The Pastor's Column

I first wrote this column in 2007 and thought it bore repeating.

"November silently sneaks up on us, catching our senses by surprise"

I read these words in "A Simple Abundance: a Daybook of Comfort and Joy" by Sarah Ban Breathnach. Indeed, it is November first and today it is grey outside with a breeze that reminds me of the winter to come. There is shift in my life. As it gets colder, my recreational life often shifts from lots of activity (walking, bike riding, kayaking, time to watch the sunset) to the quieter space – curled up with a good book, building a fire; listening to music, or sharing with a friend.

There is another shift as November emerges. It is the season of Thanksgiving. Not just a day, but hopefully a season. How do we cultivate our habits of giving thanks? I'm pretty good about immediately saying thank you and in my heart, I feel sincere gratitude, but often get so involved in whatever the next thing is in my life, that I don't take the extra step that expresses how much I truly appreciate what has happened. I'd like to be more conscious about how I share my gratitude. I admire those for whom it seems so natural.

Like an Advent Calendar that prepares us for the birth of Christ, can we think of those ways to prepare ourselves in thanksgiving for all that we have received?

Here are a few suggestions:

- Begin the day and end the day with a simple word of thanks to God.
- Cultivate the habit of giving one genuine complement to another human being as well as yourself.
 Words can hurt, words can heal.
- Offer to do something out of the ordinary for someone in thanksgiving for who they are in your life.
- If not doing it already, add a mealtime ritual of each family member giving thanks for something. Create a bulletin board or "thanksgiving tree" and keep adding to it. Make a "blessings" jar and every time there is something to appreciate, write it down. On Thanksgiving day, maybe read them around the table.
- Pay closer attention to the service people in your life (mail deliverers, cashiers, garbage collectors, etc.)
- Create thanksgiving cards or write notes (could be an email) or make a phone call out of the blue just to say thanks.
- Try saying thank you for something that initially feels very negative. See if there is something positive to come out of it.

Appreciation is the highest, purest form of love because it asks for nothing and gives everything. Saying "I appreciate you" or "Thank you" is powerful – in fact in its simplicity it has the incredible capacity to change lives.
