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The Days are Surely Coming...

October 21, 2019

Yesterday in worship the Hebrew Scripture lesson came from the prophet Jeremiah who boldly proclaimed, "The days are surely coming..." Indeed they are. The final days of 2019 are upon us, days when inside the church...the Session will wrangle together a budget for 2020, our newly elected officers will be trained and prepared for ordination and installation, the chancel and bell choirs will prepare an immense amount of music for the seasons of Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas, the mission committee will lead and organize our efforts to care for the least of these among us through the Harvest Sunday collection and our Angel Tree...this is just scratching the surface. Outside the church, our lives get equally as hectic – preparing to travel to be with family or to hospitably host family that comes to visit for the holidays, Christmas shopping, holiday parties, and on and on. *The days are surely coming*...

I am also bracing this year for the exhortations are surely coming...in cards, on Facebook newsfeeds, in devotional booklets...the exhortation to be thankful, to be grateful, perhaps even to be more grateful than I feel. It is true that love is chief verb of the Christian faith and gratitude is the chief virtue of the



Christian life. So, I've begun to wonder why it is that when I hear the exhortation to "count your blessings, name them one by one," my neck stiffens and something smart alecky seems on the tip of my tongue? Perhaps this is just another sign of my own sinfulness; I am prepared to confess that. But I've also begun to think that it's the being told to be grateful that irks.

When I used to take groups of teenagers away for mission trip and conferences, there were

always daily chores that needed to be done – cooking and cleaning responsibilities essential for the healthy communal life. The most intensive day was always the final day, in addition to individual packing there was the packing and loading of group property and the need to clean the lodging top to bottom so they would be in good shape for the next group. My first year in youth ministry, I spent the last morning of a mission trip trying to hand out assignments to whoever looked the least busy at the



moment – one teen boy (who had not learned the art of looking busy) upon receiving his third cleaning assignment of the morning snapped back at me, "Don't TELL me what to do!" I know how he felt.

Tom Currie, who taught at Union Seminary, recalled encountering a church member and her 4-year-old son in the grocery store. Tom noticed that the boy's shoes were untied so he stooped down to tie them. "Say thank you," the mother implored her son; "Tell the man, 'thank you." The little boy wasn't having any of it and refused even to look up from the ground. The mom kept insisting and finally Tom said something noble about not needing any thanks and got the heck out of there. Tom remarked, "Gratitude had never seemed such a miserable thing."



Ralph Wood, professor of Theology and Literature at Baylor University, wrote an essay on a theme he discovered in Flannery O'Connor's short stories. O'Connor is one my favorites, and she often cuts to the quick concerning moral and manners. Wood described the theme as "obedience to the unenforceable." Friends, there is no great virtue in doing what you are told to do, or else. And indeed, there is not much more virtue in doing what you are nagged to do. "Obedience to the unenforceable" is doing something not out of obligation or fear of the consequences, but freely, offering it as a gift. Such a gift is what created that living space that enables people to live and work together.

There is not much nagging in scripture. Have you ever noticed this? Rather, words like the 10 Commandments are more of an invitation to a life before God in which enforceability (even of the guilty) is not the chief characteristic. Jesus does not nag his disciples, much less those to whom he ministers, though he is certainly not above bidding them "to go and sin no more." But, in Jesus' mouth, even those words sounds more like an invitation to freedom than a reminder of guilt.

The gift of Thanksgiving is not its piety or our dutiful observance of the holiday, but the joyful offering of self that in its own very small way echoes God's lavish and abundant self-giving that has created space for us. God, Karl Barth reminds us, is the One who has time for us. Accordingly, we do not *have* to say, "thank you"; that is not what we are commanded to do. Instead, we *get* to say those words; we *may* say those words.

Friends, what truly occasions gratitude is the grace of the One whose promise is never to be without us, that One who makes time for us. *The days are surely coming*...thanks be to God. Thanksgiving is simply an opportunity for gratitude for the time and space given to us to share in this life and ministry together. That is not a small thing. It is gracious gift.

Thanksgiving is the annual national holiday in the United States and Canada celebrating the harvest and other blessings of the past year. In the United States we look back to the Pilgrims at Plymouth, Massachusetts in 1621, but settlers in Jamestown had already been celebrating the harvest and giving thanks since 1610. This practice of a national day of Thanksgiving in the US was sporadic until Abraham Lincoln made it official and permanent during the Civil War.



In 1963 John F. Kennedy said, "Over three centuries ago, our forefathers in Virginia and in Massachusetts, far from home in a lonely wilderness, set aside a time of thanksgiving. On the appointed day, they gave reverent thanks for their safety, for the health of their children, for the fertility of their fields, for the love which bound them together and for the faith which united them with their God."

As we at Trinity take time to give thanks for all our blessings, we ask that you consider demonstrating that thankfulness with your contributions to November's Special Offerings.




SERENDIPITY SINGERS ARE COMIN' TO TOWN





Bible Study for 2020

Disciple: Becoming Disciples through Bible Study

On November 10th, following the 10:30 worship service, we are holding an information and



planning session for the launch of Disciple Bible study. At this meeting we will provide additional information about the study, answer questions, and work to determine the start date for the study and the day and time of meetings. A signup sheet for those interested is still in the narthex.

A survey of both Old and New Testament books–34 weeks. Disciple Bible study is founded on the belief that people are hungry for the word of God, for fellowship in prayer and study, and for a sense of the disciple to which Christ is calling them as committed Christians. Disciple gives Old and New Testaments equal time, emphasizing the wholeness of the Bible as the revelation of God. Disciple invites persons to bring their experiences and struggles to Scripture, uses biblical language and biblical images, and draws upon the work of scholars to aid understanding of the Bible. It is also dependent upon group discussion of Scripture made possible through a commitment to weekly study and preparation.



