#### Message from our Pastor:

When you have eaten your fill and built houses and live in them... Do not say to yourself "My power and the might of my hand have gotten me this wealth." But remember the Lord your God, for it is God that gives you the power to get wealth, so that he may confirm his covenant that he swore to your ancestors, as he is doing today.

(Deuteronomy 8: 12, 17-18)

We are in the season of Lent. It began on Ash Wednesday, February 13<sup>th</sup> this year, and will continue until Easter on March 31st. Lent is a time of preparation for Easter. Our personal preparation is traditionally a time of introspection, self-examination and repentance. We can think of it as taking a look at our lives, assessing where we are going and where we ought to be going, and correcting course as necessary.

It is a good time to consider our Christian stewardship. *Stewardship* is a term that often gets reduced to "how we handle money," and "how much we give to the church." It is that, in part, but it is much more. John Wesley, in his sermon "The Good Steward," points out that a steward is a person who is entrusted with what belongs to another. The steward is not free to use the property in whatever way they choose, but only in accordance with the will of the owner. It has been said that "*stewardship is everything you do after you say 'yes' to Jesus.\**" When we say "yes" to Jesus, we begin to recognize that everything that exists is from God, and belongs to God. *Christian stewardship* acknowledges that we are stewards of what belongs to God.

God entrusts to us our selves (body [actions], mind [thoughts], and soul [intentions]), our talents, our relationships, our time, our environment, and our resources. We are capable of using these in any way that we choose; many people choose to use them in entirely self-serving ways. As Christians, however, we have said "yes" to God as revealed in Jesus Christ, and therefore we acknowledge that we are accountable to God for how we handle them. Since they belong to God, we ought to strive to use them as God intends. What that means, in particular, to each of us is a matter that each of us needs to learn. We do that through prayer, through the study of the scriptures, through listening to teachers who have prayed and studied, and through conversation with others who are seeking to learn God's will for their lives.

We are accountable to God for our stewardship of what God entrusts to us. That means that we ought to be striving to be able to look God in the eye and say, "I am taking good care of myself and my family; I am loving your people as you love them; I am caring for your world; I am using my talents and my resources in every way that I can to please you, glorify you, and serve you."

I am thankful for God's grace, because I can seldom say that I am doing all that I can. And even when I am doing all that I can, it is not all that I want to do in response to the great love that God has shown to me. Let this time of Lent be a time for all of us to consider:

How am I caring for myself and my loved ones?

Am I loving God and other people as God has loved me?

Am I using the abilities, money, and time that God has entrusted to me in ways that I would be proud to discuss with God?

How can I do more to respond to God's love?



#### Finance Report:

6 weeks into 2013, our pledged income is ahead of schedule. Our non pledge income is also ahead. Many people are paying ahead in anticipation of traveling south for what remains of the winter.

We have received \$1715.00 after 6 weeks of Shared Ministry Donations and have paid \$2474.19 toward the 75% goal in 2013.

6 weeks of Budget gap has resulted in \$859.00. Our budget goal in 2013 is \$14,000.00. If you multiply this out you will see it falls short of the mark by around \$7,000.00. This has become a very important item the first week of the month if we are going to make our budget this year.

Lastly our Budget income for 2013 after 6 weeks shows a shortfall of \$761.89 for the year. Maybe after the snow and the cold weather we will pick up the pace.

#### **UMW Human Trafficking Update**

As many of you know, two years ago, our UMW unit here in Greece, along with others in the Genesee Valley District, focused on a human rights, social justice initiative to bring awareness of the enormity of the *human trafficking problem* to our congregations and our communities. At that time, there is no question that human trafficking was absolutely flying under the radar in this country. It was still considered to be a problem affecting other countries and which we knew too little about. The term "modern day slavery" seemed to be an over-exaggeration, which it most certainly is not. It is second only to drugs as an illegal enterprise. Due to the efforts of many people and organizations, including ours, the problem is slowly emerging from the darkness and beginning to see the light of day. Last year, on UMW Sunday, Rev. Cathy Stengel spoke to us of her personal observations at the airport in Tampa of human trafficking taking place for all to see. Nationally, January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month. Awareness is the first step in allowing ourselves to be better educated about the subject.

In our church, some of our youth, their parents and others have been made aware that this problem concerns them as well, as documented in the DVD "Not My Life," in which one segment follows a teenager from Oklahoma who was rescued from traffickers at a truck stop after she had run away from a middle class home life and got caught in the web of sexual human trafficking. Her story, unfortunately, was not unique.

Our UMW unit was well educated on how prevalent the problem is in the Town of Greece when we were invited last October by the Aldersgate unit to attend a program where Greece Police Chief Todd Baxter spoke about human trafficking occurring in Greece—in our backyard. He told us the Greece Police had closed nine massage parlors which were fronts for sex trafficking and that it is indeed a problem for law enforcement. He was very specific about making sure our children and grandchildren were aware of traffickers who not only had a huge presence on the Internet but also preyed on vulnerable teens. We were impressed by the fact that Chief Baxter is making an effort to see that officers under his command were receiving additional training sponsored by the State so that victims of human trafficking, especially women and girls, were treated like victims instead of criminals and were referred to agencies where assistance could be given.

The National Human Trafficking Resource Center Hot Line Number to call if you ever suspect that human trafficking is taking place is 888-373-3888. The three main areas where trafficking is most likely to take place is sexual prostitution, domestic servitude (nannies, household help) and migrant labor or forced labor, as in restaurants, hotels, etc.

