Dear friends in Christ,

With the presence of social distancing, we have learned that when certain doors to carrying out mission work have been closed, God opens other doors for that work to be accomplished!

One example of this was the Disaster Response workshop that I was able to provide last month for the Lutheran Church in Guatemala. In a total lockdown due to Covid-19, it was impossible for Guatemalan church leaders to meet together in person. Limitations on travel between Latin American countries also meant that we could not get teaching resources from the Central America storage point in Panama to where they were needed in Guatemala. However, with the gift of modern technology, it was possible to organize a week-long Zoom Disaster Response Workshop, with Pastor Alejandro Lopez in Panama teaching the course; to provide Spanish workbooks via the internet to each of the participants; to include our area facilitator from his home in Belize; and to provide a final session for discussion and questions with Pastor Ross Johnson of LCMS Disaster Response in St. Louis. Four countries, three time zones, and

As in all events coordinated through the Mercy Center, our goal is to help the missions and partner church leaders to learn how to re-teach the skills they acquire, so that capabilities for showing the mercy of Christ in close connection to Word and Sacrament ministry are multiplied within their own church contexts. In the last few weeks I've received requests for teaching materials or workshops in Argentina and Bolivia - so these events will be part of my focus over the next few months. In the meantime, Missionary Nurse Jamielynn Tinkey and I continue to plan how to best present a Mercy Center conference on "Life Issues" so that it will serve the needs of many different Latin America and Caribbean countries. Laws regarding gender issues, abortion or euthanasia (to name a few) are different in the various countries, so we want to provide a good basic resource on a range of topics. Like many people in North America, individuals here often know that certain things, such as abortion, are not in accord with God's will, but they might not understand why, or how to defend their beliefs, and we hope to engender that ability with education from God's Word.

There are many things for which we thank God at this time (please include them in your prayers!) Two new missions have opened in Belize, where we met with the regional leadership team in January. Many contacts have been made here in the DR with people who have watched online worship services during Covid-19. Last week's tropical storm brought less damage than initially expected. Lutheran Heritage Foundation has printed more Spanish books for children and more Spanish Bibles, which LAC missions will soon receive when distributed from Brazil. Our two mango trees have had the most abundant crop of fruit we have ever seen and the chickens are laying eggs like crazy - to the benefit of both ourselves and others in the church and community. We also have avocado windfalls from the neighbor's tree!

At the same time we face the same types of challenges that you face during this time of uncertainty. Our real comfort is in knowing that God never changes. He loves you and He loves us. He loves those who still have not heard about what He has done for them. This is why we are so thankful for your partnership in this venture to share that good news. Thank you for your support and prayers as we go about this work in the name of Jesus!
