

Clergy's Corner

August 1, 2020

Dear Sisters, Brothers, and Friends in Christ,

Doing a quick search on Amazon reveals piles and piles of decorative objects with Biblical quotations. There are door knockers that read, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." There are plates that assure, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

Not surprisingly, there are numerous items with the following quotation from Jeremiah: "For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope" (Jeremiah 29:11). This seems to be a favorite verse for journal covers, pens, and especially calendars.

In this verse, God promises all people that our future is held in divine hands. No matter the surrounding circumstances, God has plans for our welfare. God knows that our future is already marked by holy hope.

During this strange and anxiety-producing time, it is hard to hold on to Jeremiah's assertion of the goodness of God's plans. Planning anything feels nearly impossible, especially when our plans are dependent on infection numbers, community spread, and other factors largely out of our control.

In other years, this would be the time for making plans and filling calendars. In other years, we would be finalizing details for our favorite Fall events. This year, the church calendar is largely blank.

As individuals, how can we hold on to God's promise of a future filled with hope? As a community, how can we faithfully plan a future we pray is pleasing to God?

Maybe this year, God is calling us to trust the divine plan more than our human plan. Maybe this year, God wants us to stretch our belief in divine goodness.

God's holy plan is rooted in a holy desire for holy goodness for holy people. Even with a largely empty church calendar, let us know, trust, and believe God's words to the prophet Jeremiah: that God desires our welfare, even in this anxious time.

Depending on the progress of our reopening, we will either go back to Bag Lunches or the full hot meal we previously provided. Thanks to all those that participated in this Outreach program.

Thanks to Rita McQuilkin for taking over the LOU program. Please give Rita all the support and encouragement that you afforded me. This is going to be a work in progress and she will need our cooperation.
