"Easter Changes Everything"

3 Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, 4 and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you... 1 Peter 1:3-4 (NRSV)

I love that phrase; "Easter changes everything." A few Sundays from now we will all have the opportunity to experience the new life and new hope that only the resurrection can offer. But first we must move with Jesus through the final two weeks of Lent, Palm Sunday, and into the dark reality of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. It is only once we have moved through those preparatory experiences that we can then come out of the tomb on Easter Morn and be born anew into the light and life that is Christ Jesus. The truth is, Easter has the power to bring new life to the world and into each of our lives, even—and especially—if we have been going through dark and uncertain times.

I know that a number of you have been through or are going through your own personal Good Friday experiences to varying degrees. Some of us are walking through the valley of the shadow as we or loved ones go through health issues. Some of you are going through job and financial issues, while others may be experiencing relationship or other issues.



Regardless of the difficulties you may be dealing with, God offers a promise to you this Easter. This life and all the insecurities, troubles, frailties, and scars will be transformed by the hope and healing that only God can give amidst the struggles. Yes, God will give the possibility of turning your scars into stars as you live by faith in God through Christ Jesus.

In fact, the strength and the hope that I draw from the Holy Week stories is that even Jesus, God's only begotten Son, went through terrible trials, scars, and human struggles. Even he was not exempt from the uncertainty and frailty of this life. He knew the pain of loss and the depth of love. He knew the reality of betrayal and the strength found in remaining faithful. And he knew pain and even death. Yet it never overshadowed the reality of new life given by God in Him for the salvation of the world. And He knew the power of forgiveness, the complete and full forgiveness that can only come from the God of the universe as God offers unconditional love to you through Him. That forgiveness, that complete love, offered in His death and resurrection is for us the power of hope and life amidst death.

It is because of the profound significance that Maundy Thursday and Good Friday bring to the experience and understanding of resurrection that we have decided to add a new service this year on Good Friday. Although there is an afternoon combined service among the churches of our area, many folks from our church cannot attend a daytime service. Consequently, this year we will be offering a special Good Friday Evening Tenebrae service with hymns and reflections read to commemorate the Stations of the Cross, the fourteen profound moments and events of the last day in Christ's earthly life as told by us as onlookers. This is a very deep and meaningful service and one that I would encourage all in our congregation to make every attempt to be present for and experience. It will have an impact on your Easter Morning Celebration so that Easter can change everything.

Over the last few years our family has been through a number of health issues and challenges that have taken up much of our time and energy in order to deal with them, the kind of issues that can make your life feel as if it is all spinning out of control. Yet I know there are many of you who are dealing with much greater difficulties. And while it has not been easy, when I stop and think of Holy Week and all that Christ went through for us I am humbled as life is put into perspective for me. Yet even more so, when I think of Easter morning, when I think of the great old hymns that bring such joy and memories, when I think of the brisk and beautiful experience of worshiping the Lord of Life as the sun comes up over Stony Brook Green at our sunrise service, when I think of the message of hope offered by our youth in the 30 Hour Famine, I am propelled into that promise of new life once again. When I think of the joy that Easter worship brings, the choirs, the music, and the promise of resurrection, all of the struggle, doubt, and fear seem to disappear as the warmth of God's love becomes so real in that promise of resurrection, becomes so real in the fellowship of this church family, and as my perspective is changed, everything changes and there is promise and hope – real hope!



I pray that God's promise of new life brings hope to you and to the world once again this Easter. Easter Changes Everything, my friends. May you come to know the reality and the power of that statement on Easter this year. May you experience the reality of Good Friday as we recount the final events of the life of Christ, and may the resurrection of faith and hope become much more real and powerful for you this Easter. I look forward to sharing in that reality and that joy with you in the weeks ahead. For now, let us let every Sunday in this season of Lent be a little Easter in itself. And may your joy be full, and your heart be filled.

See you in church. See you at the cross. See you at the resurrection. Thanks be to God!

April 13, Holy Thursday/Maundy Thursday

Holy Thursday, or Maundy Thursday, marks the last conversation Jesus has with his disciples, a conversation grounded in what he calls a new commandment (mandatum in Latin, hence our English word "Maundy"). He illustrates and underscores the new commandment by washing the disciples' feet: "Love one another as I have loved you."

April14, Holy Friday/Good Friday

Church Council