Earlier this year the PC(USA) selected our presbytery, New Harmony Presbytery, to be one of a handful of presbyteries to participate in the *Vital Congregations Initiative*. Once our presbytery was selected, all of the congregation were invited to be a part of this initiative, and the Session of Trinity accepted the invitation. Our denominational and presbytery leadership have been clear – this is not a program, there are no guaranteed outcomes. It is an invitation to reflect on our health as a congregation using

the 7 Marks of Vital Congregations. We expect to identify several things we are doing really well, and a few areas of new mission and ministry where we might grow our service to Christ in this community.

The initiative formally kicks-off in January and is designed to be a twoyear conversation. You'll be hearing more as our Session begins its work, but at this stage it's time to share with you the 7 Marks of Vital Congregations and tell you what the first steps in the initiative will be.



The 7 Marks of Vital Congregations

- 1. Lifelong Discipleship Formation is about daily life. It's about how we claim and proclaim our identity as followers of Christ. It's about how we practice our faith; how we grow in faith, cherish faith, and share faith in the world. Beyond more words, how do people know we are disciples of Jesus Christ?
- **2. Intentional Authentic Evangelism**. Evangelism is simply sharing the Good News. It is authentic and it is intentional, not merely expressions of kindness or good moral ethics. It is through intentional spiritual practices in the faith community that we meld God's story with our story, and we share that story with people in our daily lives.
- **3. Outward Incarnational Focus** is about being the gathered community of Christ sent out! We go not because we have a strategy for new membership; we go because we have a Savior who commanded us to be on God's mission. We go because God's saving love in Christ cannot be contained in our buildings when we live with neighbors in need and a hurting world.
- **4. Empower Servant Leadership.** All people of God, in the image of Christ, are given fruit of the Spirit and spiritual gifts meant for building up the Church. In this way, we are all called to serve the Lord, to do our part in membership of the Body of Christ. Every part is necessary. Every part is valuable, and every voice is important. Every person should be equipped, nurtured, and supported to use their gifts to glorify God, through servant leadership.



5. Spirit-Inspired Worship is a gift of God's wonder! Worship is our lifeline to the Holy God. Our worship should be active participation into the living relationship with the triune God; thus, all should feel welcome and have a place. Worship should challenge, teach, transform, convict, and call us into a deeper relationship with God and one another; not gratify our comforts and entertain our desires.

- **6.** Caring Relationships in Christ requires true love; a sacrificial, self-emptying, perfect love. Although we are imperfect, it is about striving to see all people the way Christ sees them; not from judgments or preconceived perceptions. Caring relationships are about vulnerability and trust, about meeting all people of God where they are, and sharing our one Savior, Jesus Christ.
- 7. Ecclesial Health is about how we practice being the church together. It is about whether our mission, vision, and values match up with the ways we live together. With ecclesial health, there is joy and gratitude in coming together; people, not programs or properties are valued. People gather and are sent to be Christ's church in, to, and for the world.

First Steps

We are still learning much of what we as a congregation, led by the Session and Pastor, will do during this initiative, but we do know this much:

- Rev. Judi Settei, Parish Associate at First Presbyterian Church, Myrtle Beach will be our coach through the initiative. Judy was once a member of Trinity, and this congregation sponsored her as an Inquirer and Candidate on her journey to ordained ministry.
- The initiative includes a 7-part Bible study (one session for each of the 7 marks) and all of our members and friends will be invited to participate in this study in small groups. We anticipate invitations to these studies will begin early in 2020.
- Later in 2020 you will be asked to complete a Survey of Congregational Vitality and participate in an exegesis (exploration, study, and interpretation) of our neighborhood.

Opportunities to Get Involved

If you would be interested in serving as a Bible study leader or in helping to facilitate the Vitality Survey or the Neighborhood Exegesis Project, the Session would deeply appreciate your time and talents. Please speak with Pastor Tony, Marian Shelton, or June Metts.



Our final book of 2019 is *The World That We Knew* by bestselling author Alice Hoffman. *The New York Times* review of this novel called it a "hymn to the power of resistance, perseverance, and enduring love in dark times." It is primarily the story of Lea Kohn, a 12-year-old Jewish girl, who manages to flee Berlin on a train bound for France in the spring of 1941. Everyone is desperate. In Berlin, the newspapers print photographs of Jewish businessmen, lawyers, and professors with captions calling them animals. "That was how evil spoke. It made its own corrupt



sense; it swore that the good were evil, and that evil had come to save mankind. It brought up ancient fears and scattered them on the street like pearls. To fight what was wicked, magic and faith were needed. This is what one must turn to when there was no other option." The novel is a mix of historical fiction, mixing the brutal realities of Europe in the 1940s with a magical realism.

We will meet to discuss our reaction and responses to the novel on **Thursday, December 5** at 11am. If you have friends that enjoy good books and engaging conversation, please invite them.

Session Digest from September 2019

• The Congregation Nominating Committee has a complete slate of officers. For deacons, Janet Hoffert, Judi Bitner, and Larry Humason will serve a 3-year term. will serve a 3-year term. Ray Spitz will serve a 2-year term. For the Endowment Committee, Ray Spitz, Lynnette Thompson, and Mike Shelton will serve a one-year term. A Congregational meeting was called for October 13th after the 10:30 service.
