

Clergy's Corner

February 1, 2020

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This season brings new opportunities for new vision, new love, and new hope. These virtues can seem hard to find in today's troubled world, but Christ's everlasting promises of peace endure. Saint Paul's Episcopal Church's journey through Lent 2020 will be guided by our longing for new vision, new love, and new hope.

New Vision: "Where there is no vision, the people perish." (Proverbs 29:18a, KJV)

By engaging in prayerful conversations, the faithful folks of Saint Paul's Episcopal Church continue to discern God's vision for us as a community. These conversations occur whenever we gather, but they are especially holy when we gather as a community to study the Bible. The seasonal Bible Study will meet on Wednesdays after the midweek service during Lent (February 26, March 4, 11, 18, 25, and April 1). Evening sessions can be scheduled depending on interest expressed.

New Love: "The greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:13b)

Jesus calls us to love God and our neighbor and there will be three opportunities to live into Christ's call during Lent.

On March 21, there will be a SPACE gathering from 9:30 to 11:30 AM. SPACE is Saint Paul's All-Ages Christian Education ministry, providing an opportunity for people of all ages to get together and learn about the Lent and Easter seasons.

On March 28, the church will be open for quiet and prayer from 9:30 to 11:30 AM. There will be communal prayer at 9:30 AM followed by time for individual silent meditation.

On April 6, we are excited to host "The Outlet," an opportunity to open our doors to kids from the congregation and the wider community during Spring Break. Offering time and space for play, crafts, lunch, and educational activities, "The Outlet" will be held from 8 AM to 1 PM in Rennell Hall.

New Hope: "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing." (Romans 15:13a)

There is nothing more hope-filled than the promise of Christ's resurrection on Easter Sunday. We find this hope by journeying through Holy Week together, moving ever closer to the joy of the resurrection.

Palm / Passion Sunday is April 5. We worship together at 8 AM and 10 AM to mark Christ's triumphant entry to Jerusalem and to hear the story of his suffering on the cross.

Maundy Thursday is April 9. The 7 PM service remembers the Last Supper and includes the option to participate in foot washing. After the altar is stripped in silence, the church will remain open for one hour of prayerful meditation in the Lady Chapel.

Good Friday is April 10. The 12 Noon service walks with Jesus through his passion, death, and burial. At 7 PM, we remember Christ's journey to death in the Stations of the Cross.

Easter Sunday is April 12. Both Holy Eucharists (8 AM and 10 AM) joyfully celebrate Christ's triumph over death, the ultimate sign of God's love for all of humanity.

She has been a very strong advocate to meet our full Marks of Mission obligation with the diocese, which we did this year.

We are praying, we are talking the talk of love and fellowship, but besides a few programs like Lunch on us and the Rummage sale we are doing very little to serve the community around us. We certainly can't blame ourselves entirely, we just don't have the number of members that we did in the past. But we need to try to bring some of these programs back. For me, these are the things that show our commitment to God and show the community his glory. We are the greatness, or folly, of our church. Big numbers or small numbers we can make a difference in peoples lives. Try to do something at St. Paul's this year to help people that are not as fortunate in life as ourselves. I plan too and hope you will as well. I don't know what else we can do to make St. Paul's attractive to new members. The "Heavenly Boutique" is a good example of an effort to serve this local community. Let's hope it works. There is no good excuse as to why we did not host a giving tree this past Christmas even with our smaller congregation. Try to make a difference this year. Our best chance to make St. Paul's healthy is to keep our church's name prominent in the local community.

There will be two opportunities to support local businesses on Main Street through our Love Local ministry: February 19 and April 15. We will offer prayers and the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday - February 26 - from 6:30 AM to 7:30 AM. This unique ministry presents an opportunity to welcome others to the Lenten journey.

Ash Wednesday:

There are two opportunities to worship as a congregation on Ash Wednesday, February 26 - 12 Noon and 7 PM. Both services will include the imposition of ashes and the celebration of the Eucharist. Come and begin your Lenten journey with the faithful people of Saint Paul's Episcopal Church!

Adult Christian Education in Lent:

A six-session Lenten Bible Study will be held on Wednesdays after the midweek Eucharist for approximately 45 minutes using a curriculum to be determined. We will gather in Rennell Hall on Saturday, March 21, from 9:30 AM to 11:30 AM to learn about Lent and Easter through Bible study, craft activities, and conversation. Lenten Quiet Morning:

Lent can seem like a long season, especially if we journey alone. Let us come together as a community on Saturday, March 28, from 9:30 AM to 11:30 AM for a Lenten Quiet Morning. Our morning begins with communal prayer and the rest of the time is available for silent prayer and meditation.

Food Pantry

Our food pantry continues to collect non-perishable food items that are donated to either the "Lunch On Us" volunteers at St. Paul's or the Somerset County Food Bank (located on Easy Street in Bound Brook). In addition, we have an annual February "Souper Bowl" collection in which soup and crackers are added to our weekly donations. We encourage the congregation to drop off, what they feel they can afford, in the designated basket which is found in the narthex of the church. Once these donations reach approximately 25 to 30 bags of food, they are transported to the food bank. During the 2019 year, the food pantry has collected approximately 122 bags of groceries. Gifting Made Easy Scrip Program Fundraiser

The St. Paul's Vestry embarked on a fundraising program using the Scrip program running from October - December. The program turns everyday shopping into earnings for St. Paul's. Parishioners, their family, friends, neighbors, etc. bought gift cards (also known as Scrip) at face value. The church collected the order forms and payment and put in the order to Scrip. St. Paul's received a rebate on each card purchased.

For our first effort, there were 17 participants who ordered a total of \$6,105 worth of gift cards. St. Paul's made a profit of \$415. I think this was a great first effort and look forward to a repeat of the program in March.
