PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Scot Sorensen, Interim Pastor



While the church calendar says it is Advent, we all know that it is wall-to-wall Christmas. Everywhere you turn there are Christmas decorations, piped-in Christmas music, Christmas advertisements enticing us to buy both practical and impractical. What are we to make of all this Christmas-ness?

I used to be quick to bemoan the co-opting of Christmas. I could be harsh in my judgment of those whom I deemed were not honoring or celebrating Christmas appropriately. What a foolish snob I can be. But, in my annual watching of a favorite Christmas special, I am reminded of what truly is important both for Christmas and for every day of the year.

Charles Schultz' "Charlie Brown Christmas" was first aired in 1965, yet the message seems timeless for our time. Poor Charlie Brown bemoans the over-commercialization of Christmas. That was 1965! What depths of despair would commercialized Christmas drive Charlie Brown to today?

If you remember, the poignant resolve of the story comes when Charlie screams "Can anyone tell me the true meaning of Christmas?!" To which Linus calmly answers his question. "In those days there were shepherds out in the field abiding their flocks by night, and an angel of the lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shown around them, and there were sore afraid. And the angels said to them, "fear not, for behold I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be for all the people, for unto you is born this day in the City of David, a Savior who is Christ the Lord."

The miracle of Christmas isn't just that God chose to come to earth as a baby, but that birth of the Babe of Bethlehem is *for you*. For You All. (The "you" is plural!) But the plural 'you' includes you individually, too.

Commercialization has no doubt increased since "Charlie Brown's Christmas" first aired in 1965. But really, does it matter? For the message the angel spoke to those shepherds outside Bethlehem is still our "Good News of Great Joy." Come what may from society and culture, let us be reminded, let us tell one another, let us tell our children, let us tell the world of the great "Good News of Great." For indeed, a light does shine in the darkness. Jesus is born.

Have blessed Christmas season and I will see you in worship!


from that, and we need a couple of folks who will be substitutes for early service when the regular ushers are unable to be there.

Lutheran Confessions

On many occasions in the 16th century, Martin Luther and other evangelical reformers were asked to give an account of their teaching and practice. In response Philip Melanchthon, one of Luther's colleagues, wrote, "We must see what Scripture attributes to the law and what it attributes to the promises. For it praises and teaches good works in such a way as not to abolish the free promise and not to eliminate Christ." Although the writings that comprise the Book of Concord engage a range of issues regarding teaching and practice, they do not address every question or topic. Rather, they focus on the Scrip-

tures' purpose: to present Jesus Christ to faith.

The Book of Concord includes seven writings composed by Luther and others. Lutheran churches around the world have affirmed these writings, and the ELCA affirms them in its governing documents. Lutherans most often

use them in teaching - for example, when the Small Catechism is used in basic Christian instruction, or when the Augsburg Confession is used to teach women and men preparing for ministry.



CARE CALLERS -







- Small twigs (various shapes and sizes)
- · Hot glue
- Yarn
- Scissors
- · Adult help

What you do:

- After gathering twigs, arrange them to create uppercase letter shapes. Cross, bend and break twigs, as needed.
- Glue "letters" together at the intersections.
- Cut an arm-length of yarn and wind it around twigs to add color to each letter.
- Create a loop of yarn and tie it to the top of the ornament for hanging.
