Message from our Pastor:

Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations... From everlasting to everlasting, you are God.

(*Psalm 90*)

It seemed so significant, and then it was gone.

I'm talking about the year 2013.

As we lived it, there were days that seemed to last forever, and weeks that seemed like years. Yet, looking back, the year really flew by! They say that as you get older, time flies by faster. It seems to me that they are right! Imagine how it must be for God! No wonder that Psalm 90 says about God: "A thousand years in your sight are like yesterday when it is past" (verse 4).

Yet the same Psalm asks God to "teach us to number our days, that we may gain a wise heart" (verse 12). Psalm 90 is not the most upbeat of the Psalms, but it looks to God for hope even in the midst of turmoil. Even though the days fly by, this Psalm urges us to see each day as important, to look to God to provide for us each day, and to seek to learn something from each day's experience. Jesus taught the same idea in different words when he taught his disciples to pray: "Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

If the past teaches us anything about the future, (and of course it does), then we know that we will need all the help we can get. The past year has brought us change, and loss, and celebration, and new experience; decisions we could make, and decisions that were out of our hands; death and new life. In the world we have seen war, and storms, and disaster. In the year ahead, there will undoubtedly be more turmoil. We will also experience many joyful times. Psalm 90 asks God to "satisfy us with his unfailing love every morning, so that we can sing for joy and be glad all day" (verse 14). There is hope that there will be at least as many good days as difficult days (verse 15).

As we look forward to a new year, let us turn to God to care for us, to provide for us, to guide us. God has brought us, day by day, through the past to where we are today. Let's let God teach us something from each new day that will build and add to a store of wisdom in our hearts. Let's try to experience God's love each day, and let it bring us joy: now, in the new year, and always.

Thoughts from Dee:

A couple weeks ago a friend asked me to list what have I failed at lately. I hesitated. They said, the sign of personal growth or a healthy church ministry often comes through failure and we need to list the failures of the year. This is the time of year to reexamine what we are doing in life, living out our time and sharing with others. I recently came across an article by Rick Lawrence about ministry and failure.

Failure, we're told, is our best teacher.

And that's just one of the thousands of pithy celebrations of the "bumper crop" we're promised after the "manure" of failure covers over our best efforts, including these well-known examples...

- "I have not failed. I've just found 10,000 ways that won't work."—Thomas Edison
- "Failure is the condiment that gives success its flavor."—Truman Copote
- "Success is stumbling from failure to failure with no loss of enthusiasm."—Winston Churchill
- "It is hard to fail, but it is worse never to have tried to succeed."—Theodore Roosevelt

Failure is like a Bulgarian Greco-Roman wrestler—you can circle him on the mat, but he will pin you sooner or later...

We rightly fear failure like we fear any other threat to life-and-limb. The reason we watch horror movies is because they haul our nightmares out from behind the curtain of our future and let us poke at them for a little while. We tame the thing we fear most by inoculating ourselves with a little bit of it. And we try to de-claw failure by telling ourselves that it's the necessary prerequisite for success, and that we must embrace it before we can get past it.

The truth is, we romanticize failure as long as it is quickly followed by something beautiful and redemptive. But what do we do with the repeated failures that leave us shivering in the rain on a dark corner at night, waiting for the "success bus" that may never show up? Time to lean on God/others for guidance.

In life, there are failures with school, jobs, maybe knowing where to go next.

In the church, we are not sure what we need to change but change is needed to reach generations who have not been in the church we know and love. We need to meet them where they are. What does that mean to us?

To make mistakes means something is changing and new trails taken. What if we say no mistakes have happened? Hummm... makes you think...

Hand to Plow is enlightening some of us to read and discuss ministry and the church is moving in different direction than the 1950s model of church. Read the book of Acts. Want to join in with us? The church around us is catching fire in new ways. Don't you want to be part of something even if we make a mistake or two?

It's that time of the year again! We've recently asked for your support through your financial commitment for 2014. To date, we've received 90 responses with another 19 still outstanding as of this writing, based on prior year commitments. If you haven't yet responded, please do so as soon as possible.

