The Pastor's Column

As Lent begins this week, I am reminded of how important it is to take the time to do "soul work". What I mean by this is to adjust the craziness of schedules and tasks and the non-essentials and find some time to reflect deeply, draw out the creative spirit, and do some new prioritizing of my energies.

Some Lenten seasons I do this much better than others. The year that stands out for me as the most significant was the year I decided to "fast" from television. I put a cloth over the TV and didn't watch it for six weeks. It was a fascinating time. Because I was alone, I tended to turn the TV on for "company" as much as anything and watched a lot of mindless entertainment. Now, I'm not trying to be a purist or moralist, I still have my favorite shows and they don't all have redeeming value. However, my experience that year was that I discovered some things that I was missing and that definitely "fed my soul" – with this new found time, I began playing a keyboard with my rudimentary knowledge of piano and then I pulled out my hidden violin. I did much more reading. I wrote a journal as I was working through a particularly difficult time in ministry and discovered some new paths to work on "the problem". I had more time to connect with some friends and some parishioners. It really was a significant time.

All that being said, you would think that I would repeat it. I never have with the same kind of discipline. However, each Lent there is something that I have "given up" and something that I have "taken on" that has made a difference in my spiritual journey. Our District Superintendent, Adrienne Brewington, has invited the clergy of her district to join in a Lenten fast accompanied by a commitment to practice more deliberate disciplines of prayer and study. It's not a one size fits all fast, which I appreciate. Each of us is asked to think about what will make the difference in our ministries. I am in my own process of discernment about what that will look like for me.

So, I also offer the invitation to you, and I offer to help you in your discernment. What can you do differently in these six weeks that will draw you closer to God, will feed your soul, and equip you to better live out the Way of Love? Even a small step may make a huge difference.

May these Lenten days remind us of the gift of Jesus who lived, died, and was raised for our sakes.

Celebrating 200 years

Methodist 101 A Segment of History – "After the Beginning"

As you should be well aware, Stony Brook Community Church traces its origins to 1809 when Deborah Davis organized a class meeting in her home and invited Circuit Riding preachers to come to Stony Brook.

Tracing a little more of our history with each issue, we will look at the next 50 years leading up to the building our present structure.

It seems that they continued to meet in the Davis home until a small church was erected in 1817 by several denominations with a predominant membership of Methodists. Following a revival in Cow Harbor (Northport), there was rapid growth in Stony Brook. William Jewett and Fitch Reed were the preachers at the time. For a long time Stony Brook was part of the Smithtown Circuit, but then, sometime prior to 1848 split off and was linked with Port Jefferson, Mt. Sinai, and Setauket.

In 1859, it was recorded that there was a membership of 75, with an incredible Sunday School of 202 members (both children and adults). That reminds us of how seriously they took Christian education and one had to participate for a while before committing to membership. There had been another revival, in the spring of 1843, which accounted for this new growth. A new pastor, Daniel Jones, was appointed and the church became incorporated s the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Daniel Jones, the preacher, was responsible for raising the funds, paying the bills, developing the architectural design, supervising the work of Nathan Oakes, the carpenter, obtaining the materials and doing much of the labor! (I wonder when he had time to preach, visit, and evangelize).

So, we have inherited this beautiful building in which we worship today.
