Above all, maintain constant love for one another, for love covers a multitude of sins. Be hospitable to one another without complaining. Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received.

(1 Peter 4: 8-10)

As we plan the church finances for the coming year, we hear a word that is not used much outside the church: "Stewardship". Stewardship, however, is about more than money, and it is not something we only do during a "campaign." It is a way of life.

The root of the word is "Steward:" one who takes care of things for someone else. (In older English, it was "sty ward:" the one who kept watch on the pigs.) You have probably been a steward in your life. If you have ever been given Power of Attorney for someone, you are the steward of their legal affairs. If you ever watched your neighbor's house while they were on vacation, and fed their cats, and brought in the mail, then you were that neighbor's steward. If you ever borrowed anything, you were the steward of that thing, responsible to see that it was used correctly, and returned in good condition. Parents often remind their children (though maybe not in these words) that they are stewards of the family's finances ("turn out the lights!"), material goods ("get your feet off the coffee table!"), reputation ("you're not going out looking like that!"), and future ("someday you'll have children of your own, then you'll understand!").

When we speak about stewardship in church, we are talking about the fact that we are stewards of a world that belongs to God. Whatever we own according to the laws of our society, ultimately belongs to God, because God has created it. Even the things that we make with our own two hands ultimately come from the raw materials that God has created and placed here for our use. All that we are, all that we have, even the time and space we live in, belongs to God. We are stewards, and therefore accountable to God for how we use and care for what God has entrusted to us. In addition to being accountable, we also ought to be grateful to God, and find ways of expressing our gratitude. (See Deuteronomy 8)

We can do this in many ways, but the organized way of expressing praise, and thanksgiving, and worship, and service to God is through the church. We who are members of the church all made a pledge, when we were confirmed, to be loyal to the church and support it with *our prayers*, *our presence*, *our gifts*, *and our service*. I believe this makes a good framework for stewardship of the portion of our life that we give back, in gratitude, to God.

Our *prayers* are communicating with God. Through them, we ask God's help, healing, guidance, and correction of the individual, families, and programs that make up our ministry. We pray alone and together.

Our *presence* is the physical act of <u>being there</u>. It strengthens our worship, encourages those around us, strengthens our programs and makes them more effective, increases our ability to reach out, and generally raises the mood of the congregation.

Our *gifts* are money and things that we offer and give to the church, as well as our special talents that we use to strengthen the ministry. Talents may be something for which we have received special training, or they may be Godgiven, such as artistic talent and creativity.

Our *service* is those things that we can do that are not our specialty, but are useful and helpful. *Service* may be assisting someone who has particular *gifts* in a certain area of ministry. It may also be doing something that almost <u>anyone</u> can do, but <u>somebody</u> needs to do it.



When we hear the word "stewardship" around the church, let's not just run for the checkbook (or hide it!). Stewardship is what we do with all that God has given us. Church stewardship is about giving of ourselves in many different ways to the praise and glory of God, and to the service of God and God's people. What can you do? What will you do?

Thoughts From Deacon Dee, As fall is upon us, we know what is coming. At this time of year the harvest and bounty are/have been brought in from the field before the freeze hits.

If we were to go to a Jewish synagogue this month, we would see in the gathering space a Succoth with gourds and branches upon it to remember the period of their history wandering. We will have one in Jim King Commons beginning November 1 until thanksgiving baskets are prepared on November 22.

A reminder about what a "Succoth" is. Succoth or Sukkot literally means "Booths." The Jews were in the Desert of Sinai and lived in booths for forty years. As they wandered, Moses, their leader, being faithful to following God, lived with people in portable Sanctuaries or temporary shelters. Sukkot also reminds us of the Old Testament Exile and the pains of life but remaining faithful. We are reminded to celebrate what we have and give back to God. Today, we celebrate Sukkot to remind us of being faithful and giving back to God.

The Sukkot is great fun for the children. Building the Sukkot each year satisfies the childhood fantasy of building a fort, and dwelling in the Sukkot satisfies a child's desire to camp out in the backyard. The commandment to "dwell" in a Sukkot can be fulfilled by simply eating all of one's meals there. The fall is a time to celebrate "the festival of rejoicing." When Israel was not exiled, the early fall was a time of joy for it was the end of the planting season. The summer crops grown are harvested and processed in late summer and Sukkot, a fall holiday, has a place in the end of the main harvesting period.

We celebrate our Jewish roots and @GUMC like to remember with the Sukkot to remember the bounty given to us to help others. The children and youth create it and make designs and hang various ornaments and fruits in it on November 1.

We are asked to bring in canned goods for the Thanksgiving food baskets and for the Greece Food Shelf. We can create from our gifts of groceries. Bring canned goods in before or on Sunday, November 22 to the altar. Or bring any time and leave them in the Sukkot to be taken to the Altar on Sunday the 22st.

We are living in times when so many around us are hungry and struggling, but there is found a great joy to know we have reached out in love to people with food. This is an opportunity to give back and share as we reach out to others with the Good News of Jesus and the Love of God.







2015 – A year of challenges, actions and progress. We are on track to meet our goal of paying 75% of our UM Shared Ministries and also meeting our adjusted budget goals. To accomplish this we had to make some sacrifices including replacing our Secretary with volunteer help and reducing the Deacon's job to half time. We also took on regularly scheduled fundraisers, asked for and received time and talent efforts from our congregation. Through all this, we have continued a high level of ministry programs and services. Our facilities have been kept up thanks to the efforts of our trustees and some scout programs, along with volunteer help.

2016 – Another year of challenges, actions and progress. Our Finance Committee is working on developing a budget that will continue to support our staff, programs, facility maintenance and a plan to reach 100% of our UM Shared Ministries. 