Entering 2014, we need to support a budget that shows a deficit of \$29,860, based on estimated financial commitments and other income (i.e., Storybook Nursery). Our committees have taken on the task of finding ways to raise income through fundraisers. Over the last couple of years, we have asked you to consider giving an additional \$10 (or whatever you can afford) on the first Sunday of each month, an effort which has been reasonably supported. We are asking you to recommit yourself to that extra level of giving for 2014; if every pledging unit did that, we would raise an additional \$14,280, almost half of the shortfall.

We hope we can count on your support.

Finance Report:

Currently our income is not coming in as anticipated for 2013. Pledge and Non Pledges are short by almost \$8,000.00 and the budget gap giving is short by around \$6,000. The good news is our bills are being paid with a few exceptions thanks to good management by the program area's and our Treasurer. Hopefully this Christmas season will pick up some of the shortfall.

You might have noticed that regular boxed envelopes have found their way into the pews. These are leftovers from 2013 that we decided to do something with rather than throw them out. There is space for your number, address and your name and a line to indicate where you want your donation to go. (A reminder that the "Other line needs information in it such as "budget gap", "altar flowers" etc.)

Year end statements will be available on Jan 5. Please make note that there will be a duplicate of the pledge card you sent in. Please check and make sure your pledge was correctly interpreted. Please call or let me know so I can correct my books.

2014 is upon us and again we are facing a challenge. There are 88 pledges in so far with 21 left to go. Pledge cards are available in King Commons or you can call me and I will fill one out for you.

Thoughts from Co-Lay Leader Lisa Kostyshak...

Last month I started a series based on questions posed by Ted Anderson, our District Superintendent, on October 20. This month, as we head into 2014, I'll offer up a couple more questions that he posed to us.

Question #3 How does our church grow disciples?

In the Great Commission, Jesus told us to go into all the world and make disciples of all nations.

But what does it mean to make disciples? What exactly is a disciple? You make God the center of your life.

You love God more than your career. You love God more than your possessions. You love God more than your friends. Even more than your family.

The best thing we can do to grow disciples is to show people how to make Jesus the Center of their lives because He is the center of yours.

When you show someone that you put God above all else, you are helping to grow a disciple.

Question #4 How does our church make a difference... for the glory of God... in our community?

I think our church helps make a difference in our community in many ways. I'm sure you can think of a few yourself. Perhaps as we head into 2014, you could think about new ways we could go out into the community and make a difference. Make some suggestions. Even if your idea seems far-fetched, impossible, or improbable, you may not be the first to have the idea. Or, perhaps your idea will plant a seed for someone else. We are learning that the younger generations receive the message in different ways and we need to be creative in how we bring the message to them. Stop waiting for them to come to us to hear the message. So... put your thinking cap on and rev up your idea generator!



HAND TO PLOW

Over the past year, several people attended events to further understanding what is happening with the Christian church. Pastor Matt and Deacon Dee along with T om Hinterman, Linda Hoffman, Lisa Kostyshak, John Dunn (lay persons who volunteered) learned about revitalizing and what that means.

One of the most important understandings of revitalization is the need for partnership between laity and clergy. Clergy alone cannot revitalize a congregation and laity alone cannot revitalize a congregation. Laity and clergy working together to follow the calling of God opens the doors of revitalization.

So what is the laity portion of the equation? Lay people are asked to sit on committees, attend worship and give money. All of these things are important and necessary for the church to function. However, it should be clear that these functions alone will not bring about revitalization. If functioning in this way brought about revitalization we would already be there. The role of laity is found in a move from religious consumer to engaged disciple of Jesus Christ.

Laity have been conditioned by the church to be good members and to be consumers of the membership which they signup for. Let's be clear, membership is not the problem. The primary commitment of a member of the church is to be a disciple of Jesus Christ, to live the gospel of Jesus Christ and to be God's love with our neighbors in all places. Our engagement in a local congregation is a covenantal relationship not a club membership.

So what are laity to do in order to participate in revitalization? First focus on being a disciple of Jesus Christ rather than a member of a congregation. Second, be open to change. Clearly the world around the church has changed a great deal in the past few decades. This is not going to stop happening, and the church must be willing to change to help the changing world encounter the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Revitalization begins when laity and clergy alike, focus on developing themselves and others as disciples of Jesus Christ who live the gospel of Jesus Christ are God's love with our neighbors in all places. This means more time in mission and ministry than in meetings. This means more time in prayer in study, more time

addressing injustice and oppression. In essence this means more time following after Jesus, than administering the church.
