more than one of the miracles of Jesus from our distant past. It is more than simply something we can hope for after death. It is both of these. But it is also a gift of God that we can claim here and now. It is ours everyday if we turn to God in faith. It is ours if we believe the proof of Jesus Christ, the risen Lord.

Resurrection is not a return to the way things were; the risen Christ still bore the nail prints in his hands. We may feel the effects of frostbite. But it is a new and better life - beginning at pain and sorrow and moving forward into wholeness and joy.

This year let's let Lent carry us through the end of winter to the "Spring of Souls" (see hymn #315, vs. 2) that is Easter on April 5th.. We will be able to watch the miracle of Spring begin to unfold as we prepare for the joy of Easter. As you observe the symbols of the Easter season coming forth in the Spring season (crocuses, butterflies, birds' eggs) believe that you also can share in God's gift of life in Jesus Christ.

A Replacement Life

In this highly acclaimed literary debut, a failed journalist is asked to do the unthinkable: forge Holocaust-restitution claims for older Russian Jews in Brooklyn, New York. Yevgeny Gelman, grandfather of Slava Gelman, "didn't suffer in the exact way" he needs to have suffered to qualify for the restitution the German government has been paying out to Holocaust survivors. But suffer he has—as a Jew in the war, as a second-class citizen in the USSR, as an immigrant to America. So? Isn't his grandson a "writer"? Slava's turn as the Forger of South Brooklyn teaches him that not every fact is the truth, and not every lie a falsehood. It takes more than law abiding to become an American; it takes the same self-reinvention in which his people excel. Intoxicated and unmoored by his inventions, Slava risks exposure. Cornered, he commits an irrevocable act that finally grants him a sense of home in America, but not before collecting a price from his family.

In a book called "God's Roadmap for New Beginnings" by Max Lucado, there is a segment called "Healthy Habits" to which he leads in with the statement "Growth is the goal of the Christian Maturity is mandatory." STUFF TO DO DURING LENT - Anne Crumpler

LENT is a time to repent, to turn away from sin and to turn toward the new life given in Christ Jesus. It is a time to give up whatever gets in the way of our relationship with God and to give more of ourselves as we express the love of God to neighbors.



FEBRUARY

- 18 ASH WEDNESDAY Do some research on the season of Lent. Attend an Ash Wednesday service.
- 19 Put a bowl on the kitchen table. Ask your family to drop their extra pocket change in the bowl each day from now until
- 20 On Fridays during Lent, try fasting for at least one meal to remind you of Christ's sacrifice.
- 21 Find a quiet place to rest and read Psalm 51:1–17 as a prayer of confession.
- 22 Sundays during Lent are known as "little Easters." Go to church. Celebrate with a picnic.

- 23 Spend some time alone. Be aware of God's presence.
- 24 On your way to school, sing a favorite song or hymn about new life in Christ.
- 25 Read Isaiah 53:3-12. What does it mean to you that Jesus suffered for our sins?
- 26 Draw on the sidewalk chalk pictures or words that remind you of Jesus' life and death.
- 27 Fast today—or choose to give up caffeine, chocolate.
- 28 Take care of children for a single parent who needs some time alone.

MARCH

- 1 Go to church. Invite someone who needs a friend to go shopping or to a movie.
- 2 Pray: "God, keep me close to you. Teach me your ways through Jesus Christ. Amen."
- 3 Plant flowers in honor or memory of someone you love.
- 4 Do chores to raise money to buy a flock of baby chicks from the Heifer Project for a needy family.
- 5 Read. Frederick Buechner's books and Mark Jaman's poems make good lenten reading.
- 6 Fast today—or give up TV.
- 7 Talk with family or friends about what it means to repent.
- 8 Go to church. Begin the process of making cascarones by blowing the yolks and whites out of twelve eggs. Invite friends over to enjoy an omelet and to decorate the eggs.
- 9 Read Romans 5:6–19. Spend some time reflecting on God's awesome gift in Jesus Christ.
- 10 Write a faith statement. What do you believe about Jesus?
- 11 Take a walk. Spend some time alone with God.
- 12 Pray Psalm 32:1–11. Ask God to direct your life.
- 13 Fast today—or give up fast-food.
- 14 Collect canned goods, and deliver them to a food bank.
- 15 Go to church. Go caroling for Lent. Sing hymns and songs about faith and repentance.
- 16 Research local and national charities that might be the

recipients of your pocket change. Choose one.

- 17 Pray: "God, let us live new life, free of sin, through Christ Jesus." Amen."
- 18 Talk with friends or family about the meaning of Jesus' life. death, and resurrection.
- 19 Read <u>2 Corinthians 5:20–6:13</u>. Let go of all that keeps your heart from opening wide to God.
- 20 Fast today—or give up sweets.
- 21 Weed your neighbor's garden.
- 22 Go to church. Invite friends to make bread.
- 23 Read Romans 6:5–11. What does it mean to you to die with Christ? to be alive to God?
- 24 To complete your <u>cascarones</u>, fill with confetti the eggs you decorated earlier. Glue tissue paper over the hole.
- 25 Pray the Lord's Prayer slowly, reflecting on each line.
- 26 Journal about what it means to be united with Christ.
- 27 Fast today—or give up time you would spend on the computer or on video games.
- 28 Make a cross out of wood. Decorate it.
- 29 PALM SUNDAY Go to church. Wave palm branches and shout, "Hosanna!"
- 30 Count your pocket change. Give it to a selected charity.
- 31 Visit someone in a hospital, nursing home, or prison.

APRIL

- 1 Imagine walking with Jesus. Hear him teach. See him heal. Listen to him say, "The Son of Man must suffer and die."
- 2 MAUNDY THURSDAY Attend a communion service. Reflect on Jesus' words: "This is my body given for you; this is my blood of the 5 EASTER DAY Celebrate! Shout, "Christ is risen!" Bop someone new covenant."
- 3 GOOD FRIDAY Go to a Good Friday service. Or spend time in silence from noon to 3 p.m. Light a candle. Read Mark 14:32-

15:47 or Luke 22:39-23:56.

4 HOLY SATURDAY Wait. Be in silence. Pray: "Merciful God, in life and in death, we belong to you, through Jesus Christ. Amen." over the head with a confetti egg and say, "Live the new life in Christ!"

DIG DEEPER -- PRAY: God, help us to observe the days of Lent so that we are ready to celebrate new life in Jesus Christ. Amen.

Finance Monthly Report:

We are 6 weeks into 2015 and the numbers are not favorable for January. The conference has not sent out the January bill until February. (Everyone was busy.)

- In Jan we posted \$27,805.52 as usable funds. We had spent \$25,273.29 with \$8,938.50 yet to pay. This leaves \$6,401.56 in the red.
- Our estimated income after 6 weeks show a \$6,178.52 surplus. Keep in mind we started the year off with a \$9,000.00 deficit between the budget and income. Things will get better later this year.
- Budget Gap giving is falling behind the Estimate. Hopefully it will pick up soon.
- We continue with Carmines for Sunday breakfast and once a month the first Tuesday in the evening for dinner. We received \$38.62 last month.
- Ruby Tuesday's is bringing close to \$30.00monthly. We could use a lot more diners. Its good fellowship.
