### The Pastor's Column

"Take It To Heart"

From a sermon preached 9-7-08

As much as I love vacation, I also love returning. I'm excited as we enter this fall and move into our ministries together for another season. I've always thought of Labor Day as New Year's Eve – this is when the real year begins in my life. Maybe it's left over from school days, but this is when if feels like everything gets started.



So, my New Year's sermon for you this morning is about getting to the

heart of the matter: What is the Heart of Christianity, and then how do we take it to Heart?

Thinking about the heart is a great metaphor for our faith. It has several nuances: To begin with, it suggests what is most central – what is the core of our faith – the heart of the matter.

It also suggests what is it that drives our faith: What is the heartbeat without which our faith would cease to live?

Thirdly, it reminds us of our center – we have the phrase "head and heart." It reminds us of a faith that goes beyond the world of ideas – it must connect with our deepest yearnings.

Last, but not least – the Heart is the metaphor for love.

Paul approaches our faith this morning with the words, "Owe no one anything, except to love one another: for one who loves another has fulfilled the law. Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law."

Now that's getting to the Heart of the Matter - or IS IT? Is it enough to say our faith is about loving our neighbor, that if we just do no harm we have reached to the heart of our faith? How often we ascribe love and compassion to being "Christian" virtues. It is certainly tempting to go there, but frankly it is arrogant! Christianity has no corner on the capacity for living ethically. Buddhists, Islamists, Jews, Unitarians, Ethical Societies, tribal religions all hold as their core the call to love and compassion. It is certainly primary to our practice but not exclusive.

# United Methodist 101: An Ongoing Series by Pastor Elizabeth Braddon

Global and National Missions are an important part of the United Methodist Church. One way this work is supported is through our World Service apportionments (about \$.04 of each dollar given). Because of the historic missions, there are United Methodist churches in Africa, Europe and the Philippines as well as relationships with independent Methodist churches in South and Central America that grew out of the work of United Methodist missionaries.

The main agency that oversees this work is the General Board of Global Ministries, including the Women's Division and the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). There are a variety of ways that people serve in mission. There are about 515 people who are currently commissioned for service. That includes 237 full-time missionaries serving outside the United States, plus another 52 who are serving as church and community workers in the U.S. There are two- and three-year mission intern opportunities for young adults (ages 20-30). All of these programs are supported by our World Service Apportionments, United Methodist Women and the Advance (local churches that commit support funds).

In addition, several thousand people participate in very short-term "Volunteer in Mission" programs usually through their annual conference. Our annual conference is currently sponsoring many Volunteer-in-Mission teams to Biloxi, MS; Mozambique; Costa Rica; Haiti; Bolivia; and Ghana. Over the past 15 years, I have gone to Mozambique, Bolivia and Biloxi, MS, through these programs. It is a life-changing event. What then is at the Heart of our faith? It is our relationship to God as we have come to know God through the life and death of Jesus. Because it is the relationship formed – it means we are called to work at it. There are some core practices of faith that will bring the faith we assent to – that is, say we believe in – to being the faith that we live.



- 1) To offer more ways for us to come together as small groups exploring the foundations of faith through Bible studies and book discussions. The purpose is to begin with knowledge get beyond Biblical illiteracy and also to move to the practical: What does it mean for our lives and the life of the world?
- 2) To deepen our worship experiences together on Sunday mornings, but also to explore how we might reach others through Taizé or other alternative worship opportunities.
- 3) To link our Sunday School, Sunday worship and youth experiences through our "Seasons of the Spirit" curriculum.
- 4) To expand our opportunities for serving the community and beyond with mission groups like Habitat, but also serving meals at a soup kitchen, or going to Biloxi.
- 5) To strengthen our church through wider church leadership development within and ways to reach outside our doors to invite others in.

To practice our faith is to pay attention to God, to be clear about our Christian identity, to nurture one another, to reach out in compassion and justice, and to live the way of Jesus, passionate about Love.

I hope you will join me in this New Year's set of resolutions, and as we come to the table today, seal our commitment to and relationship with the God of Love who has invited us to partake in this feast and seal our commitment to and relationship with one another because we know what it is to be loved.