United Methodist Women will continue our work for social justice in the area of human trafficking as well as focusing on poverty and it's effect on the lives of women, children, and families, advocating for all where human rights have been denied.

#### **Library Resource Center Update**

#### A Bit of History

The Library Resource Center (LRC) at Greece United Methodist Church was organized on May 8, 1994, with Jane Vannicola at the helm. Pictures in a photo album show the LRC moved into its current location near the front of the sanctuary in approximately 1992, from its earlier location in a slim room that is now part of the Choir Room. Pastor Robert Sapp and Deacon Sandra Stoica signed off on a Mission Statement dated May 2003, which said "support the teachings of the United Methodist Church and serve the congregation in the promotion of Christian learning and growth."

#### **New Technology**

Jane Vannicola has spearheaded a move to digitize the operations of the LRC. The LRC Committee chose a software package, ResourceMate, and a desktop computer was donated to the LRC by Glen and Karen Pearson to make this a reality. The transition is underway, with the cataloguing efforts being led by Chris Collins. In the future it will be possible to search the library catalog and borrow items from a simple software package.

#### **Transitions**

It is with mixed emotions that we announce that Jane Vannicola has decided to retire from her position with the LRC after nearly 30 years of intense devotion to this library. Jane has worked tirelessly on all aspects of the library, from acquisitions and cataloguing to fundraising and administration. She was always especially dedicated to promoting the use of the library with the Sunday School classes. Kim Whittemore and Jane Banta are in the process of learning the ropes from Jane and will be reaching out to current LRC Committee members to find out who wishes to continue. It is especially appropriate to extend a big thank-you to Barbara Pike and Phyl-Ann Helmes as they have been serving continuously on the LRC Committee with Jane Vannicola since its inception.

#### **Recruiting for the Future**

The LRC Committee will oversee the running of the library and will have will have an initial planning meeting on Sunday March 24 at 9:30 a.m. in the library. Additionally, we are in need of volunteers to help with the digital cataloguing of our library collection (no experience required!) and to volunteer to help with "Children's Time" for Sunday School classes on Sunday mornings from approximately 9:30-9:45 or 10:00 (again, no experience required only enthusiasm for kids and books!). A small action-oriented group meets periodically to make a difference in how information is communicated in and around our church community. Mostly, we don't meet, we just do what needs to get done. Everyone in the group is committed to doing one or more activity to work towards better communication.

Our Focus: We realize that people consume information in many different ways. We are striving to feed information to everyone in all the ways it is consumed in our church community – both internally and externally focused.

Here's a partial list of thing are being actively worked:

- Monthly Newsletter New format, a new name. Delivered by mail, email, web site, and printed copies are available in the commons area.
- Weekly e-news we are actively pursuing how to distribute weekly upcoming news about the church via email and possibly other electronic ways to increase awareness.
- Our church has a Facebook page "Greece UMC". It has 47 Likes some people and some other pages including "Rethink Church" and "The United Methodist Church". Do you know you can share the page with your friends on Facebook?

#### Ten Simple Words:

#### Jesus, Mission, Pastor, Field, Connect, Read, Simple, Discipline, Fruit, Spirit

Ten Words offered to help you remember how to help with positive change in our congregation's outreach to make disciples of Jesus Christ to transform the world. Wrapped around everything is **PRAYER**, seeking God's wisdom and discernment that our efforts will be in accordance with His plan and purpose.

<u>JESUS</u> is first and most important to remember as we do anything in the church. He is "the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through [him]" (John 14:6). How do *you* help someone understand that?

<u>MISSION</u>: Why do we go to church? What purpose is there in our gathering? How is the church different from a social club where we have fellowship and we work to help other people?

<u>PASTOR</u>: If the church is to grow and be successful in its mission, pastors have to lead. Laity in a congregation provides leadership too, but in a different way. It has to be along with the pastor, not separate from (and certainly not in conflict with) the pastor's vision and leadership.

<u>FIELD</u>: In 1739, John Wesley found that very few people were in the church building, so he began to preach in a field. The result? About 3,000 people heard the Gospel message of grace that day! Wesley's greatest preaching impact was outside where the people were. Go out and find your field!

<u>CONNECT</u>: You connect with God through Jesus Christ. You connect with people inside the church. You connect with people outside the church - new people. When is the last time you made a new connection?

<u>READ</u>: "Continuous learning" is a key principle for today. Stephen Covey calls it, "sharpening the saw." Bible books help increase knowledge of Christian belief and practice, the United Methodist Church, and new ideas for reaching people with the Gospel. What have you read lately?

<u>SIMPLE</u>: Our world and our church are complicated. People are easily distracted. How can we tune out the distractions, the complexities, the "stuff" of our world and focus on what really matters?

<u>DISCIPLINE</u>: Spiritual disciplines are practices that help us develop qualities and habits in our lives that are more Christ-like, closer to God. They include worship, prayer, study of scripture, and the Lord's Supper (Communion). How does the word "Discipline" apply to you? In what way is God nudging you to develop better habits?

<u>FRUIT</u>: "Fruit" is a great metaphor for the results we should see in both our personal lives and in leadership of our church. First, how do our personal lives bear Fruit? What results should we expect? Each of us is different, so the "Fruit" of our lives will look different. However, there are some common qualities for those who follow Christ.

<u>SPIRIT</u>: Jesus said "you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses . . . to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). As we began with Jesus, following, learning, and growing, we go forward in the Spirit - Jesus present with us, even now. Wow! The book of Acts describes how that Spiritual power came upon the first disciples, enabling them to do the things Jesus did - and to carry out the mission he gave them.
