The Pastor's Column

Approaching the Holiday Season: Holiday or Holy Day?

Halloween is past, and while we've been finding Christmas decorations in the stores since August, now is the time when we gear up for Thanksgiving through Christmas. How are we going to approach this time this year?

Thanksgiving has always been an important day for me. Partly because I'm so busy at Christmas, that Thanksgiving is the time that I get to



gather with some of my family and friends. For years, when my parents were alive, I hosted Thanksgiving at my house and I loved it. My sister's family was thrilled not to have to join the thousands traveling to L.I. for the day. I love Thanksgiving worship because it is the one opportunity for persons of many different faiths to gather and offer thanks to the Divine Power of their lives – it's not a "Christian Holiday," so it isn't about adapting – it is about appreciating our differences while gathering in common gratitude for life. It is a day of the senses – wonderful food smells, colors and tastes; a pre-dinner or post-dinner walk in the woods or around the neighborhood; game playing or football watching; storytelling.

Part of me has always been torn about Thanksgiving between this picture of family bliss and another call to help at a soup kitchen or host a community gathering for both the hungry and the lonely. Is that where you are being called this year?

Along with its joy, Thanksgiving also can be the trigger for grieving what isn't the same year after year. It begins a season of grief for those who are no longer gathered around the table; it can be a season of yearning for personal relationships to be different. It is always a hard season for the unemployed, but this year the economic anxiety has spread far and wide. Recognizing our own or one another's pain in the midst of a season that puts all the emphasis on joy is one of the best gifts we can offer one another.

There is a tradition that I have found helpful: It is called "Blue Christmas" or "Longest Night." It is a service of worship early in *Continued on Page 6*

A Letter from Bishop Jeremiah Park on the Economy

October 15, 2008

Let thy steadfast love, O Lord, be upon us, Even as we hope in thee" (Psalm 33:22)

Dear United Methodists of the New York Area:

Greetings to you in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

Not since the Great Depression has the world economy experienced such turmoil and uncertainty as it has recently. All around us there is confusion, fear, anxiety, depression and anger. Economic stresses are affecting our families profoundly. Many people in our churches are suffering real pain. Not least, the poorest among us who know suffering on a daily basis are rendered even more vulnerable to shrinking financial resources, opportunities and compassion. And then there are those who live in extreme poverty. The plight of those who make up half of the world's population, living on less than two dollars a day, is the bleakest of all as the world economic downturn will inevitably impact their lives most severely.

As people of faith, this is the time for holy boldness with holy imagination. Now is not the time to hold on in fear, but the time to give witness that our God cares. Now is not the time to shrink from the scare of scarcity, but to open our arms to the hurting people in our community and the world in witness to the abundance of God's love and compassion. Now is not the time to turn inward, but the time to reach out and touch lives with the good news of the reign of God. As the feast of indulgence of Wall Street is over, let the feast of the kingdom of God flourish. Jesus said:one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions (Luke 12:15)seek first God's kingdom and God's righteousness (Matthew 6:33).

God is our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, our shelter from the stormy blast, and our eternal home. Indeed, the steadfastness of God's love and faithfulness towards us endures forever. Though the mountains shake, waters roam and foam, nations rage and kingdoms totter, the God who is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble (Psalm 46:1) is with us. Our God, who is concerned about the wellbeing of God's children more than anyone else, is ever close to us in this time of trial.

I pray that our people will find compassion and comfort, strength and courage, faith and hope in the vision and values of God's kingdom in our church for such a time as this.

Ecclesiastes 3:1 says, *For everything there is a season*. This tumultuous time will also pass. God's people, take heart. Keep the faith. Let us put our hope in the Lord *both now and forevermore* (Psalm 131:3).
