EVERYDAY SPIRTUALITY

A Book Study for Epiphany

Back in 2017, while attending a talk by author Rob Bell, Rev. James Hazlewood heard something that made him realize there is a different path to becoming more spiritual than many people are aware. During a Q&A session before Rob's speech, a young college student asked him what kind of spiritual practices he uses. After a long pause, he said, "You mean like, surfing." There was laughter in the audience of earnest seekers who had come to hear from this former pastor and now quasi-guru. While many laughed, Jim realized Rob was serious. He also realized that he himself employed many spiritual practices that didn't fall into the traditional categories of prayer, scripture, reading, worship and fasting. What about swimming, cycling, & hiking? What about reading, writing, or eating a simple meal? Jim's mind exploded with all the things he did in his ordinary life that are indeed very much spiritual. This lead him to a reexamination of spirituality-what it is, the times we relegate it to the corners of our life, and other times when it becomes all about all of life.

This time of year people are often thinking about making news years resolutions. Sometimes these resolutions relate to growing or developing our spiritual life. "This year I plan to begin every day with a half hour of devotions and end every day with a half hour of prayer." Then within a week or two of the year beginning we find that we can't keep up this schedule and stop doing devotions altogether. But what if spirituality wasn't a matter of adding something more to an already overwhelming calendar? What if spirituality had more to do with paying attention to how God was already present and active in our everyday, ordinary life?

Are you frustrated with traditional approaches to spirituality? Are you feeling or have you ever felt guilty about not following a regimented devotional practice? Are you wishing there was a way you could embrace God in your everyday life? The book, **Everyday Spirituality** may be just what you're looking for. Rather than prescribe another failed attempt at daily devotional readings, written prayers and scheduled moments of quiet meditation, **Everyday Spirituality** expresses the truth that much of what we already do in life is, in fact, spiritual.

As James Hazlewood shares in the introduction, "This is a book about everyday life. In living an everyday, ordinary, seemingly routine life, we are living out a spirituality. Not the kind of spirituality that's set apart. Not the kind where you go off to a



retreat center for silence and good food and walks in nature. I've got nothing against that, and in fact, I enjoy those retreats myself. But I need a spirituality that is real for me on Mondays at 6 a.m., when the alarm goes off, and Thursday during dinner with my kids, and Fridays, between the grocery store and the gym. This is a book that connects the stuff we do every day, every week or every so often with God.

If you would like a book, we will have copies available in the church office for \$10.00. I hope you are as curious to hear what the author has to say as I am.

As the author states in the conclusion of his book: "So what's next? Where do I go from here?

These are questions people have asked after reading this book. The questions reflect our American predilection for tasks. What should I do? What *more* do I need to do? We are tasked-oriented people.

But perhaps the answer for everyday spirituality is not so much what we must *do*, but how we are to *be*. Perhaps the answer is simple. . . start living every single day as an expression of the holy, the sacred, the divine. Live every day walking with God—and not just walking, but also sleeping, reading, breathing, cooking, laughing, grieving and wondering. Some of us just need to live life and not worry about what else we need to do or should do. I often wonder if our 21st century American quest for

hope, peace and meaning is a modern version of works righteousness. That's the idea that we just aren't good enough to earn God's love. At its core, this book and the movement I'm hoping to spark around everyday spirituality is an attempt to relieve people of the burden...the monster of 'more.' So, if nothing else, I'm hoping you'll live your life and know God is with you, in you and around you in a Grace-filled, loving, supportive way. No shame, no guilt, no should."

HISTORY OF IGLESIA LUTERANA SANTA CRUZ From Retired Pastor Patricia Muran

In 1997, some of the pastors of the Central Coast Collegium began a grassroots effort to start a new church in this area, and one that would reach the Hispanic community. When Patricia Muran (at the time a member of Saint John's Lutheran Church) announced that she would be entering PLTS to ultimately serve as an ordained minister to the Spanish speaking people, the mission church idea took hold. Patricia was settled here and was glad to stay and serve. So while she tended to her seminary studies, the core group of pastors strategized how to find mission support and to rally the conference churches to advocate for a new church. With much prayer, they contacted and secured financial backing from 1) local ELCA churches 2)Southwest California Synod 3) ELCA churchwide office.

In 2001, when Patricia graduated from seminary, she was ordained and called as a mission developer in Santa Maria, CA. Her church served a very marginalized community of mostly Mexican immigrants that have minimal education, speak Spanish and an native Mayan language, and have an indigenous culture. Many work in agriculture. The grace of Christ touched their hearts and lives and continues to do so after Patricia retired in 2016.

