A Message from our Pastor

"Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back." – Luke 6:37-38

The other day I participated in a free webinar that was advertised to help in rediscovering hope and energy in ministry. Unfortunately, it turned out to be a commercial for an extended seminar the sponsors were offering. But the premise of the presentation was interesting – what low- or no-budget activities can churches do to help support their communities where they are in these moments?

They gave a few examples – one was a women's group that was frustrated with their lack of membership. Instead of rolling down a kvetching rabbit hole, they talked to a few young mothers and created a practice of distributing teddy bears with little pockets in them, where they would insert an age-appropriate prayer for the receiver, that a parent or the child could read before going to sleep. The prayers were updated periodically. Another group went out to grain elevators to pray with farmers who were bringing the harvest. A different group took the opportunity of ongoing construction near their church to offer people the opportunity to write short prayers on colorful strips of cloth, which were attached to a construction fence for a brief time, and then later brought in and combined to create a beautiful altar cloth.

These examples got me to thinking – where and how can we be present as spiritual practitioners for our wider community.

Trustee Update on the Bell Structure Project from Ben Grinnell

Summary

In 2019, while repainting the steeple of the church, a contractor discovered rotted wood around the exterior of the bell structure. Upon further inspection, the bell support structure itself was determined to be compromised by rot and age. Since then, the bells and chimes have been silent. This project will repair and replace the bell support structure so that the bells and chimes can ring again.

Since discovery of the problem and the silencing of the bells, we have been actively working on the project. We engaged an engineering firm to assess and create a plan of correction as well as manage the project. Bids were solicited recently with two qualified companies submitting. The bids are due soon and once received and reviewed, a company will be selected to do the work and a schedule established. The work is expected to be completed sometime this summer with some essential scaffolding around the steeple for contractor access.

The church will pay for the work when it is done and then fundraising will commence to cover the outlay. We have assembled a fundraising group to establish a plan with grant applications being an important part. We've also researched grants and applied for a matching grant with the State of Connecticut for historic preservation. This grant was secured and will require a community fundraising effort to meet half the cost of the project that is slated for this fall. Stay tuned for more as things unfold. Overview of the proposed project:

In 2019, while repainting the steeple of the church, a contractor discovered rotted wood around the exterior of the bell structure. Upon further inspection, the bell support structure itself was determined to be compromised by rot and age. This project will repair and replace the bell support structure and replace the roof around the belfry.

The project involves mostly interior work of replacing the bell structure and re-hanging the bells. However, in order to access the bell structure, the louvers on all sides of the belfry will be temporarily removed and stored. At the conclusion of the project, the louvers will be re-installed as before. In addition, the belfry roof, which is not visible from street level, will be replaced. This will involve the demolition and removal of the existing roof. The new roof will be ZCC metal roofing over two layers of membrane.

Description of the project need and why it is a priority:

The project is a priority for the church for two reasons. First, from a safety perspective, the bell structure supports 4 (four) bells which weigh several thousand pounds. The structure has been temporarily secured but this project would repair and replace the existing structure to re-establish a safe and secure future for the bells and the surrounding steeple. Secondly, since the discovery of this issue with the bell structure, the bells have been silent for the Washington community. The hope is to restore the bell structure and ring the bells again for the Washington Green and the community as a whole.



Green Fair 2022

The 2022 version of the Green Fair will be Saturday, July 9. The committee is starting preparations for another fantastic event with some changes this year. Since the Parish House will be less available for storage of large items, we have decided to bypass large furniture this year. We will still accept chairs and nice rugs but gone (for now at least!) are the beds, dressers, tables, etc. We are also rethinking the food and are considering a food truck or two. Other additions include an expected increase in music offerings and silent auction items. Children's area will have more crafts and activities as well.

What does all this mean for you? It means we need help! Help getting quality auction items. Help with making the bake tent the best ever! Help in all other the areas as well. Green Team Update

The Green Team is active again and revitalized by a new -to-us program called "The Green Congregation Challenge". The Southern New England Conference of the United Church of Christ (SNEUCC) sponsors this program that aims to:



Provide structure and resources for congregations to make meaningful changes that will contribute to the urgent and necessary global effort of caring for our environment.

And, with hope, create a more just and healthy future for everyone and for generations to come.

What is it? The Green Congregation Challenge has four levels of certification that moves us progressively toward deeper and more effective change-making. In each of the levels, there are five categories:

- Educate includes church and community outreach to share current environmental information and ways that folks can take personal action.
- Organize Address the structure of our Green Team efforts to make it integral to our church life.
- Reduce/ Recycle/ Rethink Take action within the church facilities and promote to church members and our greater community the concepts of reducing energy use and overall carbon footprint and change the way we do things.
- Connect Connect with other local organizations as well as larger groups in our region to share/gather information.
- Advocate This is another educational component that deals specifically with the democratic process. It will include workshops, discussion groups, and other educational opportunities to teach people how to communicate their environmental (and other) values to government representatives.

Haven't we done a lot in the previous years? Well... yes we have! Indeed the Green Team has held numerous educational activities and have taken some good measures in this church to reduce, recycle and reuse and wish to acknowledge and honor that work. Some of those things, like eliminating single use plastic water bottles and taking energy conservation measures are discrete items in the challenge and so those are being taken as accomplishments toward the challenge. But for the educational, reduce/recycle/rethink, connecting and advocating categories, we're starting fresh with a larger team, new energy and new activities. There is plenty of work to do here and outward into each of our church families and into the community and we're looking forward to digging in.

Anyone interested in helping our church become a greener congregation is invited to join us at any of our upcoming Green Team meetings. By taking up the challenge and committing to taking incremental but important steps toward protecting God's Creation, we can take action to promote a shift toward a better, healthier and more stable environment for everyone.

Our next meeting will be in person on a Sunday after worship in
