





Children work together to fill Heifer International 'arks'

The SBCC Sunday School students are joining children from throughout the Annual Conference as they raise funds to fill 10 "arks" with animals to be donated to needy families in the world's poorest regions through Heifer International.

The youngsters have accepted the mission-giving project at the request of Bishop Jeremiah Park, who also has issued an invitation for 1,000 children to join him for a day of celebration at the New York Annual Conference, to be held at Hofstra University on Saturday, June 14. The Children's Day at Conference, to take place from 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., will include many fun activities in a carnival-like atmosphere on the Hofstra campus.

Children and Youth Coordinator Sue Murphy hopes that many of the Sunday School children will be available to attend the June 14th event. Between now and then, the Conference is asking that each church raise money for the Heifer International ark project. The goal is to fill 10 arks,



valued at \$5,000 each. Each ark "contains" two pigs, two cows, two trios of rabbits, two donkeys, two beehives, two sheep, two llamas, two flocks of geese, two goats, two oxen, two flocks of chicks, two trios of ducks, two trios of guinea pigs, two water buffalo and two camels.

The Sunday School children will continue to collect your "loose change" to help in this effort. If you can act as a chaperone for the Children's Day at Conference event, please contact Sue Murphy at 871-2368.

United Methodist 101:

A Continuing Series by Pastor Elizabeth Braddon

As you read this, I am attending the 2008 General Conference in Fort Worth, TX. Last month, I described the United Methodist organization. This month, I will briefly summarize some of the important issues that will be reviewed and decided upon and which in most cases will guide the church for the next four years and in others result in possible permanent changes.

Seven Vision Pathways and Four Foci – The Council of Bishops, the Connectional Table and the General Agencies are requesting that we concentrate on four vital and very specific areas of ministry over the next four years: Developing quality leadership, both clergy and lay; developing new churches; ministering in the area of global health; and working toward the eradication of profound poverty. The General Agencies are committed to working together in these four areas, and the church appears fairly unified on this direction.

Worldwide Church: Currently the United Methodist Church is organized as a U.S. church that has some satellites called Central Conferences in other parts of the world, namely Europe, Africa and the Philippines. The structure has fostered the dominance of the U.S. and the colonialism of the other areas. The proposal for this General Conference is that all areas of the church be called regional conferences and that the U.S. become one regional conference. This would pave the way for some additional structural changes in the future with the hope that the UMC will truly assume a worldwide character. There will be much discussion on this proposal, which I have favored.

The Purpose of the Church: The current statement of purpose says that the church is to make disciples. The proposal is to add the words, "for the transformation of the world." This is likely to pass without a problem.

The Status of Persons Who are Homosexual, Bisexual or Transgendered: The controversy over the membership, ordination and marriage of persons of differing sexual identities remains a major struggle in the denomination. During the past four General Conferences, I have hoped for and worked toward the full inclusion of all persons and have been deeply saddened that the church has not lived up to its slogan: "Open Hearts, Open Minds and Open Doors."


General Church Budget and Apportionments: The proposed budget uses between three and four cents of each dollar you donate to the local church.