Pastor Esteban Salazar was called to IL Santa Cruz after an interim period and currently serves there with his wife Angie. We are hoping to reinvigorate our conference around this work as we keep the promise we made to them at their founding. This effort has always been rooted in the dreams and vision of the churches on the Central Coast and was not instigated by the Synod. Rather, they heard our request and responded. With pastoral departures from our region, congregational separations after 2009, and the need to respond to the Covid crisis, we are called upon again to partner with IL Santa Cruz and support them with time, talent, and treasure as they live into their development.

Last year, IL Santa Cruz presided at over 50 baptisms and 22 confirmations, by far the healthiest of all our churches.

God is doing something in Santa Maria. And it is our honor to be invited to be part of it.






FUN FACTS FOR A PANDEMIC Part Eight

Making Online Learning More Fun:

Zoom school is becoming just a little bit more bearable, thanks to a new viral trend. Many instructors find student participation lagging during remote classes, so when a teacher made a TicTok video of herself plastering a sticker on her face each time a student spoke up, the idea quickly caught on. "My students loved it. They were laughing, and I had never had all 18 of my students completely engaged in my math lesson," said Taylor Dale. By the end of a class, some teachers' faces are covered in stars, or characters. "It's a way to block out all the craziness with something fun," said Krista Coletti.







Religious Values:

"The more we seek solace through politics," says Richard Just, "the more unhinged American politics becomes; and the more unhinged American politics becomes, the more solace we need." Just suggest that religious traditions at their best provide an antidote to the political divisiveness we face. Humility teaches us that we may be wrong and our political opponents right. Forgiveness helps us let go of past burdens. Mutual trust makes space for working at knotty civil difference. Lonely Deaths:

Some residents of nursing homes who have been spared Covid-19 are dying of loneliness, according to a study by two economists from the University of Norte Dame. This is especially true in five-star facilities in areas where the rate of coronavirus infections have been low and isolation measures were stringent. In September the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services relaxed visitation standards for nursing homes, noting that "nursing home residents derive value from the physical, emotional, and spiritual support they receive through visitation from family and friends." (Bloomberg Business Week, Nov 9)

Stressor: It is already known that a hostile attitude can contribute to coronary artery disease. New research at Baylor University has disclosed that a particular kind of hostile attitude-cynical hostilities — can be even more problematic. It consists of "negative beliefs, thoughts, and attitudes about other people's motives, intentions and trustworthiness," said lead author Alexandria Tyra. It "appears to be extremely relevant in today's political and health climate." and can be harmful not only for our short-term stress responses but also our long-term health," she said. (Baptist News Global, November 23)

Black Santa:

Last week Chris Kennedy and 4-year-old daughter Emily decorated their lawn with Christmas cheer, including their inflatable Black Santa. Then, they received a hateful anonymous note telling them to remove it because Santa has been a white man "for the past 600 years." Shocked, Kennedy shared the letter on Facebook. Soon, in solidarity, their neighbors began putting up Black Santas – so many that retailers are selling out. "The outpouring of love, support, and unity that we're seeing from the community has just been incredible," said Kennedy. "At the end of the day, what was meant for evil was flipped for good."



Remembering to Say Thanks:

In March, Jeff Gerson was admitted to New York City's NYU Langone Tisch Hospital suffering from Covid-19. He was intubated the next day, and when he woke up a month later, Gerson had no recollection of his recovery, but still wanted to thank the heroes who saved his life. So he tracked down the names of all 116 doctors, nurses, and therapists by looking through his insurance records and treatment charts. Then, he sent a letter of thanks naming each one. Health-care workers "often go without appreciation," Gerson said, "and the point of my letter was to give them the recognition that they're due."

Solidarity:

Tanja Babich's 10-year-old daughter refused to wear her glasses during online school, afraid of what her classmates might think. So Babich, a morning news anchor for ABC7 Chicago, decided to wear her glasses every day for a week as a gesture of solidarity. She also put out a call for viewers to send in pictures of their children wearing spectacles, and they responded enthusiastically. "Whatever people say or think about you is none of your business," Babich said on air. "Just be yourself, authentically and unapologetically." Babich's daughter now wears her own glasses, encouraged by the hundreds of photos of other kids wearing glasses with frames of every conceivable color and shape.



Amazon Driver to the Rescue:

A passing delivery driver helped a man escape from a burning building. Sean Campbell was carrying packages for Amazon in a Florida suburb when he heard the sound of screams. He ran toward the sound and discovered that a fire in a house's garage was quickly growing, with an elderly man still inside. Campbell ran in and found the man in his kitchen, searching for his walker. The 23-year-old driver quickly helped him outside. Tim West, the rescued man's son, praised Campbell for being "brave enough" to run in. "It was fantastic," West said.


